

Who is #1 ? DENMARK THE HAPPIEST COUNTRY!

Denmark has topped the World Happiness Report every year but one since 2012. In Denmark, a normal work-week is 37 hours and Danish employees benefit from 5 weeks of holiday a year. This means that leisure time is a huge part

of the Danish culture.

Leaving work on time, bicycling home or jumping on effective public transport, picking up your children from day nursery and having a cosy family dinner is happiness for most families in Denmark.



Denmark topped the list in the first report, in 2012, and again in 2013, but it was displaced by Switzerland last year. In this year's ranking, Denmark was back at No. 1, followed by Switzerland, Iceland, Norway, Finland, Canada, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Australia and Sweden.

Most are fairly homogeneous nations with strong social safety nets. The United States rose two spots, from No. 15 in 2015.

Denmark is a society where citizens participate and contribute to making society work. More than 40 percent of all Danes do voluntary work in cultural and sports associations, social organizations, political organizations, They consider healthcare to be a basic right. This, and free or low-cost childcare create a feeling of 'well-being' throughout a Dane's life!

NORWAY 16 YEARS OLD VOTERS?



In the elections in 2011, 16-and 17-year-olds in 20 municipalities voted as a pilot project.

After the first trial in the general elections in 2011, 16 and 17 year-olds will again vote in a handful of norway municipalities in this year's municipal elections.

Teenagers can join the British army at 16. It's been said that "More than 40% of 16 to 17-year-olds have a different view than their parents -Young people make up their own minds."

The Scottish First Minister has called for the voting age in UK elections to be lowered to 16. More than 100,000 teenagers registered to vote in the Scottish referendum.

Today, Austria is the only country in Europe that allows 16-year-olds to vote in national elections. However, the voting age has been lowered for local elections in many countries, and national debates are taking place on this issue across the EU.

Blending farm humor, readable Norse with English translation and very rudimentary art, readers received news, entertainment and a lesson in the new language-English. This continuing series was still being enjoyed by my grandparents in the mid 1940's as my grandmother read it in Norse and laughingly translated it to me.



A Penny for your Thoughts


