"The Luren Singing Society is North America's oldest, Norwegian-American male chorus now in our 145th year of continuous existence in the United States. We love to sing!" These words introduce the Luren Singers on their website, and on Thursday, June 7, 7:00 p.m., Wergeland Lodge is sponsoring this notable group's appearance in concert at Our Savior's Lutheran Church, 612 Division Street, La Crosse. This is an event you must not miss!

Drawing members from Iowa, Minnesota, and Wisconsin, the Luren Singers will bring us a program of wonderful variety: ethnic, contemporary, classical, patriotic, spiritual, show, stage, Christian – all these are in their repertoire. In their photo, they number over 60 members.

Under the direction of Dave Judisch for 37 years, this group not only sang for Norway's royal couple in their visit to Decorah last fall, but Luren has also sung for the King of Norway at the royal palace in Oslo. They have toured in Norway five times and are anticipating their sixth tour within the next three years.

On March 17, 1868, four homesick Norwegian immigrants began singing together, taking the name "Luren" and becoming the seed for today's society. Six years later, the group had already had 22 regular members and was rehearsing twice a week.

Syttende Mai – Norway

As I write this, it is two days til Syttende Mai. Norwegian Constitution Day is the National Day of Norway observed on May 17 each year. The Constitution of Norway was signed at Eidsvoll on May 17, 1814. The constitution declared Norway to be an independent nation. The

celebration of this day began among students and others early in history. However, Norway was under Swedish rule and for several years the King of Sweden and Norway was reluctant to allow the celebrations. For a couple of years in the 1820's, King Karl Johan forbade it, as he thought the celebrations a kind of protest and even revolt against Swedish sovereignty.

Henrik Wergeland started the first known children's parade at Eidsvoll around 1820. It was not until 1833 that anyone ventured to hold a public address on behalf of the day. That year, official celebration was initiated beside the monument of Christian Krogh, who was known to have stopped the king from gaining too much personal power. The address was given by Henrik Wergeland. (More on Mr. Wergeland next month.)

After 1864, the day became more established and the first children's parade was launched in Christiania, now Oslo. This parade consisted only of boys. It was only in 1899 that girls were allowed to join in the parade for the first time. The day focused originally on the Norwegian Constitution, but after 1905 the focus has been directed also toward the Royal Family.

The longest parade is in Oslo, where some 100,000 people travel to the city center to participate in the main festivities. The massive Oslo parade includes 100 schools and marching bands, and passes the Royal Palace where the Royal Family greets the people from the main balcony.

Sons of Norway lodges play a central part in organizing Syttende Mai festivities in the United States. Stoughton WI claims to have the largest celebration in the U.S. Festivities include canoe racing, two parades, an art fair, and a 20 mile run which starts at the capital and ends at Mandt Park in Stoughton. Our daughter and I did the run one year

On April 24th Al and Julia Forde drove Julia Nordby and Wesley Bangsberg to Decorah IA to tour the Vesterheim Museum and specifically "The Peale Collection: Norwegian Furniture from Hill Farm". Josephine Perfect Bay-Paul married Charles Ulrick Bay who was appointed ambassador to Norway by President Truman in 1946. While in Norway, Josephine purchased Norwegian antiques. In 1953, the Bays returned to the United States due to Mr. Bay's declining health and brought their Norwegian antiques with them. Mr. Bay died on December 31, 1955. In 1958 Josephine married C. Michael Paul, and they purchased Hill Farm in Pawling New York and filled it with the beautiful Norwegian antiques which Josephine continued to purchase from Norway. She died from complications of leukemia in 1962. Hill Farm remained in the family until it was sold, fully furnished, to Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, pastor and world famous author of *The Power of Positive Thinking*, and co-founder with his wife, Ruth Stafford Peale, of the Guideposts Foundation. The Peales were close friends of the Pauls. Dr. Marion Nelson of Vesterheim visited the Peales in New York and explained the value of the furniture to them. The Peales chose to will the furniture to Vesterheim. Dr. Peale died first, and after the death of Ruth Stafford Peale and the sale of Hill Farm, Vesterheim was notified to come and get these Norwegian antiques.

After enjoying lunch in Decorah, the foursome went for ice cream at the Chocolate Shoppe in Spring Grove MN,.

KAREN'S KORNER

May is the month to celebrate our Norwegian heritage with various parades, dinners, and festivals. We are all here because our Scandinavian ancestors had the courage and ambition to travel across the ocean to a new country that they thought would provide more opportunities to farm, own land, establish a business, or maybe reunite with other relatives and friends who made the journey earlier. Our featured book this month, "In Their Own Words, Letters from Norwegian Immigrants", provides a glimpse into the lives of nine Norwegian immigrants in the 1870's to the 1940's. Solveig Zempel, working on a grant proposal of the University of Minnesota Press, collected, compiled, translated, edited, and published the letters. These letters describe both rural and urban settings: Brooklyn, Chicago, Minneapolis, Red River Valley, Wisconsin, West Coast.

Why was there such an influx of immigrants? According to the book, "the primary motivating fact was the desire to attain greater economic conditions". Others sought personal success, religious freedom, and equality. America was considered the land of opportunity, but remote and exotic. Many still think that every American is rich. A few years ago, my co-worker, Joyce, in Minneapolis connected with relatives in Norway. After they exchanged letters back & forth a few times, the Norwegian relatives asked Joyce to ship over a brand-new washer and dryer!

On Syttende Mai, our Sons of Norway Board faithfully visits the grave of Martin Dock at the Campbell Cemetery after the flag-raising ceremony downtown. Martin Dock found life in the new country very difficult and apparently his dreams never came true. This month's book also contains the letters of Hans Overland who did not enjoy his life in America either. He was an educated man from a prominent Norwegian family that participated in local politics. In America, Hans worked unskilled jobs in restaurants in Minnesota, drove an ice wagon, toiled on the railroad in Montana but never attained financial stability or happiness in the U.S. However his siblings enjoyed success in their new homeland. His brother worked in Minneapolis and Duluth as a journalist, eventually becoming editor of a newspaper, "The Industrial Age." His sister was trained in the law in Norway, worked as a lawyer in New York City, and wrote a book about business law. Hans eventually returned to Norway where he immersed himself again in the local politics and was appointed lensmann (local sheriff), a position previously held by his father and grandfather. He married and raised seven children. Maybe he experienced success in Norway because of the obstacles and hardships he encountered in America. Check out the immigrant stories in this book or one of many other books your library has to offer.



Roald Amundsen Ship to Return to Norway

After over 80 years of weathering the ice of Cambridge Bay in Nunavut, Canada, the wreck of the Maud has just received federal approval from the Canadian government to return home to Norway.

Investors with the group Maud Returns Home have been working with the Canadian Cultural Property Export Review Board to receive the necessary export permits to raise the wreck and ready it for a long journey aboard a barge to Norway, where the ship would be the centerpiece of a new museum in Vollen. "The board recognized the shared heritage of Canada, Norway and the world, and after careful consideration of the criteria under the Act, determined that an export permit will be granted for the Maud," said a statement released after the ruling.

Jan Wanggaard, manager of Maud Returns Home, couldn't be more thrilled about the outcome of the hearing. "That is great news for us, and we can now go ahead making plans and prepare our self for the great challenge to finally bring Maud home.


