The famous dancers from Stoughton will perform on April 14, 2019 in the gym at Blair-Taylor at 2:00. \$9.00 admission at the door. Lunch provided after the show. Everyone is welcome.

In 1952, Stoughton, Wisconsin held its first Syttende Mai celebration. This recognition of the Norwegian Constitution Day was to become a tradition in the community. Mr. Albert Molderhauer was the administrator of the schools at the time. He was of German ancestry, but felt that because the area was primarily populated with second and third generation Norwegians, the schools should play an active part in supporting ethnic pride in Stoughton.

He approached Jeanne Reek (English ancestry), the girls' physical education teacher, and prevailed upon her to begin a Norwegian dance group made up of high school students. The group would be expected to perform during future Syttende Mai celebrations. Ms. Reek was reluctant to undertake this task, as she had a limited folk dance background and little knowledge of Norway and its customs. However, because in those (continued page 3)

a little in English... Archaeologists Find Over 9,000 Year-Old Nut in Sykkylven

Archaeologists in Møre og Romsdal are very pleased with a discovery they made in Sykkylven this summer - a 9100 year-old hazelnut.

"The nut was partially burned. So either there was a fire in the area, or someone roasted nuts here about 9,000 years ago," county curator Bjørn Ringstad told Sunnmørsposten.

The nut was found during archaeological surveys on the Bakke Islands in Sykkylven this summer, on a site where a new school will be built.

"We also found nutshells in one of the fire pits at the excavations in Auremarka. Then we found a whole pit full of burnt hazelnut shells. But we have not determined their age yet," he says. The nutshell found in the Bakke Islands was analyzed by a laboratory in the United States. Ringstad says it is a fun find, which proves that hazelnuts have grown on the discovery site for several thousand years – all the way back to the stone age.

litt på norsk... Arkeologer Fant over 9000 År Gammel Nøtt i Sykkylven

Arkeologene i Møre og Romsdal er godt fornøyd med et funn de gjorde i Sykkylven i sommer – en 9100 år gammel hasselnøtt.

 Nøtta var delvis brent. Så enten har det vært en brann i området, eller så har noen ristet nøtter her for om lag 9000 år siden, sier fylkeskonservator Bjørn Ringstad til Sunnmørsposten.

Nøtta ble funnet under de arkeologiske registreringene på Bakkeøyene i Sykkylven i sommer, på tomta der det skal bygges en ny skole.

 Også ved utgravingene på Auremarka fant vi nøtteskall i en av ildgropene. Da fant vi en hel grop full av brente hasselnøttskall.
Men dem har vi ikke alderen på, sier han.

Nøtteskallet som ble funnet i Bakkeøyene er analysert ved et laboratorium i USA. Ringstad sier det er et artig funn, som beviser at det har vokst hasselnøtter på funnstedet i mange tusen år – helt tilbake til steinalderen.

days, one didn't question authority, she began the program. That first year, she choose six girls who in turn chose their partners to form the first group.

The group began by practicing during their lunch hour. In order to put in more time they began holding practices at 7:00 a.m. Since the early years the group has grown to 20 dancers and three keyboardists. Practices are now held each morning from 6:55 a.m. to 7:40 a.m.

By the third year of their existence the interest of the school and community grew to such extent that Ms. Reek felt she must uncover all there was to know about Norway and its customs. She advanced the performance level of the troop through talks and interviews with Norwegians but found very little recorded information about folk dancing. In the summer of 1964, she went to Norway to gather information first hand. She spent seven weeks there filming folk dances, getting translations to accompany the films, exploring costume shops and taping music.

Other people in the community helped in developing these authentic folk performances. Shirley Ralph (Welch ancestry) has worked on recording on paper the music to accompany the dancers. In the beginning years, accordions were used, but today, the dancers are accompanied by keyboardists. Alma Tenjem played an important role in copying, designing, embroidering and constructing costumes. The first costumes were all hand made in Stoughton with materials that were available in the United States. Today, the bunads continue to be constructed in Stoughton, however, all the patterns, fabrics and threads are imported from Norway so that all the bunads are authentically Norwegian. Even the shoes and jewelry are imported from Norway! The girls wear bunads representing different districts in Norway, while the guys all wear the same. In 1968 they were asked to dance for King Olaf of Norway when he visited Madison. Ms. Reek returned to Norway in 1971 to do more research. The following year a highlight in the Dancers career came when they were invited to perform in Norway in and around Bergen and Oslo. With the support and assistance of talented community members, school personnel and parents, the Stoughton Norwegian Dancers have become Stoughton's "Good Will Ambassadors". They have performed for millions of people. They have toured extensively throughout the United States, Canada and Norway and have been in several national folk festivals. Each spring takes the Dancers to a different part of the country. The group has made 5 tours to Norway.

Each year many students in Stoughton try out for the nine to ten vacancies in the group left by graduating seniors. Being a Norwegian Dancer is held in high regard among the students and community. The students who are members of the group are pleased to have the opportunity to bring to each of you a little of the traditions of Norway - copied from <u>stoughtonnorwegiandancers.com</u>

Tiny Almond Pies

Top off your Easter supper with this tasty dessert, laced with delicate almond flavor.

Ingredients:

For the dough: Scant 2/3 cup unsalted butter 1 cup flour, sifted 1 egg yolk 3 1/2 Tbsp. cold water 1 Tbsp. cognac

For the filling: 1 1/4 cups ground almonds 1 cup sifted confectioner's sugar 3 egg whites, lightly beaten



Directions:

Step 1: Divide the butter into three pieces of equal size. Crumble one piece into the flour. Step 2: Whisk the egg yolk into the water and add. Knead lightly and form into a square. Wrap in plastic and refrigerate 30 minutes. Let the remaining butter rest at room temperature. Sprinkle the baking surface with flour. Roll the dough out into a thin rectangular. Spread half the remaining butter over 2/3 of the dough. Step 3: Fold over the plain section, then fold over the other section with butter, like a business letter. This forms a rectangle with three layers of dough and two of butter. Roll into a rectangle and fold into thirds again. Refrigerate 30 minutes. Step 4: Roll out the dough and spread with the remaining margarine. Fold into thirds, roll out again and fold into thirds. Refrigerate the dough for 30 minutes. Preheat the oven to 2000 C (4000 F). Grease sandkake (small fluted pie) tins. Step 5: Roll the dough out into a 2 mm thin sheet. Cut into circles slightly larger than the diameter of the tins. Press into the tins. Step 6: For the filling, combine almonds with powdered sugar and egg whites. Place about 1 1/2 teaspoons of filling in each form. Step 7: Cut out 8 mm (1/3") strips of dough and arrange in an "x" over the filling. Tuck the ends between the filling and the crust. Step 8: Bake on a baking sheet on the lowest oven shelf about 20 minutes. Makes 12-14 cakes. Tubfrim is an organization that for over 85 years has collected used stamps, postcards and phone cards. This resells we stamp dealers, private individuals and collectors in Norway and many other countries.

There are many ways in which we are asked to assist our fellow human beings who are in need. Participation in the Tubfrim program is one of the more simple yet successful ways to do just that. Tubfrim is an organization in Norway that resells cancelled stamps and donates the proceeds to help children with disabilities. Sons of Norway is proud to support Tubfrim in their work to support children in need.

In 1928 Ditlef Frantzen, postmaster of the small Norwegian town of Nesbyen, got the idea to collect and market canceled stamps as a way of raising funds for the Tuberculosis Association in Norway. Within a few years, his idea caught on and many communities in Norway and beyond were collecting and sending bags of canceled stamps to Nesbyen.

When Frantzen left Nesbyen in 1943, he donated his stamp collecting institution to the Norwegian Health Service. Since tuberculosis is no longer the threat to health that it once was, today disabled and needy children receive the proceeds from the resale of the stamps. Last year Tubfrim made a profit of 520,000 Kroner (that's almost \$80,000).

How can I help?

To help Tubfrim do its crucial work, simply clip canceled stamps from envelopes, leaving at least a quarter of an inch around the edge. When you have collected a pound of stamps, ask your Tubfrim chairperson or lodge secretary to weigh and verify them. **Then place your stamps in a plastic bag and send it in a sturdy box to Tubfrim, 3540 Nesbyen, Norway.**

You may also bring them to the meetings and give to an officer or send your stamps to one of the district Tubfrim coordinators who will in turn forward them to Tubfrim:
