Besides landing Mollie's goodie basket and achieving major success at Bingo, Karen Vedvik scored with a winner of a casserole at February's meeting. Her dish, which she dubbed "Mish Mosh," brought back fond memories from at least two other lodge members. They knew it as "Laundry Day Casserole" because it was something their Moms would put together to bake on the family's busy laundry day. Whatever its name, it was delicious, and Karen shares her recipe.

Laundry Day Casserole

- 1-1/2 lb Ground Beef
- 1 medium Onion, chopped
- 4 or 5 Carrots, peeled and sliced
- 2 or 3 Russet Potatoes, peeled and sliced
- 3 or 4 ribs Celery, sliced
- 1 15-oz can diced Tomatoes with half of the liquid drained off
- 1 can Cream of Mushroom with Roasted Garlic soup
- Pepper and/or other seasonings to taste

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Brown ground beef with onion. Drain off most of the grease. Add celery, carrots and potatoes. Mix in the diced tomatoes and liquid. Season. Transfer to a buttered casserole dish and top with the undiluted soup. Bake uncovered for 45-50 minutes.

Culture Corner

Hi everyone! Here's a recap of the Culture Questions at our last two meetings: In **January** we learned that Sigrid Undset is the only Norwegian woman to have won the Nobel Prize in Literature. She was awarded the Nobel in 1928 for her historical trilogy "Kristin Lavransdatter." This series is about life in fourteenth century Norway, portrayed through the experiences of Kristin's life from birth to death. The three volumes are *The Wreath (Kransen)*, *The Wife (Husfrue)* and *The Cross (Korset)*. Her work is much admired for its historical and ethnological accuracy. One of Sigrid Undset's unique skills was her ability to read ancient runes. Archaeological discoveries in later years proved her 1920's work to be historically accurate. Jill Larson picked up this book after our January meeting and gained great insight into what life must have been like for her Norwegian ancestors. **February Meeting:** Edvard Grieg is Bergen's most celebrated citizen. He was a pianist and widely considered to be one of the leading Romantic era composers. His use and development of Norwegian folk tunes in his compositions brought the music of Norway to international consciousness and helped to develop a national Norwegian identity. His most well-known piece may be "In the Hall of the Mountain King" which he wrote for Ibsen's play *Peer Gynt*. The music represents angry trolls taunting Peer when he accidentally ends up in their mountain after hitting his head on a rock (after stealing a bride from her wedding!) and gets louder each time the theme repeats. The music ends with Peer escaping from the mountain. Peggy Schroeder reminded us that this tune was playing at the start of the Masse Moro camp video, which we viewed at our January meeting. Prize winners for the culture questions were Steve & Eileen Below in January, and Mary Swain in February. Congrats!
