the structure measured 44 feet long and 24 feet wide.

A total of \$350.00 was pledged to build the church with many of the early members donating their carpentry skills. With its white wood siding and a tall, pointed steeple, the building duplicated a style commonly seen across the Norwegian countryside.

Rev. Johan Olsen, the first pastor, preached every third Sunday morning and evening. An occasional service was not unusual to the recent immigrants who remembered Norway's geography. There, traveling to church might begin with a long journey by foot, followed by getting into a boat and rowing across the fjord.

As the immigrants assimilated and conquered the new language, church services changed. Originally all services were conducted in Norwegian. By 1911 English services were held twice a month; by 1921 Norwegian was used only on the first Sunday of each month and, by 1931 the switch to English was completed

Geitost Oatmeal Raisin Cookies

³/₄ c. butter or margarine, softened ¹/₂ c. light brown sugar, firmly packed $\frac{1}{2}$ c. sugar 2 eggs 1 tsp. vanilla extract 1¹/₃ c. all-purpose flour 1 tsp. baking soda 1 c. chopped walnuts $1\frac{1}{2}$ c. oatmeal (quick or old-fashioned) 1 c. raisins or dried cranberries $4\frac{1}{2}$ oz. geitost cheese, cut into $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch cubes

Cream butter and sugars, blend in eggs and vanilla. Combine flour and baking soda: stir into dough. Blend in oatmeal, fruit,



cheese and walnuts. Shape a tablespoon of dough into balls and place 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheets. Press down lightly with glass. Bake at 375° for 10-12 minutes till golden brown.

• The Scandinavian countries were well represented by several women golfers at the LPGA tournament held at Thornberry Creek at Oneida, July 3 - 9.

 For the first time in history, Norwegian banknotes don't feature portraits, but instead, the new notes all reflect a common theme: "The Sea". A traditional, iconic design features on the front of the new notes, with a different maritime motif for each denomination.

"Norges Bank's banknotes and coins are the community's money, money we share, and for which we collective-

ly act as guarantor. 100 It is natural that they should tell a story that reflects us as a community of people, and the sea as a community of and our coastline



are key dimensions in that story. And I hope that the new banknotes will act as an excellent business card for our country", says Norwegian central bank Norges Bank governor Øystein Olsen.

Norges Bank put the new 50-krone, 100-krone and 200-krone notes into circulation on 30 May 2017. The other denominations will be launched in 2018 and 2019.

This and That

• After 55 years at 1455 West Lake Street, Minneapolis, the Sons of Norway International headquarters building and its surrounding property have been sold to Ryan Companies and Weidner Apartment Homes. Considered to be a premier location in the Uptown neighborhood, the property has been home to Sons of Norway since 1962.

Sons of Norway plans to continue business operations on the current site when redevelopment is complete. The property covers 2.17 acres, including the headquarters building. which has 60,000 square feet.

Tony Barranco, Ryan's vice president of real estate development stated, "As much as we'd like to save the headquarters building, it is old and riddled with hazardous materials. To put it back in functional form would be very difficult." He noted that a Norwegian theme will lead design efforts as they honor the impact Sons of Norway has made on Lake Street.

Preliminary plans called for a mixed-use building, including commercial and residential with Sons of Norway an anchor tenant.

Trinity - 150 Years of History

(When Gronnvik organized in 1994, it found a home at Trinity Lutheran Church, the oldest Lutheran church in Green Bay. Here are excerpts from a history of the church written by 1998 by Bonnie Vastag with the help of charter member Dick Solboe, a long-time Trinity member.)

On January 6, 1867, 25 Norwegian Lutherans gathered and organized The Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran Church of Fort Howard. This forerunner of Trinity Lutheran Church, 330 South Broadway, Green Bay, erected it's first building later that year. Located across the street from the present church, (see page 4)
