Thursday, January 25th, 6:30pm – Board of Directors Quarterly Meeting

The 2024-2025 Board of Directors will meet at Trinity Lutheran Church to discuss past and upcoming lodge business. Our new president James Eliason will facilitate our review of recent activities and end-of-2023 financial reports, as well as our consideration of ongoing and new activities to invigorate our lodge. To learn more about us and participate more actively, lodge members are encouraged to attend...mainly as observers, but also to provide feedback and new ideas.

New Winter Meeting Dates for Idun Lodge

Our Lodge Board has decided to switch our January, February, and March monthly gatherings from our traditional first Wednesday potlucks to mid-day on Saturdays, so that attendees are able to return home before it gets dark during these peak winter months. In case you're wondering, I was the baby boy out of six boys in a row; I have three younger sisters. We had large gardens and fruit trees on the farm, and provided our own sources for meat. I've been collecting and enjoying cookbooks since I was young. There are ones from the PBS American Masters James Beard, Alice Waters, Julia Child and Jacques Pepin. At this meeting, we also need to elect our lodge delegates to attend the biennial **Sons of Norway District 5 Convention on June 19-22, 2024 at Indianapolis**. District 5 current lodge membership (as of December 31, 2023) determines how many delegates we can elect. Idun Lodge will reimburse delegates for most of their convention expenses. Please consider offering to be a delegate to represent our lodge in Indianapolis, or think about attending as a non-delegate. Why should I be a delegate to District 5 Convention 2024?

- To represent my lodge.
- To make decisions for our district.

- To share ideas in person with members from throughout the district.
- To learn new Lena and Ole jokes.

But...it costs too much!

- There is time to start *now* to raise money to help support delegates.
- There is time to apply for a grant to help pay the registration fee.
- (D5 has matching grants and grants for up to \$200.)
- The hotel room rate is \$129 + tax an unusually low rate for an upscale hotel.
- Breakfast is included 2 breakfast vouchers per room.
- A double-queen room accommodates 4 people bring a friend for a roommate.

But...I can't drive that far!

- There is enough time to make arrangements for carpooling with lodges in your area.
- Invite other lodges along the way to cooperate on transportation.
- Members from the eastern part of D5 have traveled to WI for many conventions.
- It is the same number of miles each way!
- The site is the Indianapolis Crowne Point Airport Hotel, so flying is a good option.

What would my responsibilities be as a convention delegate?

- 1. READ the delegate book that will be sent to all elected delegates. It contains resolutions and has important information for delegates to consider in advance.
- 2. SERVE on a committee if asked. Committees meet in person Thursday morning of convention week. They might also meet ahead of time on Zoom. Committees have specific roles ranging from making recommendations on any resolutions submitted to dealing with financial business.
- 3. CHOOSE extra activities carefully to avoid conflict with responsibilities. For instance, as a delegate I may attend cultural classes on Wednesday and Thursday (unless serving on a committee), but need to be at business meetings all day Friday and Saturday.
- 4. ENJOY special activities, speakers, and cultural classes before the district lodge meeting (on Wednesday and Thursday) and activities each evening.
- 5. SHOW UP to attend all business sessions.
- 6. LISTEN to reports and proposals.
- 7. ASK guestions; take an active part in decision-making.
- 8. VOTE on proposals.
- 9. OPTIONAL: CELEBRATE at the banquet Saturday night with lively Scandinavian music by a well-known professional duo and enjoy the presentation of District and International awards.
- 10. ACCEPT any awards my lodge earned and take them home to my lodge.
- 11. SHARE convention experiences and ideas with my lodge.

Nordic Winter Vegetable Soup

Warm up this winter with this delicious, simple and healthy soup.

- 2 Tablespoons extra virgin olive oil 1 large onion, thinly sliced
- 2 leeks, white and tender green parts only, thinly sliced
- 2 garlic cloves, minced1 cup pearl barley
- 8 cups low-sodium vegetable broth
- 4 cups water
- 10 thyme sprigs
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 1/2 lbs. celery root, peeled and cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 1 lb. parsnips, peeled and cut into 1/2-inch pieces

Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

- 1 lb. baby spinach
- 1 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg

In a large pot, heat the oil. Add the onion, leeks and garlic and cook over moderate heat, stirring occasionally, until tender, about 5 minutes. Stir in the barley. Add the vegetable broth, water, thyme and bay leaves and bring to a boil. Add the celery root and parsnips and season with salt and pepper. Simmer over moderately low heat until the barley and root vegetables are tender, about 40 minutes.

Stir in the spinach and nutmeg and simmer for 5 minutes. Season the soup with salt and pepper and serve in deep bowls, with hearty whole-grain rye bread.

Ice Bathing in Norway



This winter, how would you like to start every Saturday morning with a refreshing ice bath? That is what Norwegian Anne Kristin Møller has done every Saturday since 2015. She became infatuated with the activity after participating in an event to set a new ice bathing record in Oslo. She stated, "The rush you feel in your body and the contrast of going from cold to warm is an absolutely fantastic experience." Additionally, Møller enjoys seeing nature from a new angle at each location she has ice bathed which includes Oslo, Tromsø, Karmøy, and Svalbard to name a few. Ice bathing has become quite popular in Norway, with

over 100 ice bathing clubs around the country. It is a great social activity that also has many health benefits, such as aiding with fatigue and stress. In a survey conducted, 1 in 5 Norwegians said they were planning on ice bathing in the winter.

Viking Discovery on Jomfruland

While looking for a lost gold earring in their garden, a family in Norway uncovered 1,000-year-old Viking artifacts. The Aasvik family, from a small island called Jomfruland, became the first to find a Viking-era discovery on the island. They had stumbled across it by using a metal detector to search for the earring in their yard. The metal detector alerted them underneath a large tree, so they began digging. Among the findings was a brooch and an additional item that were likely part of a Viking-era burial. Both were believed to have once been covered in gold and were engraved with depictions of animals. The brooch is believed to date back between 780 and 850. These artifacts help prove the Vikings' existence on the island. Experts knew of settlements on the island dating back only to the Middle Ages, making this Viking discovery rather significant.
