

Book Club report

THE DAUGHTER'S WALK

The Ostestaden book club recently met at the home of Lois Gordee to discuss their latest read, *The Daughter's Walk by Jane Kirkpatrick*.

This book is a sequel to one about a mother and her daughter who on a wager walk across America to save their farm from foreclosure. Mother Helga and daughter Clara set off walking following the train tracks hoping to win \$10,000. Despite many setbacks and challenges they manage this amazing feat -- only 2 weeks too late to collect the money. In sorrow and disgrace they return home to find tragedy on the home front -- an epidemic has caused the death of two of Helga's children and the other children and the father blame Helga and Clara for taking off on this wild adventure.

The first book is through Helga's eyes while *The Daughter's Walk*, is from the point of view of Clara. This time we find out she took Clara with to save her from corruption by her employer's son. We also learn that Helga's husband is not Clara's father. This fact colors much of the journey as Clara wonders who her father is and why he left her. From the daughter's point of view the trip exposes many different things about her mother and why she is doing this. We see Clara as being more the leader, trying to protect her mother and to make Helga behave more rationally.

When they return home having reached their goal, but too late, they are rejected by the rest of the family and the father throws Clara out of the house, telling her she is not his daughter. She finds refuge with two business women who take her in and educate her and bring her into their business. Clara finds a cozy home and a good income, but she cannot forget her birth family and keeps trying to "go home". Over the years Clara enjoys much love and fun with her new "family", but she never really feels she deserves this happiness.

As Clara attempts to find her way through life we find the main theme of this book is defining family. Do we owe the most to the family we were born into even if they abuse us and turn us out into the streets? Is our real family the people who are kind to us and share our lives and encourage us through good and bad? Members discussed their own or others' histories with regard to this topic.

Jane Kirkpatrick really held our attention as she painted a new future for Clara and her family. We continued our discussion of Clara and Helga and their different points of view over Lois' delicious dessert and coffee.
