His legacy is a testament to the bravery and daring of the early Viking explorers who paved the way for future discoveries and dramatically shaped the course of history.



First Selection Declared a Hit by Nordkap Book Club Members!


It was all thumbs up when the Nordkap Book Club met October 1st to discuss the first in its series of non-fiction books for the fall.

The book was *Kon-Tiki: Across the Pacific in a Raft* by famed Norwegian explorer Thor Heyerdahl. Intrigued by Polynesian folklore, biologist Heyerdahl suspected that the South Sea Islands had been settled by an ancient race from thousands of miles to the east, led by a mythical hero, Kon-Tiki. He decided to prove his theory by duplicating the legendary voyage.

In our Zoom discussion led by **Magda Pecsenye**, we found that everyone loved the book -- although some found the detailed descriptions of nautical procedures hard to follow. Yet reading about the adventurous spirit of the explorers and their exciting journey overcame any doubts about the overall appeal of the book. We hardily recommend *Kon-Tiki*!

Next up will be our discussion of *Across the Deep Blue Sea: The Saga of Early Norwegian Immigrants* by Odd S. Lovoll.

The book investigates a chapter in Norwegian immigration history that has never been fully told before. Odd S. Lovoll relates how Quebec, Montreal, and other port cities in Canada became the gateway for Norwegian emigrants to North America, replacing New York as the main destination from 1850 until the late 1860s. During those years, 94 percent of Norwegian emigrants landed in Canada.
