<u>in advance</u> (please text or call David at 734-276-8709 to set up a time). Then stay as long as you like. The park is open for skiing 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday. Remember you need to purchase a \$10 daily vehicle pass for the park.

Huron Meadows offers miles of groomed trails for skiers. Winter closures, conditions and grooming updates are posted by the park daily by 10 a.m. on weekdays and 8:15 a.m. on weekends/holidays. Check the postings at <u>https://www.metroparks.com/park-closures/#HuronMeadowsMetropark</u>

Not enough snow? You can buy a \$5 pass and ski on Bucks Run, the park's 1.5-mile loop refreshed with snow guns.

Bring your own ski equipment, otherwise ski rentals are available at the Ski Center at \$15 for adults and \$9 for youths under 16. You must reserve ski rentals, but no more than five days in advance. Reservations must be made online at

- **Jim Nelson** has a varied repertoire of presentations including scholarly topics, humor, and music, and one will be chosen.
- **Adolf Hanson** wrote a book about growing up in a Norwegian community in the Bronx. He will share some of his experiences.
- **John Arneson** packed up the family vehicle, persuaded his wife to be the navigator, and followed the trail of his great-grandfather's Civil War experience. He will talk about that trip and share genealogy resources he found helpful.

Nordkap Book Club Ventures into Politics with Travel Writer Rick Steves

Travel was the subject for discussion by our Nordkap Book Club in its Zoom gathering on January 21. The travel we were talking about was not the sight-seeing kind, but rather a form of travel recommended by best-selling author Rick Steves in his book *Travel as a Political Act*. The book was the third in the series of non-fiction books the club is currently reading.

In this book, Steves puts his sights on travel as an educational experience. He believes that travelers armed with a broader perspective from their journeys should return home to help shape public opinion about world affairs and become activists for positive change in their own communities.

He encourages travelers to take the least-traveled paths away from tourists spots, to find local people to engage in meaningful discussions, to learn about their troubles and how they view the United States and the rest of the world. Steves argues that knowledge gained from this approach can be quite eye-opening and cause travelers to rethink their own long-held opinions about the world.

Steves relates how he has practiced this method since his early days as a backpacking student traveler and, more recently, as the renowned travel expert he has become.

What Steves suggests may be a big ask of that traveler simply seeking a restful vacation in a beautiful spot far from the troubles at home. But Steves definitely offers food for thought and provides insightful background on many of the interesting places he's traveled—such as Denmark, Morrocco, El Salvador, Iran, Turkey, and Israel.

A Letter from President Haley Vingsness:

Kia ora (Māori for "Hello") from New Zealand!

As I flew over the South Island, I was struck by how similar the landscape is to the western coast of Norway. I arrive tomorrow [February 10] at Fiordland National Park... named for its similarity to the Norwegian fjords (but spelled differently. Maybe to ensure no confusion on which country it's in?) It's summer in New Zealand, but it will get down to freezing temperatures at Milford Sound fjord.

The glaciers here are shrinking rapidly. A hiking trail that 10 years ago allowed you to walk into Franz Josef glacier now ends 750m from the ice. I'm reminded of how
