Nineteen Counties to Become 11 Regions by 2020

The Storting (Norway's parliament) recently passed the most comprehensive administrative reform since 1662. Back then, the country's administrative units transitioned from *len* to *amt* while under Danish rule. In this new reform, Norway's 19 *fylker* (counties) are planned to be replaced by 11 *regioner* (regions) by January 2020. Four existing counties (Nordland, Rogaland, Oslo and Møre og Romsdal) will continue using the same names and borders as they had in 2017. The rest of the country will have two- and three-county groupings rolled out as *regioner* with new names. This move aims to strengthen each region and improve coordination between municipalities, regions and state. The regions will assume oversight in areas such as infrastructure, education, culture, business development and outdoor life. As far as parliamentary elections, for now the former fylker will remain the same constituencies as they were in 2017.

Meet the new regions:

Aust-Agder and Vest Agder will become Agder

Buskerud, Akershus and Østfold will be called Viken

Finnmark and Troms will go forward as Troms og Finnmark

Hordaland and Sogn og Fjordane will become Vestlandet

Nord-Trøndelag and Sør-Trøndelag have already merged into the region of Trøndelag as of January 2018

Oppland and Hedmark will be known as Innlandet

Telemark og Vestfold will become **Vestfold og Telemark**

The following counties will keep the same borders and names as regions:

Møre og Romsdal

Nordland

Oslo

Rogaland



These **Norwegian Klubb Dumplings** are so tasty, filling, and a great way to celebrate Scandinavia. Whether it is a holiday tradition or a weeknight meal, these dumplings are worth the effort.

4 potatoes

3 cups flour

1 egg

1 tsp. salt

Approximately 4 ounces ham or other cooked pork cut into 8-12 cubes

5 tbsp. melted butter

Salt and pepper to taste

- 1. Bring large pot of salted water to hard simmer
- 2. While water is warming, grate potatoes and put in big bowl.
- 3. Add flour, egg, and salt to the bowl.
- 4. Mix and knead until firm. Add more flour if necessary to bring to stiff bread dough consistency.
- 5. Wrap dough around one cube of ham. Each dumpling should be the size of a large meatball. You should get 8-12 dumplings.
- 6. Drop dumplings into simmering water and allow to cook for 45 minutes, making sure dumplings does not stick to the bottom of the pot.
- 7. Remove with a slotted spoon and serve with butter, salt and pepper Submitted by Mary Gullickson-Krantz

UNDERSTANDING WHAT THE DISTRICT 5 BOARD DOES!

Vennelag Lodge sits in an unusual position, as two of its members also serve on the District 5 Board. To understand the role of the District 5 Board, it is necessary to be aware of the hierarchy of our organization. At the bottom rung of the ladder are the Local Lodges where many hours of community service are given for specified projects and cultural events. Local lodges elect a Board of Directors or group of officers to lead their organization.

Moving up the ladder is the District 5 Board. At this level, Zone Directors are elected to assist local lodges. These individuals must own a Sons of Norway financial benefit, as this is a requirement due to our insurance company status. Zone Directors receive agendas and visit lodges assigned to them by the District 5 President. It is the job of the Zone Director to interact with members, make suggestions for activities, and take part in lodge functions. They record the minutes of the lodges they visit and submit these to the District 5 President and the District 5 Secretary for review. They make certain that required rituals are followed at lodge meetings. By doing so, the District 5 Board can be made aware early of any complications a lodge may be experiencing.

Zone Directors assist the International Board by installing new officers of a lodge. They organize training sessions for all the members in their zone, annually, and they may choose to meet with a small gathering of local lodge officers for idea-sharing. Questions that cannot be answered by the Zone Directors are referred to the Executive Committee of the District 5 Board.

If an issue is complex in nature, it could be referred to the International Board of Directors, the top rung of our imaginary ladder. Much of what the International Board does is in relation to our financial division, and they do set the Lodge Recruitment Goals each year. Working with the International Board is the Sons of Norway's legal counsel, David Ness and his team. Local lodge leaders can ask questions about certificates of deposit, lodge liability insurance and extended coverage, questions about keeping a Lodge's tax exempt status, reporting the financial assets of a lodge, or they might ask questions about issues that stem from fraud within a lodge or district.

Other staff work at the International Office assisting with membership recruitment and retention, ordering supplies, celebrating the fraternal side of the Order, raising money for the Sons of Norway Foundation, and helping to write and review ceremonial procedures.

Karen and I have been especially vocal about sharing what Vennelag Lodge does right, and we have encouraged others to come to our location to see our events in operation. We want to share our ideas and encourage all Zone 3 Lodges to do the same. By encouraging members to share their ideas, many lodges benefit. Other districts across the U.S. are looking to District 5 to see what we are accomplishing.

A biennial conference has been established to help local leaders. The conference is moved to varying locations within the District to encourage more attendance from our members who live a greater distance away. The response has been enthusiastic.

You can help our lodge by genuinely welcoming visitors. Please keep negative speak to yourself, as it does not serve a healthy purpose. Encourage people you know to participate in our parades, monthly meetings, or social events. Invite your friends and family to join us in Norway in 2021! Vennelag Lodge sits poised to do many wonderful things. I thank you for your understanding when it comes to helping our Lodge. Wouldn't we be thankful if the roles were reversed?

-After a debate on social media about how the Sámi culture was represented in the 2013 box office hit movie "Frozen," Disney took the time to address the audience's concerns and looked to the experts. The animators collaborated with a group of Sámi people to get their input on the film. The Sámi parliaments of Norway, Sweden and Finland, along with the Saami Council (a non-governmental organization of the Sámi people) reached out to Disney to collaborate on the sequel. Both parties signed a contract to work together to "ensure that the content of Frozen 2 is culturally sensitive, appropriate and respectful of the Sámi and their culture."

-The Sámi experts acted as cultural consultants for the animation team. The group worked very closely with the filmmakers and approved of the final outcome. Anne Lajla Utsi, a member of the group said, "It has been a very, very good collaboration, I must say. We are really proud of that, and happy about the film, as it is now." The Sámi influences can be seen throughout the sequel. The fictional community featured in "Frozen 2," Northuldra, is inspired by the Sámi. Two main characters, Anna and Elsa, head north to meet the Northuldra, a group that lives closely with reindeer, much like the Sámi in real life. The clothing worn by the Northuldra characters was inspired by the traditional Sámi clothing known as gákti.

-Additionally, a South Sámi musician and composer, Frode Fjellheim, who wrote the intro song for the original "Frozen," also has music featured in the sequel. This time, the Northuldra characters sing the song. Fjellheim's music uses joik, an ancient chanting type of singing from the Sámi. In exchange for the input provided by the Sámi for the film, Disney agreed to produce a dubbed version of the movie in the North Sámi language—the most common form of the Sámi language. The Sámi version will be released alongside the Norwegian version later this month in Norway.
