Directions from Mt Horeb: (2 options)

Come to Stoughton on Hwy 138. You can go all the way through town on Main Street and continue out of town on Hwy 51. After about 1 ½ miles, turn left on Pleasant Hill Road. Come to a t-intersection with Skaalen Rd, take a right and we're the first long drive way to the left. We have a Norwegian farm sign at the end of the driveway.

Or when you come into Stoughton on Hwy 138, take a left on Hwy 51. Go out to Hwy B and take a right on Hwy B (by Evergreen State Bank). Stay on Hwy B until you come to the 4-way stop sign at Hwy B and Hwy N (the county garage will be on your left). Go straight and the road turns into Skaalen Rd. Go about 1 ½ miles. We are the first long drive way on the left after you pass the housing development. We have a Norwegian farm sign at the end of the driveway.

MT. HOREB'S DRIFTLESS HISTORIUM IS NOW OPEN!

On June 3rd, the doors were flung open wide on the new Mt. Horeb Area Historical Society's Driftless Historium located at 100 South Second Street. The chosen architecture for the project merges multiple generations together in a series of buildings reminiscent of earlier times in Mt. Horeb. The main entry façade is modern, beckoning younger people to stop in for a visit, too.

Marlyn Grinde, one of our Sons of Norway senior members, was part of the Grand Opening Festivities, and she was quite a hit! Marlyn enjoys sharing her history knowledge and is a volunteer at the museum at least once a week.

View for yourself the current exhibits and note the Norwegian pieces showcased there. You can be proud of our efforts to help preserve Norwegian American artifacts at the new museum. An interactive computer program allows one to visit the grounds of the former Little Norway property and see how the Norway Building appeared before it was returned to Orkdal, Norway.

The Museum has a small gift shop with good options appealing to many ages, including trolls and its own ice cream flavor—"Troll Tracks"! Troll Tracks will be exclusively available in the museum store during open hours. The Historical Society selected the student group "Campin' Cows" submission out of fifteen po-

tential flavor candidates, using feedback received at the March 20 Mount Horeb Chamber of Commerce-hosted public taste testing (that drew more than 260 eager ice cream analysts!) and input from Society staff, volunteers and Board members. UW-Platteville will serve as the manufacturer and vendor of Troll Tracks ice cream, using milk from UWP's own Pioneer Farm and incorporating graham cracker pieces, milk chocolate chunks and miniature marshmallows, inspired by <u>s'mores</u>.

In addition to being recognized for his musical compositions, Grieg is also credited with giving Norwegians a sense of national identity during the union with Sweden. Today his legacy lives on through his musical works but also in the names of numerous schools and performing arts centers in Norway.

Locally, Madison's **Edvard Grieg Men's Chorus** sings his praises! They will next perform at the 150th anniversary of the East Koshkonong Lutheran Church (near Cambridge) on **Sunday, August 20 at 9:00 AM**. There will be a reception following the church service.

Summer Reading

Between Rocks and Hard Places is a book by Ann Urness Gesme, about "Traditions, customs, and conditions in Norway during the 1800s, emigration from Norway, the immigrant community in America." It is in the Mt Horeb Public Library, in the Norwegian Collection, 948.1 GES. Ann Gesme was born 89 years ago on a farm 3 miles south of Black Earth. She is a life member of the Norwegian American Genealogical Center and she lives in Cedar Rapids, IA, with her husband, Dean H. Gesme Sr.

Lora Lee contacted Ann Gesme and here is what she wrote about herself and her connection to Mount Horeb:

I was born and grew up on the Urness farm, immediately west of the Vermont Lutheran Church – attended high school in Black Earth and graduated from St. Olaf college in 1949. I taught in Emmons, MN, where I met my husband's parents, Ed and Gena Gesme. His dad wrote Dean at Luther College in Decorah, and said to come home and meet the new teacher in Emmons. We were married the next summer and moved to Decorah where I worked at Luther while Dean finished his studies. We have lived in Cedar Rapids since 1958.

We have five grand children and five great grandchildren.. We have visited Norway many times, most recently in 1999, when we took our children and grandchildren on a pilgrimage to the places where our ancestors once lived.

I was one of those fortunate kids who grew up in a home with a resident grandmother, as well as another grandmother 2 miles down the road. The precious lessons and values they shared with me, as well as the wonderful stories of their childhood in Norwegian immigrant homes, provided me with a priceless heritage that led to a life-long interest in my roots. The end result of this was to write and publish four family histories, as well as BETWEEN ROCKS AND HARD PLACES, a comprehensive account of life in rural Norway during the early and middle 19th century.

My nephew, Jon Urness still lives on the Urness farm, and my mom, Emma Urness, was a member of the Sons of Norway Lodge in Mount Horeb. I have lots of Brager, Barsness, Urness and Dybdahl relatives still living in Wisconsin. Also, the Gesme family came to Wisconsin from Norway in the 1850s. When my husband's great grandparents retired they built a house on Main Street in Mount Horeb about 1894 – I think it is an insurance company now. Dean's grandpa moved to lowa. So we have lots of connections in the Mount Horeb area.

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Norge...Here We Come!

There are 43 people going on the **September 2017 Norway tour**!!! A reminder from Linda Mc Cormick at Borton Overseas Travel that final payments for any Lodge members who are traveling to Norway are due on July 5th.

Please refer to Linda's helpful suggestions for further travel purchases. Your local bank should be able to help you secure Norwegian kroner in advance of the trip. 850 Norwegian kroner equals roughly 100 US Dollars. Values fluctuate, but you can follow the latest exchange rates on-line.

• Credit card companies appreciate advance notice of travel outside of your normal area.



- Phone companies offer international calling plans, if you need to be connected while overseas.
- Lithium batteries are no longer allowed on some flights, so prepare for this in advance of your travel.

It could be a girl who hid messages in her instrument case, while going by bike to a violin lesson. It could be the fisherman down the street, rowing a boat full of grenades, with a German U-boat captain sitting on the seat which was hiding them. Many Norwegians risked their lives to thwart the Nazis who were occupying their country. These are their true stories.

If you haven't earned a SON literature cultural skills pin, this book is a great way to get started.
