



The mission of Sons of Norway is to promote and to preserve the heritage and culture of Norway, to celebrate our relationship with other Nordic Countries, and provide quality insurance and financial products to our members.

Lompe and lefse

Lefse is a soft flatbread that is a big part of Norwegian food heritage. Lefse is made out of potato, milk or cream (or lard) and flour, and cooked on a big hot slab called a griddle. You need special tools for lefse baking, long turning sticks and rolling pins, made from wood.

Lefse comes in several thicknesses, and is usually served with butter, cinnamon and sugar between the layers. Lefse is also traditionally served with lutefisk, you roll up the fish in the lefse. It's also served with sylte, a traditional Norwegian and Swedish Christmas bread spread, which you don't want to know about what really is, and I don't want to think about how it's made, because I eat it. You can also use lefse as a tortilla.


A special type of lefse is "lompe", a small and thin version of lefse which is rolled around a hot dog, in stead (or together with) the regular hot dog bun. This is the customary way to eat hot dogs in Norway, especially on 17th of May. You wrap your sausage in them together with ketchup and mustard,



and I personally think it's very strange that lomper is not something that have caught on in other countries. Sausage in a bun is good, and we do have buns in Norway too (very good if you want to put a lot of relish on your sausage), but lompe has a great taste that goes very well together with a sausage.

Pølse med Lompe

Follow recipe (below) for making Lomper, or Small Potato Cakes. Then use your favorite style of sausage, brat or hot dog for the filling. Grilled, boiled or fried- they all taste amazing on fresh lompe. Dress it up – add your typical brat or hot dog fixings. Try out something new--you could add sauerkraut, cole slaw or salsa.

Lomper – Small Potato Cakes

Ingredients

2 lbs. potatoes

1 tsp. salt

1 ¼ cups, approximate, barley flour

Step 1

Boil unpeeled potatoes. Peel, and twice grind, rice, or mash while still warm, until potatoes are smooth and elastic, thus requiring less flour. Add salt during this process, rather than adding it to the water, it increases the elasticity of the potatoes. The more elastic the potatoes, the better the lompe. Cool.

Step 2

Add flour to a small portion of potatoes at a time, stir just enough to make a firm, easily-handled dough. Making a lot of dough at once and leaving it stand may cause the dough to become sticky. Cut off slices with a sharp knife. Press these down lightly with the back of your hand, and finish rolling out with grooved rolling pin into 3-4" rounds. Doing it this way one requires less flour. Brush off all excess flour before baking.

Step 3

Place lompe on medium hot lefse or other griddle and turn often with a pliable spatula. Prick any bubbles that form while baking. When done, they should be light in color with large, brown spots.

Step 4

If the griddle is too hot, lomper will remain raw inside; if too low, they will be hard and tough. Allow them to dry out for a few minutes, then wrap in a clean towel and cover until ready to be served. They are tastiest when used immediately. They can be served with butter and sugar, or with sharp cheese. As for me, it will always be pølse med lompe. From Old Norse to Modern English

Scandinavia's influence is visible in many ways throughout our Sons of Norway communities, from our sometimes-controversial culinary traditions to our hearty work ethic and mischievous sense of humor. But even in parts of North America without strong ties to Norwegian heritage, there is still one area where the Norse influence has made its way to the mainstream: the English language.

Historically speaking, languages like Latin, French and German get most of the credit for providing the origins of modern English—but Old Norse played an important role too, and it can still be seen today. The following are just a few of the many words inherited from the Vikings that we use every day:

axle – from *öxull* (axis)
bug – from *búkr* (insect within tree trunks)
blunder – from *blundrai* (to stumble blindly)
bylaw – from *bylög* (village law)
glitter – from *glitra* (to glitter)
haggle – from *haggen* (to chop)
happy – from *happ* (good fortune / fate / chance)
likely – from *líkligr* (likely)
odd – from *oddi* (third number / casting vote)
rotten – from *rotinn* (decayed)
stammer – from *stemma* (to hinder / dam up)
thrift – from *þrift* (prosperity)
Thursday – from *Þorsdagr* (Thor's day)
ugly – from *uggligr* (repulsive)

A little in English...

Zain Got an Oscar in the Mail

The students at Breilia School in Hammerfest [Northern Norway] have a movie star in the classroom. His name is Zain Al Rafeea.

The parents are not bad people. They are poor. But the boy says that very poor people should not have so many children.

Zain Al Rafeea and his family came to Hammerfest in August 2018. After a few months he learned that he might receive an Oscar for being so good in the film. His whole class cheered when they heard the news.

One day Zain had been at a friend's. When he got home, he ran into the mailman. The mailman gave him a package. Inside the package was a gold statuette from the Young Academy Award for Breakthrough Performance Award.

"Youth Oscar"

The Young Academy Award is called the "Youth Oscar." Leonardo DiCaprio and Emma Watson have also received a "Youth Oscar." The gold statuette looks like an adult Oscar.

His father tells nrk.no that Zain was very happy. "He jumped for joy," says his father.

Now Zain will be in several movies. He dreams of going to Hollywood.

Zain's father says the family is doing very well in Hammerfest. He's happy about it.

"We want to share this award with all of Norway," says Ali Al Rafeea.
