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


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District 5 Virtual Walk Challenge to Ringsaker, Norway in celebration of the 125th Anniversary for 2020 Convention

Rosemaling and Mangle Boards

Speaking of Rosemaling (in above Cultural Skills list), several of our Wergeland members rosemal, or at least have tried it. Carol Stekel is working on a project to rosemal an unfinished mangle board (pictured below) that she purchased at the Decorah Nordic Fest a few years ago. When she saw that Norskedalen had a rosemaling class taught by Patsy Vork of Chetek, she and Annie Piske took the class. After the covid pandemic came, they were unable to take the second class. Carol says she would like to learn more about how to use the various brushes to their best use. It's a bit more complicated than one thinks, especially with shading and blending the colors, but a fun experience.

But, what IS a mangle board? Carol included the following, taken from the website mangleboard.com:

"The mangle board (sometimes called mangling board or smoothing board) is one of the most poignant and interesting objects of folk art, particularly but not exclusively Scan-

dinavian folk art. An ancestor of the iron and cousin of the laundry bat, this old domestic implement was used to press or smooth laundry, i.e., to remove the



Sons of Norway Sports Medal Awards Program

We have also awarded a number of Sports medals to Wergeland members. The next time we are together, both **Gary Knutson** and **Dave Glomstad** will receive medals for walking and biking respectively. The sports medals are earned in succession of Bronze, Silver, Gold, and Enamel. If a person continues after the Enamel, they begin with the Bronze again (at least that's how it HAS been....see below!). Therefore, Dave will be awarded the Bronze and Silver medals at our next gathering. Gary has recently earned his Enamel medal for walking.

- 2. **Skimerke** (shee-merk-eh) Cross-Country Skiing

- 5. Gangmerke (gahng-merk-eh) Walking

NEW award levels!

Recently, the Sons of Norway announced new levels of Sports Medals:



Idrettshelt [ee-dretts-hellt]—the sports hero pin—is the 5th level within any sports medal category. Earn the Idrettshelt pin by doubling the point or mileage value of the enamel level in that category.

<u>Hederspris</u> [hay-dersh-prees] —the outstanding achievement award—is for completing bronze, silver, gold and enamel levels in any three sports medal categories.



folds after washing. The mangle board was a single piece of carved wood (usually oak, beech or pine), used in conjunction with a kind of rolling pin (or roller) around which a damp material (towel, cloth, sheet, etc.) was tightly rolled. The person using the mangle board held the handle with her dominant hand, with the other hand

placed flat near the end of the board. The mangle board was then moved over the rolling pin in a back and forth movement, thereby smoothing the fabric." Volume 55, Issue 8 Page 7

A little in English...

Record number of students want to be nurses since pandemic

As many as 8.7 percent more people have applied for higher education this year. Now during the pandemic, almost every tenth applicant wants to become a nurse.

"This makes me happy," says the head of the Norwegian Nursing Association Lill Sverresdatter Larsen to forskning.no.

"Nurses are needed more than ever and there is a shortage of nurses both nationally and internationally. Nurses have proven to be tough as nails now that the profession has become even harder in recent weeks."

Coronavirus crisis underscores the health professions

Pia Cecilie Bing-Jonsson, the Vice Dean for Education at the Faculty of Health and Social Sciences at the University of Southeast Norway, believes that the high application numbers for health professions may be a result of the coronavirus pandemic.

"Nurses and other health workers have been in focus during the crisis and we can see that this leads to more people wanting to follow these lines of study. At the same time, many people now lack work and see that nurses and other health professions can offer fairly secure jobs in the future."

Many applied at the last minute

Something different about admissions this year is that as many as 24,702 applicants submitted their application at the last minute, that is, on the day of the deadline. There were 10,000 more than last year.

At Samordna [the Norwegian Universities and Colleges Admission Service], this is interpreted to mean that far more people now wish to have a plan B by seeking higher education in Norway. This year, applicants could choose from a total of 1,303 different studies at 27 universities and colleges.

Rekordmange vil bli sykepleiere under koronapandemien

Rekordmange vil bli sykepleiere under koronapandemien Hele 8,7 prosent flere har søkt høyere utdanning i år. Nå under pandemien vil nesten hver tiende søker bli sykepleier.

Koronakrisen viser fram helseyrkene

Pia Cecilie Bing-Jonsson, visedekan for utdanning ved Fakultet for helse- og sosialvitenskap på Universitetet i Sørøst-Norge, tror at de høye søkertallene til helseyrkene kan være et resultat av koronapandemien.

– Sykepleiere og andre helsearbeidere har stått i fokus under krisen og det ser vi kan føre til at flere ønsker å ta slike utdanninger. Samtidig er det nå mange som mangler arbeid og flere ser at sykepleier og andre helseyrker kan tilby ganske sikre arbeidsplasser i framtiden.



Mange har søkt i siste liten

Noe spesielt med opptaket i år er at hele 24 702 søkere sendte inn søknaden sin i siste liten, det vil si på den aller siste fristdagen. Det var 10 000 flere enn i fjor.

Hos Samordna opptak tolker man dette som at langt flere enn tidligere ønsker å ha en plan B ved å søke høyere utdanning i Norge.

Søkere kunne i år velge mellom hele 1303 ulike studier ved 27 universiteter og høyskoler.
