Odd Nansen & his Secret Diary

4 p.m. Sunday, February 14
Trinity Lutheran Church
504 S. Westnedge Ave. Kalamazoo

We look forward to seeing everyone on Sunday when Jean Darling will present a program on Odd Nansen that she prepared for us, based largely on the English translation of his critically-acclaimed book, *Fra dag til dag*.

Odd Nansen was the son of Fridtjof Nansen, the famous explorer, scientist, diplomat, humanitarian, and the 1922 Nobel Peace Prize laureate we learned about at a previous cultural program.

Like his father, Odd Nansen worked with refugees, establishing the Nansen Relief in 1936, an organization helping Jewish refugees escape from Nazi persecution. In 1942, Odd Nansen was arrested and placed in concentration camps in Norway and Germany for the duration of WWII. After the war, he published a diary he had managed to keep while imprisoned, *Fra dag til dag*. The English translation *From Day to Day* was published several years later.

One of the interesting aspects of Jean's presentation covers Tommy Buergenthal, a 10-year-old Jewish youth, who Odd Nansen befriended in the concentration camp.

Surprisingly, right now there is a resurgence of interest - in both Norway and America - in Nansen as well as his diary depicting the horrific details of day-to-day life and death in the concentration camps. Jean will also explore this development.

We will meet in the dining room (lower level) of Trinity Lutheran Church at 4 p.m. for the meeting. Please bring a dish to pass. Plates, cups, and eating utensils will be provided if you choose not to bring your own. Remember to bring your completed Support Hours forms to the February meeting.

Recently I was reading an article about ISIS or the Islamic State, the notorious organization that is causing so many problems in the Middle East today.

The writer was discussing historical nations or groups of peoples and how they compare to the ISIS of today. The writer suggested that one such comparison would be the German Nazis under Hitler in the 1930s and 1940s. No question, the German Nazis under Hitler were an evil people, causing untold destruction and deaths to millions of people.

After reading that newspaper article, I wondered, if, a thousand years ago, the peoples of Europe and Asia didn't think that the Vikings, our ancestors, were an evil people.

Where am I going with this article?

We should have pride in our ancestors and families. However, we should be mindful that our ancestors, like any tribe, nationality, or religious group had both a good side and a bad side. There are no perfect people on the globe.

The Viking Compass

Editors Note: Thor Lodge member Kecia Fagerland gave a historical and personal presentation at the November social.

Last year during our son Jack's cow (3rd year) year at West Point, he was trying to decide what stone to get for his class ring. Should he choose his birthstone? Should he get the same stone as his grandfather's West Point class ring? Representatives from Jostens, the company that makes the corps class rings, met with cadets to help them decide which stone is right for them. They discuss a stone or a gem's characteristics and history. Interestingly, Jack chose a stone that I was unaware of.

Iolite, also known as the Viking compass, has a property known as pleochroism. If you take a piece of clear iolite and cut it into a cube and look at it in different angles in sunlight it can appear to be four different colors. It can be clear, amber, light blue, and/or violet. This is determined by the angle of polarized light from the sun. This was used by the brilliant Viking navigators to find the sun on cloudy or foggy days or even when the sun had gone down below the horizon. It's no wonder that the Vikings were the first Europeans to land on North America - five hundred years before a certain Spaniard who gets all the credit.

Iolite is not a valuable gemstone. It's the poor man's sapphire, kind of like torsk is the poor man's lobster! It is found throughout the world with the largest mined in Wyoming.

Jack chose Iolite as a nod to his Nordic heritage and because of his interest in photonics – part of his electrical engineering studies. Thoughtfully, Jack gifted me with a mothers class ring pendant, so I got to have a little piece of iolite, too.

Trivia: Did you know that the tradition of class rings began at West Point? The United States Military Academy's class of 1835 was the first class to begin wearing the class ring.

Also, the class of 2016's rings are made from the metal of 35 prior graduates' donated class rings and steel from the World Trade Center
