- In a convention year (even years), Delegate election report due to District Secretary by March 5.

Delegate and convention information: Consider being a delegate to the 2016 District 5 Convention!

All across District 5, elections will be held in January and February as lodges elect their delegates and alternates for the District 5 convention. Some of your members may be sharing their experiences as delegates at your meetings so members are more aware of what happens at conventions, what their role is, and the experience they have had. To help new members and those without convention experience, here are some things to consider and share with your membership:

After December 31, I (Darlene) will get the final membership numbers for lodges. I will calculate how many delegates and alternates your lodge will need to elect. That information should be mailed to the Lodge President and Secretary (I'll also email it) by mid-January. The sooner I get it from the International Office, the faster I can get it to you.

Who can be a delegate or alternate?

• You do **NOT** have to be a benefit member to serve as a delegate to the District Convention.

• Current District 5 Board members cannot serve as delegates for their local lodges.

Time Requirements

- The District 5 Convention is June 22-25 in Marshfield, Wisconsin (middle of the state).
- Your delegates may be asked by the District President to serve on a committee. This would require them to attend committee meetings on the Thursday morning and afternoon (or until committee work is done and the committee is dismissed).
- I don't have the schedule but usually the first official business and seating of the delegates is on Friday morning and all delegates need to be in all sessions Friday and Saturday.
- As times and schedules are finalized, watch the District 5 website (<u>www.sonsofnorway5.com</u>) and future mailings for schedules and timelines.

What does a delegate do?

- Represents and speaks on behalf of your lodge on District business, resolutions, proposed changes
- Accepts your lodge's recognition and awards
- Attends all delegate sessions, zone meeting (Saturday noon) and votes on behalf of your lodge
- May serve on a committee if asked to by the District President
- A delegate is the only member (along with current District 5 Board Members) that can run for the District Board (<u>if a benefit member</u> or if they purchase a benefit product at the convention).
- A delegate can run for a delegate spot for the International Convention (week of August 22-28) in Tacoma, WA, <u>if they are a benefit member</u> or if they purchase a benefit product at the convention.
- Learn about Sons of Norway by attending workshops, visiting displays and visiting with other members
- Bring back many ideas, activities and enthusiasm that will benefit your lodge
- Report to your lodge about what they learned, business conducted and report on elections held at the convention
- Have a wonderful time and go home ready to carry out the mission of Sons of Norway!

What is a Benefit Member? What is a Benefit Member? Someone who owns a benefit product which includes: Nordic Elite, a term product, Viking 23, Viking Voyager, Annuities (\$2,000 minimum), Whole Life, and Single Premium Whole Life.

How do you pay for delegates? Each lodge handles this differently. Many will help the delegates with convention costs, registration, travel and hotel costs in varying amounts, paying it in full, or a portion. Some lodges will have a special fundraiser or event to raise money for delegate expenses.

The room rate is \$109 for two beds (sleeps 4) or king (sleeps 2), \$119 for studio suites and \$129 for two room suites. The committee has been meeting with the hotel staff, lodge members and other resource people and are making these suggestions and information.

- 10. Entertainment possibilities are being explored. They need more information about conducting a raffle. They will have a room similar to the 2014 Chicago Room.
- 11. They are looking for cultural class options
- 12. The total facility rent from Wednesday Sunday is \$500. Guest rooms will be held until one month prior to convention date.
- 13. All coffee is complementary. They had prices for lemonade, iced tea and soda.

There was a motion that the 2016 District Lodge Meeting will be \$65 and include Friday lunch and Saturday lunch, four coffee breaks, and registration materials. 2nd. Motion passed.

Report from Judy Ghastin on January 16, 2016 to the District 5 Board to share with others:

It's time to start thinking about the 2016 Sons of Norway District 5 convention. Come as a delegate or an attendee. There will be activities, classes, and presentations available for all.

Delegates, there will be opportunities for you to take a class, enjoy a round of golf or listen to a few presentations on the days before business begins. Bring your family for an extended weekend vacation where they, along with other attendees, can enjoy the same pre-business opportunities.

On Wednesday there will be a single day rosemaling class, a wire weaving class, and plans are in progress for a genealogy class. Other classes may be added soon. In addition there will be a three-day rosemaling class during which participants can work toward their cultural medal in rosemaling.

Calling all golfers! The golf outing is being arranged at a local golf course for Wednesday. Practice your putting skills and get ready to enjoy an afternoon of golf.

There will be a schedule of daily presentations during the District Lodge business meetings for the

benefit of attendees. Presentations range from informational to entertaining and will be offered throughout the day both Friday and Saturday.

The silent auction will be on display in the meeting room and will be available to attendees between business sessions. Keep checking your favorite items and at the same time help raise funds for the district. You are encouraged to bring something for the silent auction.

Become a Viking during the 2016 convention by attending the Thursday night festivities. Enjoy a Viking Feast Thursday evening with a menu similar to what was available for celebrating in Viking days. Afterward, through the use of modern technology, learn how a longhouse was built. Top off the night with a storyteller recounting tales from the Sagas around the open fire in the courtyard.

Friday night dinner is on your own with an option of burgers and pizza at the hotel before heading off to a park for an evening of Kubb. No reservations are needed for this meal.

Both Friday and Saturday mornings the traditional walk-a-thon will take place. The course winds through a nearby park with a local guide to show the way. The walk-a-thon offers some good exercise and helps raise funds for district activities. The early morning workout ends in time for delegates to prepare for the business meeting.

After two days of serious business it will be time to honor the outgoing and incoming District 5 officers and directors at the installation ceremony followed by the banquet. Bring your bunad to wear for this festive occasion.

Throughout 2015, Sons of Norway lodges and districts have been tracking activities, volunteer hours and monies by signing on to the website, www.FraternalsGive.org. Sons of Norway is compiling this data to quantify the fantastic work our lodges do in support of their members and communities. Submissions made using the paper form will be combined with totals submitted on the website and will be published in the Sons of Norway Annual Report in the spring of 2016. Sons of Norway also provides totals to the American Fraternal Alliance (AFA), who sponsor the site. They find these reports essential when defending the right of fraternal benefit societies to operate as tax-exempt businesses.

Sons of Norway launched this website for its lodges to use in the fall of 2014. A series of webinars were held for lodge and district officers, new paper forms were designed and mailed out to lodges, and articles about fraternalsgive.org and the new paper forms were featured in several issues of the Viking Resource.

As of October 2015, a total of 53 lodges, 14% of our lodge count, have entered activities on the site, with the average lodge reporting a total of 24 activities. These lodges have reported a total of 1,300 events and 39,680 volunteer hours in 2015.

Fraternalsgive.org Reporting Lodge Hours and Events

This is a new tool to help them track events, hours and funds that their lodges devote to membership and community activities. Sons of Norway reports this information to the American Fraternal Alliance (AFA), who uses it to campaign for the rights of fraternal benefit societies.

In 2015, lodges who do all their reporting on www.fraternalsgive.org will not have to add up their totals on page 2 of the Lodge Achievement Form at the end of the year. The number of events and hours will be automatically downloaded from the site by the AFA and by Sons of Norway Headquarters.

You will see a link that says "NEW! - Click here to view two video demos of how to use FraternalsGIVE.org." To make the videos full screen, click the little box at the bottom right hand of the video screen.

Detailed directions on how to use the site are available for download from the membership area of www.sonsofnorway.com, along with new paper forms for the lodge secretaries and individual members.

Q. What if our lodge secretary doesn't have internet access? A. Another officer or an assistant can access the site and enter data on their behalf. If your lodge has a Volunteer Coordinator, this can be a part of their regular duties.

Q. If my lodge uses www.fraternalsgive.org, do we still need to fill out the Lodge Achievement Form at the end of 2015? A. Yes, but not all of it. You will be able to skip the AFA report, which is on page 2.

Q. Does the lodges Treasurer still have to report the Fraternal and Community amounts on the D17 Financial Statement? A. Yes. Though some money is tracked on www.fraternalsgive.org, Sons of Norway will still require that information on the D17 Financial Statement.

Q. My lodge is very big and we have events that happen on a daily basis. For example, every day several members volunteer to work together in our restaurant. Do I have to make a separate activity for each day? A. For activities that occur once a week or more, you can add up the number of volunteers and hours and just report create one activity for the whole month.

Q. Can individual members use the site to report their volunteer hours? A. No. The website is to be used only by a lodge officer. There is a new paper form that lodge secretaries can give to members who want to record their volunteer hours outside of an event setting.

Q. Are there still paper forms available? A. Yes. There are new paper forms for the secretary to keep and new paper forms to be handed out to individual members. Lodges that don't use fraternalsgive.org will still need to add up their totals at the end of the year to file on page 2 of their Lodge Achievement Forms.

Q. Where can I get the paper forms? A. Paper forms and directions have been emailed and mailed out to all lodge secretaries. They can now be downloaded from the membership area of www.sonsofnorway.com, or you can call Membership Services for a copy.

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

Cultural Skills Program

Each unit consists of three levels of skill-specific activities that can be completed on your own, or as part of a lodge group or class. For each level, you'll complete a few activities, email (or mail) them in to Sons of Norway Headquarters, get feedback, and earn a pin in recognition of your accomplishments.

When you complete part 1 of your first unit you'll receive a Cultural Skills pin, a skill bar and a level 1 bar. You'll receive additional level bars when you complete parts 2 and 3 of that skill, and new skill bars when you complete level 1 of a new skill.

The Cultural Skills Program covers a wide variety of subjects, ranging from Norwegian cooking to music appreciation. Each unit is designed to provide skill-specific activities at the beginner, intermediate and advanced levels to foster learning and advancement with each newly acquired skill.

Sports Medals

The Sons of Norway Sports Medal Program rewards you for four different levels of achievement: Bronze, Silver, Gold and Enamel. Here's how to earn your pins:

- Work through the Sports Medal Program of your choice in a sequence, beginning with the bronze pin.
- The requirements for each level should be met within 365 days.
- As you engage in your selected activity, log the time or distance on your record card.
- If you achieve a level in less time, you can immediately begin working on the requirements for the next level of the sequence.
- You must start at zero every time you begin earning points for your next pin. Idrettsmerke - General Fitness

(ee-dretts-merk-eh)

The idrettsmerke is the Sports Medal Program's general sports and fitness pin that rewards a variety of activities. Any activity can count towards an idrettsmerke, so if you don't see your activity of choice on the card, contact your Sports Director to create a program that accommodates to your activity.

Skimerke - Skiing

(shee-merk-eh)

The skimerke is the Sports Medal Program's cross-country skiing pin. Cross-country skiing, a sport introduced to North America by Nordic immigrants, is a way to enjoy the outdoors during the cold winter months.

Svømmemrke – Swimming

(svum-uh-merk-eh)

The svømmemerke is the Sports Medal program's swimming pin. Flutter kick, freestyle, back crawl and breaststroke can all propel you through the water and towards a bronze, silver, gold or enamel pin.

Sykkelmerke - Biking

(sick-el-merk-eh)

The sykkelmerke is the Sports Medal Program's bicycling pin. If you cycle indoors or outdoors for recreation, transportation or competition, use that effort over the year to earn a pin.

Gangmerke - Walking

(gahng-merk-eh)

The gangmerke is the Sports Medal Program's walking pin. On average it takes 2000 steps to walk a mile – log every mile you walk because each step brings you closer to earning a pin.

District 5 Viking Traveling Chest

The Traveling Viking Chest is in the possession of the zone directors. The zone director will take the Chest to their lodge meetings. Each lodge should make a reservation with the zone director. It is suggested that each lodge add one new item to the box, and a written description, as their rent. Eventually, the box will fill up, at which point I will make another box. We will then split the box and

have two traveling Viking chests. Hopefully the Traveling Viking Chest will inspire lodges to add beautiful crafts or objects to the chest. Each time the chest is opened it will be different because the contents keep changing and increasing.

Zone 3 has it from October 15, 2015 – April 2016. We should develop a schedule for who wants it what months. Coordinate with zone directors

From Madison via Interstate:

Go east from Madison going towards Chicago on the Interstate 39-90. Exit 147 on Hwy N and turn right. Go about 2-3 miles and you will come to a 4-way stop. Turn left on Skaalen Road and go about 1 ½ miles. We are the first long drive way on the left after you pass the housing development. We have a Norwegian farm sign at the end of the driveway.

From Madison via Hwy 51:

Go south on Hwy 51 from Madison, through McFarland and almost to Stoughton. Before you get to town, take a left on Hwy B by the Evergreen State Bank. Stay on Hwy B until you come to the 4-way stop sign at Hwy B and Hwy N (the county garage will be on your left). Go straight and the road turns into Skaalen Rd. Go about 1 ½ miles. We are the first long drive way on the left after you pass the housing development. We have a Norwegian farm sign at the end of the driveway.

From Oregon: (2 options)

✓ Come to Stoughton on Hwy 138. You can go all the way through town on Main Street and continue out of town on Hwy 51. After about 1 ½ miles, turn left on Pleasant Hill Road. Come to a t-intersection with Skaalen Rd, take a right and we're the first long drive way to the left. We have a Norwegian farm sign at the end of the driveway. ✓ Or when you come into Stoughton on Hwy 138, take a left on Hwy 51. Go out to Hwy B and take a right on Hwy B (by Evergreen State Bank). Stay on Hwy B until you come to the 4-way stop sign at Hwy B and Hwy N (the county garage will be on your left). Go straight and the road turns into Skaalen Rd. Go about 1 ½ miles. We are the first long drive way on the left after you pass the housing development. We have a Norwegian farm sign at the end of the driveway.

From the South (Janesville):

Come west towards Madison on the Interstate 39-90. Exit 159 at Coachman's Golf Club and Hwy 51. Go about 2 miles and take a right on Pleasant Hill Road. Come to a t-intersection with Skaalen Rd, take a right and we're the first drive way to the left. We have a Norwegian farm sign at the end of the driveway.
