Hello Lodges -

Please read and share the following 4 items via email to your lodge:

- 1. Photos for consideration in the Viking Magazine are due to D5 Publicity Director (Karen Eberhardt) on Thursday, June 10, 2020. I welcome your photos showing how your lodge and your members are celebrating their Norwegian heritage during our challenging times.
- 2. Or do you have story to share of what your lodge and members to celebrate their Nordic heritage? Is your lodge doing something different that you can share with other lodges? Email me your event so we can share the idea with other lodges.
- 3. Your Scandinavian photo can be part of a deck of Nordic playing cards, which Sons of Norway District 5 will be making available for purchase in time for the 2020 Christmas season.

To enter, you can submit up to five of your best Nordic photos, so the district can choose which photos are best for the playing card deck. **Deadline is July 5, 2020.**

Each lodge which participates will have at least one card in the deck. If every lodge in the district participates, we will be able to fill almost the entire deck with one card per lodge.

The winner's name and lodge will be printed at the bottom of the card. Winners will receive a deck of Nordic cards, plus a special certificate. There will also be special "People's Choice" awards.

Some subject areas to consider:

- 1.) landscapes or scenery
- 2.) transportation including railroads, highways and bridges
- 3.) people and cultural events
- 4.) museums, churches, government and historical buildings
- 5.) folk creatures (trolls, nisse, etc.) (for use as Jokers)

Because "portrait" (tall and not wide) photos will be used on the playing cards, not "landscape" (wide and not tall), consider this in how you select photos to enter in this contest.

Rules:

1.) You must be a up-to-date Sons of Norway member in District 5.

2.) You must have taken the photos in a Scandinavian country.

3.) Up to five photos may be submitted.

4.) Photos can be digital or print. Digital photos should be a resolution of at least one MB or larger, and 300 dpi or higher). Submit digital images via email in JPEG format. Use a separate email for each picture you enter.

5.) Print photos can also be submitted by mail as a physical 5 X 7 copy of the photo. (A digital image is preferred vs. physical photograph.)

6.) After your submission, the photo will be cropped for the aspect ratio (0.566) needed for a

playing card. This will be done by the district, and the cropped photo will be emailed to you for approval.

7.) You may also submit your photos in the 0.566 aspect ratio, if you wish. (At 300 dpi, the digital image will be 857 pixels wide x 1507 high.)

8.) A lower resolution version of your photo will be put on the District 5 website, so a "People's Choice" vote can be done.

9.) Submit a short write-up (3 to 5 sentences) to accompany each photo, to explain the subject of each photo.

10.) Your entry must be postmarked or emailed by July 5, 2020, 12:59 PM.

11.) The winners will be selected based by the "People's Choice" voting on the District 5 website, as well as by the District 5 Photo Contest Committee.

This highly affordable unit is sold for approximately \$200. Jonas credits his family his father and grandfather as well as his mother for his creativity, perseverance, ingenuity and grit. Also, he used his study of his Norwegian roots to inspire him to pivot to help fight COVID-19.

RE: "Ingebretsen's of Minneapolis Damaged"

Ingebretsen's Scandivania Gifts of Minneapolis was one of the 360 businesses in the Twin Cities that was damaged during the protest/riot following the George Floyd killing.

The online June 3rd edition of the Minneapolis Star Tribune listed all 360 businesses that were damaged, 66 businesses were completely destroyed. The businesses were concentrated in the Lake Street area of Minneapolis and the Midway area of Saint Paul.

The article said Ingebretsen's, which is located at 1601 East Lake Street, had broken windows and possible interior damage and looted.

The International Headquarters of the Sons of Norway is located at 1455 West Lake Street. Currently, a new building is being constructed at this site. The article, fortunately, reported no damage to the Sons of Norway building. However, businesses just a few blocks away were damaged.

Ingebretsen's website had the following message:

"We have closed all store operations for the next few days, for the safety of our staff, customers and neighbors.

Our beloved Twin Cities is experiencing a gigantic collective loss. Our own Lake Street community, a beautiful, diverse and loving community of hard working families, will survive and heal. Thanks for your support as we move forward together.

Love from our family to yours." Curtis



MIDSUMMER CELEBRATIONS IN NORWAYhttp://www.norwaypost.no/culture/10053-



The evening of June 23rd is celebrated as Midsummernight Eve in Norway, also named 'St.Hans Aften' or Jonsok-kveld', depending on where you are in the country. Huge bonfires are burned as part of the celebrations. St. Hans or Jonsok both reveal that the festival has been named after St. John the Baptist, as the 24th is his birthday according to the Festival Calendar of the pre-reformation Church.

As with so many of the church festivals, it was introduced in order to replace an old heathen festival on that same date, thought to be the Summer Solstice, or the longest day of the year.

In Norway, the evening is celebrated with partying, good food, music and dancing, and the burning of huge bonfires. The burning of bonfires hass of course survived from heathen times, when it was believed that the fire had special cleansing powers, and was also used to drive away evil powers, witches included.

Medical herbsalso had special powers at Midsummernight, and so did water. Dew that fell on that night was believed to have healing properties, particularly for ailments of the eyes.

Midsummernight Eve was a public holiday in Norway until 1771, and has as a matter of fact survived as a day off in several communities to this day.

Norwegians and Danes celebrate the coming of summer on the 23rd of June every year on a day they call "**Sankt Hans Aften**" which directly translates to Saint John's Eve, historically named to celebrate the birth of religious figure, John the Baptist (who was born six months before Jesus Christ on the 24th). Over the years, Sankt Hans Aften/Midsummer has been closely observed with the association to powerful forces of nature. In earlier days, medical herbs were thought to have the best effect if collected on the evening of midsummer and witches (symbolically crafted figures thought to have derived from German craftsmen in 1860s who were visiting Kalundborg in Denmark at the time) were burned over a bonfire with a purpose only to ward away evil spirits.

While in Denmark, many of the bonfire celebrations happen in lakes or coastside, Norway's vast landscape makes for a scenic celebration that usually takes place along the coast or up in the mountains. The Norwegians take their bonfires so seriously, that in 2010 residents in Alesund, Norway built the world's biggest bonfire to commemorate the occasion.

Newer celebration rituals for midsummer to complement the bonfires, include singing the customary Midsummer song in Denmark, "Vi elsker vort land" (We love our country), written by Danish poet Holger Drachmann in 1885. So, when you find yourself in a Danish or Norwegian city over midsummer, be sure to bring a blanket, a chair and some of your favourite drinks to a local bonfire (and take a copy of the <u>lyrics</u> along to make sure you've got the full spirit in hand). Some time around late evening (from 8 PM – 10 PM), celebrations usually start with a speech and then lighting of the bonfire. But should you find yourself in rain, there shall be no burning possible and the old folklore goes without saying: "The fewer hazelnuts will grow". So let's pray for hazelnuts in our morning muesli and cross your fingers for sunshine.

Leadership Roles

INTRODUCTION

The Sons of Norway Foundation is dedicated to preserving and promoting Norwegian heritage and culture, and providing assistance to Sons of Norway members, lodges and communities. The lodge Foundation Director focuses on helping the Foundation fulfill its mission at the local level.

STRUCTURE OF THE FOUNDATION

The Sons of Norway Foundation (U.S.) was established in 1966 and has a 501 (c) (3) tax exempt status in the United States.

The Foundation is governed by a Board of Governors that operates separate from the International Board. Governors are appointed through an application process.

(Note: In 1971 the Sons of Norway Foundation in Canada was formed under the authority of the Canada Corporations Act. While both Foundations have similar goals, their structures, governance and administration are quite difference, reflecting the tax laws of their respective countries. This section of the Guide for Leadership is directed toward Foundation Directors in the United States. Foundation Directors in Canadian lodges should contact the President of the Canadian Foundation for guidance in performing their duties and responsibilities.)

RESPONSIBILITIES

The lodge Foundation Director is responsible for promoting the Foundation and for helping the Foundation grow financially. Specifically, the Director is charged with:

- 1. Promoting the Foundation to the members and the community, increasing awareness of the Foundation and its value as a benefit of membership.
- 2. Providing information on available scholarships and grants, including application procedures, deadlines and application requirements.
- 3. Helping the Foundation grow financially by educating members regarding donations, annual pledges and legacy gifts.
- Referring those who express an interest in legacy giving to the Sons of Norway Foundation Director, as well as informing the Director of their interest.
- Focusing the lodge's attention on the Foundation in October (Foundation month) by organizing informational, promotional and fundraising activities in recognition of Foundation Month (consider joint efforts with the Social Director).



6. Assisting members and lodge leadership in accessing Foundation information on the Sons of Norway website.
