Joint Meeting with Askeladden, Sonja Henie, & Sognefjord Lodges Sunday, January 9 2 p.m. (online) The Way North

Dive into Norway's WWII history as the grandchildren of NRAF Pilot, Norm Midthun, retrace his steps 71 years after he piloted Crown Prince Olav on his 1945 post-war, victory tour of Norway.

When Minnesota-born, Norwegian American Norm Midthun graduated high school early and wanted to join the war effort, he was too young for the American military. After lying about his age, however, he found the Royal Norwegian Air Force was happy to have him. He left the midwestern United States for the first time by rail to an airbase in Toronto: Little Norway. This is where he would learn how to fly and how to speak Norwegian before being sent overseas. Norm spent the remainder of the war assisting the Norwegian resistance movement flying a PBY Catalina sea plane.

Crown Prince Olav V escaped the German occupation of Norway in April, 1940, and went on to lead the war effort in exile. When he returned to Norway five years to the day later, he needed to assess the damages of his ravaged homeland. For this, the Crown Prince needed a pilot, and the young American, Norm Midthun, was chosen.

The Crown Prince's damage assessment tour quickly evolved into a morale-boosting, celebratory movement that marked the beginning of a new stage in Norwegian history. From Kirkenes to Oslo, as Norm flew the Crown Prince from fjord to fjord down the coast, he absorbed an array of stories and emotions along the way.

In 2016, Norm's family discovered their 92-year-old grandfather's scrapbook which they had never before seen, with its details of his extensive tour. This sparked an adventure of a lifetime. They venture to Norway to visit the stops of the Crown Prince Tour, interview locals, and recreate the photos from the scrapbook. Through this quest, they discover their family history and their own way north.

Note: We will gather online at 2 p.m. Sunday, January 9, for a few minutes of greeting each other, and then watch the 75-minute documentary, *The Way North*. After the film, Askeladden Lodge will conduct a brief business meeting to install our 2022 officers.

Looking Back

Thirty years ago, January 1992, Scott Erickson was the lodge president, having succeeded Myrtle Beinhauer. The lodge met at 4 p.m. on the first Sunday of the month at the Masonic Temple. At this meeting, the cultural program was presented by two members of the Dyresen family. First, Megan Dyresen, a Portage Northern High School student, talked about her experience at a youth camp in Norway, made possible by a Sons of Norway Foundation scholarship. Second, Dyre Dyresen, Megan's grandfather, retired professor at Andrews University, talked about his "Norwegian Connection."

Twenty-five years ago, January 1997, Curt Osborn was the lodge president. The lodge met at 4 p.m., the first Sunday of the month, at the Portage Senior Center. For the cultural program, members talked about their "Christmas Memories" when they were young. The newsletter had a 2-page essay by Pearl Ingebritson on her Christmas Memories.

Twenty years ago, January 2002, Orlin Loen was the lodge president. The lodge met at 4 p.m. on the second Sunday of the month at the Portage Senior Center. At this meeting, the item of the highest interest was the Norway Trip Drawing, where the winner received two round-trip tickets to Norway. Pearl Ingebritson won the drawing. Besides the drawing and the installation of the officers, the members watched a video on "Norwegian Food."

Fifteen years ago, January 2007, Dennis Darling was installed as the new lodge president, succeeding Orlin Loen. The meetings were at 4 p.m., the second Sunday of the month, at the Portage Senior Center. Again, the big interest at this meeting was the Norway Trip drawing. Helen Cassetto and Holly Jensen were the two winners, each receiving two round-trip tickets to Norway. Louise Adams presented the cultural program on "Rosemaling."

Ten years ago, January 2012, Joyce Hare was the lodge president. Meetings were scheduled at 4 p.m., the second Sunday of the month, at the Portage Senior Center. At this meeting, Svein Thoen gave the cultural program "Norwegian Sports." The next month, the newsletter editor, Joan O'Bryan, wrote the following: "Every so often, we are presented with a cultural program that leaves me filled with pride because I'm lucky enough to be born of Norwegian heritage. Who could know that January's program, with the unassuming title "Norwegian Sports" - essentially a program on skiing - would be such a program? To hear all that was accomplished on skies through the stories that Svein Thoen shared with us was amazing!"

Five years ago, January 2017, Curtis Cleveland was the lodge president. The lodge met at 4 p.m, the second Sunday of the month, at Trinity Lutheran Church. (Later in the year, the starting time of the meetings was changed from 4 p.m. to 2 p.m.) At this meeting, besides the installation of the officers, the lodge, after a one-hour discussion, adopted the new revised guidelines for the Norway Trip Drawing. Members watched a video "Robert Asp and the Hjemkomst Viking Ship."

Reflections on Winter, Wood-Burning, and White Pine

Last winter I discovered the Norwegian poet, Olav Hauge, and I turned to his book of collected poems, The Dream We Carry, for

inspiration on woodstoves and winter.

Winter Morning / Vintermorgon

When I woke this morning, the panes were frosted over,

from a wood block it had enjoyed the whole night.

frå ein kubbe han hadde godna seg med um natti. This link provides an excellent essay on the life and poetry of Hauge with excerpts and discussions of some of his famous poems.

Olav Håkonson Hauge - LJODAHÅTT (ljodahatt.com) "Like Robert Frost, Olav Hauge led a solitary life and wrote poetry in a country side in the western part of Norway. He was born in 1908 and lived all his life on what he could produce from three acres of

ground" where he lived until he was 86 years old.

For the past dozen years, our woodstove has been our prime source of winter heat and its friendly warmth does give us a glow of well-being when the winter winds howl outside.

My husband was a forester and last week I found a book our dad had given David for Christmas in 2002:

Lumberjack: Inside an Era in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan by William S. Crowe (goodreads.com). In this 50th Anniversary edition of Crowe's book, I'm learning about lumbering in Michigan when "White Pine was King" from the author's first-hand account of his experiences as a

lumberjack more than one hundred years ago. Norwegian-Americans brought their woodsman skills to Michigan's logging camps, rivers, and mills and Crowe's book is a fascinating glimpse into the lives of our hardy ancestors.

Norwegian-Americans were prevalent among those

who harvested Michigan's millions of forested acres. According to the editors'




Snow-covered White Pine

notes in Crowe's Lumberjack, "Michigan's original forest covered 35 million of the state's 38 million acres" and one quarter of that was white pine... "By the end of the lumbering era, Michigan loggers will have cut 161 billion board feet of pine logs, and 50 billion board feet of hardwoods....in dollar value, Michigan lumber will outvalue all the gold extracted from California by a billion dollars" (pp 115.) planning to head back to the almost 50 acres of awesome giant white pine near Grayling later this winter to snowshoe and cross-country ski and explore the logging museum at Hartwick Pines.
