In the past few decades, reality competition shows seem to have taken over TV viewing. *Survivor, The Apprentice, American Idol...* Chances are that you've watched at least one episode. Let's be honest, chances are that, during the pandemic, you binge-watched entire series! But are you caught up with *Alt for Norge*?

*Alt for Norge* ("everything for Norway") is more than the royal motto of Norway. Launched in 2010, it's a reality show that has taken Norway by storm! The copycats in Sweden and Denmark have also launched their own versions.

Each season sees a handful of Norwegian-Americans compete with one another (both as teams and individually) to demonstrate who is the "most Norwegian" by completing a series of challenges while learning more about their Norwegian ethnicity. It gives Norwegians a chance to see their country through American eyes. The grand prize is the chance for the winning American to be reunited with his or her Norwegian family.

It manages to be entertaining and educational in equal parts. It is also quite addictive - perfect for binge-watching. The first ten seasons are available on YouTube; the earliest seasons are even available with English subtitling. Subsequent seasons were put on hold by the pandemic, but casting for Season 11 has just concluded meaning that we'll all soon have another chance to live vicariously as we watch our fellow Norwegian-Americans compete for the chance to meet their relatives in Norway.

Elizabeth Kraatz will give us a crash-course on the show at our April meeting so that we're up-to-speed and ready to cozy up to the TV with a bowl of popcorn (or rømmegrøt) when episode 1 drops!

#### Sleeping Bear and the Iditarod's Norwegian Heroes

A few weeks ago, I traveled to northwest lower Michigan for some explorations with my sister on Old Mission and Leelanau Peninsulas. We met my son, Dan, for some *friluftsliv* time hiking in Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore. First, we did an up and down hike through the woods with a few inches of recent snow for awesome views of Glen Lake and Lake Michigan. Next, we did a short hike over the dunes for a walk along the Lake Michigan shoreline. We had good views of the pair of sleeping bear cubs – the Manitou Islands. Native American legend has it that the cubs drowned within sight of shore after swimming across the lake from Wisconsin to escape a forest fire. Their mother's shape can be seen as one of the large sand dunes. sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore (U.S. National Park Service) (nps.gov)

The Alaskan Iditarod is a winter event that many of us follow who love winter sports so I was delighted when I recently happened upon an autobiography by DeeDee Jonrowe, *Iditarod Dreams: A Year in the Life of Alaskan Dog Sled Racer, Dee Jonrowe*. She spent her adult life raising Iditarod dogs with her husband and has competed in an amazing 32 Iditarod races and completed 29 of them with 16 top-ten finishes and was runner-up three times.

The Inspiring Story of DeeDee Jonrowe - A Life of Dogs. DeeDee overcame tragic obstacles including the devastation of the 2016 Sockeye Fire which destroyed her Willow, Alaska, family home of 30 years. She also persisted in her year-round training and competition in spite of breast cancer diagnosis and treatment.

After reading the graphic account of DeeDee Jonrowe's year of intense dog-training and competition, I wondered if any Norwegian had ever won the Alaskan Iditarod. A quick search led me to the accomplishments of legendary Norwegian musher, Robert Sorlie, who has been racing for more than 50 years. Known as "King of Femundlopet," he has run that Norwegian dog sled race 30 times and won his 12<sup>th</sup> victory in 2018. He also has three Finnmarkslopet wins.

Sorlie ran his first Iditarod in 2002, placing 9<sup>th</sup>, and then had an astonishing win in 2003. His strategy was different from all the other competitors. He took shorter rests and raced at a slower pace but did "monster long runs" and surged ahead to never look back. He brought the same dog team back to Alaska and won again in 2005. He said the most important thing in running sled dogs is "to have positive thoughts and good energy; it will spread like rings in your team and the dogs will do the best they can. Trying to motivate them to do a job for you. To keep them enjoying it the most, that is what dog mushing is about." Since Sorlie's win in 2005, more Norwegians have won the Iditarod. Norwegian Joar Leifseth Ulsom was the third international-born musher, and second Norwegian, to win the Iditarod in 2018. Norway's Ulsom finally adds name to Iditarod winner's list | Reuters A third Norwegian won it in 2020. Norwegian musher Thomas Waerner wins Iditarod XLVIII - Iditarod

#### Barnehage on the move

Pre-schoolers in Norway are some of the most hardy and adventurous kids around. Each weekday, kids in barnehage are prepared for anything the weather can throw their way.

Growing up in the rugged countryside and even in cities, kids experience friluftsliv at a young age, braving the elements wearing

tiny safety vests with their care providers.

Around 400 Norwegian daycare centers go on daily adventure outings with their 11,000 charges. The hope, according to Kristin Oftedal of the Norwegian Trekking Association, is that they "learn skills and attitudes that they can carry with them for their whole lives."

"We believe outdoor children are happy children," she adds.

The aim is to teach children simple and nature-friendly ways to be outside together, play, experience, wonder, explore and learn about nature. Oftedal says



that she hopes this practice will produce a new generation of nature lovers.
