#### 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Sons of Norway Hockey Team

*Curtis Cleveland, Lodge Historian* Ten years ago the lodge took action to become a sponsor of a local adult hockey team.

At the time, lodge member Branson Feringa had recently organized a team as part of the Kalamazoo Adult Hockey League. Brandon asked lodge president Orlin Loen for lodge sponsorship of his team, which he wanted to call the Sons of Norway Hockey Team.

That summer, the lodge approved the sponsorship of the team, selecting the uniform for the team as well. The July 2012 issue of the *Viking* magazine has a picture of Brandon Feringa wearing the uniform.

In the September 2011 newsletter, Orlin wrote: "For Norwegians that have a long history of participating in

winter sports it seems natural that our Lodge would be interested in sponsoring a hockey team."

Currently, Patrick Skinner is the coach of the Sons of Norway team for the 2020-21 season, the 10<sup>th</sup> season. Pat, a member of the team since it was organized, has coached the team since the 2017-18 season.

Prior to Pat's leadership, Tom Schripsema led the team for the first two years, 2011-13; Terry Pingel followed, leading the team for four years, 2013-17.

Besides Brandon Feringa, lodge member Nathan Varga, grandson of Fred and Chris

Sitkins, was a member of the Sons of Norway Hockey Team.

The hockey games of the Kalamazoo Adult Hockey League, which are open to the public and free, are usually played on Friday nights at Wings West (Just north of I-94, exit 72). If you are not familiar with this place, besides the ice rinks, it has an excellent bar and restaurant.

A few weeks ago, I attended one of the games featuring the Sons of Norway team. They won, skating extremely well. I was surprised by the number of spectators, more than I have seen in prior years.

## Fra Presidenten God Påske! God Våren!

When I think of the happy Easters and springs of my own childhood, I have fond memories from the 1950's of a new dress, hat and little white gloves for church on Easter Sunday after my sister and I had colored hardboiled eggs and found our hidden baskets with jelly beans, chocolate eggs and chocolate bunnies. One of our favorite spring events was Baby Animal Day when we visited all the MSU farms to see the newborn lambs, calves, piglets, foals, and baby chicks.

Norwegians today celebrate the spring Easter season with colored eggs, chocolate treats, and family meals. Many often enjoy a week at their cabins in the mountains for one last week of skiing similar to my own Wisconsin son and family who spent a few days skiing in northern Michigan last week.

Another Norwegian Easter tradition is apparently the enjoyment of crime novels and films. Read more via the Sons of Norway link InfoBank\_220.5.13.pdf

Easter in Norway was not always such a pleasant time although families found joyful ways to celebrate. I asked our new Cultural Director, Astrid Willis, who grew up in Oslo, to share some of her Easter-time memories. Astrid's early years were during the WWII Nazi occupation when times were hard and food was scarce. Times after the war were still difficult for Norwegians until the discovery of oil about 1960. Astrid's father joined the Marine at age 16 and sailed during both world wars, and then worked his way up to Chief Engineer, but sadly, they rarely saw him at home since he was always off sailing.

Astrid told me the children would take their small tin buckets to the lovely Lutheran church, Ila Kirken, across the street from her home to be filled with porridge which she brought home to share with her younger brother. She loved going to Sunday school there as a child.

Astrid said ahead of Easter, they would bring slim tree branches inside and put them in warm water so they would leaf out by Easter. They would decorate the branches with paper streamers and feathers. They didn't color eggs but hard-boiled them and put them in a nest made of cotton or paper scraps. They also drew pictures which they hung up and their mother had special puzzles for the holidays.

Astrid's mother was an excellent baker who would make homemade sweet buns with raisins and sukrat (a

hard, jellied candy), the best-ever rye bread, and sour cream porridge with butter in the middle and sweet red sauce. Boiled fish and potatoes were very common and they always had homemade soup before dinner with a nice slice of homemade bread.

Astrid told me they went to school 6 days a week so they really appreciated their Easter vacation days when they had more time to play in the big Oslo park across from where she lived. They would skate there in winter, and had fun outside with their friends year round.

I asked about Norwegian Easter flowers and Astrid shared the photos I've included here: Påske Lilje (Daffodil) and the wildflowers, Blåveis (lavender Wood Anemone or Hepatica). Hvitveis is the white variety of Wood Anemone. They also had lilacs in colors from deep burgundy to soft pink and white. My best wishes to you all for a happy and healthy spring 2021!

the near future.
