Tale from the Crypt



A South Dakotan TikToker and her sisters were visiting Gjerdrum, a small town on the northwestern outskirts of Oslo, where their ancestors had once lived. They toured Gjerdrum kirke, the church where their grandfather had been baptized, but could not have been prepared for what happened next.

A man at the church invited them to step down a set of creaky winding stairs into a crypt under the church's altar. There they saw a large ornate coffin that had seen better days. In fact, the lid had several large holes. Their guide said that if they wanted to take a photo between some of the holes in the lid, they could take a view of what lay within.

To their surprise, the coffin contained a well-preserved mummy, with his arms crossed over his chest. But who was this person? Further questioning of the caretaker revealed that the deceased was one Anders Simensen who who'd been the deputy of Øvre Romerike in 1684. A wealthy resident of Søndre Gjerdrum gård, Simensen was an influential and imposing man at 6'4".

A church has stood on these grounds since the middle ages but wasn't doing so well during the 17th century. Simensen had helped the church financially, paying for restorations after a fire in 1684 and a full rebuild in 1686, so he basically owned the church and was granted the power to appoint pastors. According to the Eidsvoll Ullensaker Blad (eub.no), Simensen had sent a letter to the king to request that he be mummified upon his death. King Christian V gave him the right to be buried under the church along with his descendants. Only 10 years after Simensen had restored the church, he got his wish.

Surprisingly intact for a 338 year-old mummy, it is unknown why Simensen wished to be embalmed, as this was not a practice of the era. He had built his own crypt and had an ornate coffin upholstered with leather and festooned with trumpet-playing angels. Simensen's wife and daughter were later laid to rest in the crypt, though not with the same level of preservation and pomp.

Humidity has been the greatest threat to Simensen's resting place. According to rb.no, in 2007 there was a question about whether to bury Simensen, when a fungus started to spread over the coffin. These days, teens who are confirmed in Gjerdrum church are allowed a peek in the coffin, along with—apparently—curious tourists.

Serinakaker (Norwegian Butter Cookies)

Ingredients

2 cups all purpose flour

1 tsp baking powder

2 tsp vanilla sugar (or extract)

11 Tbsp salted butter

1/2 cup granulated sugar

1 egg

Decoration

1 egg

3 Tbsp sliced or chopped almonds

3 Tbsp granulated sugar

Instructions

Preheat oven to 355 degrees and line a baking sheet with baking paper. Stir the flour, baking powder and vanilla sugar together in a large bowl. Add the butter and knead with your hands until crumbly. Add sugar and egg and mix until you get a solid ball of dough. Roll the dough into 2 long logs and cut about 30 slices. Roll each slice into a ball. Set the cookies on the baking sheet spaced slightly apart. Use a fork to lightly press down on each cookie. Whisk the egg into an egg wash and brush gently over each cookie. Sprinkle sliced almonds and/or granulated sugar on top of each cookie. Bake for 12-15 minutes depending on your oven until golden brown.

To Gleaners We Will Go

Sons of Norway encourages members to volunteer in charitable ways especially to reduce hunger and to help Veterans. There are many opportunities for this in our area which we will explore in the future. We invite members to suggest organizations which could use our support.

One commonly known charity in the Indianapolis area is Gleaners Food Bank – massive warehouse which receives large corporate donations of food - both perishable and non-perishable. This highly-organized and efficiently-managed charity also serves as a distributor to emergency food pantries around the state. The facility is so very clean.

In addition to bulk storage there is a drive-through lane which was developed and previously used by Coors Beer to keep their canned brew chilly. The goal was to not load trucks outside. This feature is perfect for a drive-through food pantry as well, so Nancy and I loaded one item in cars and pickups that stopped at three stations along the route. Each team of volunteers placed a certain item in the vehicles, and there were two or three teams at each station, so after three stops the recipients had frozen meat, fruit, bread, produce, a bag of potatoes, fruit pops, etc. We did this steadily for three hours which was easy and fun since we got to know other volunteers. My teammate was a high school student on fall break who just wanted to help others for a day with her Mom. Another was an accountant from Allisons.

According to the after-shift photo we served 32,166 meals which seems like a lot, but there was a morning shift as well as our afternoon shift. Maybe this includes food shipped out in large quantities to other pantries as well.

When we do this again, please join in the fun. It is not strenuous and feels good to help those in need of food.

Norway's Oil Fund Grows on Strong Equity Markets

The fund has a stake in more than 9,000 companies, equivalent to holding 1.5% of every listed company in the world

Norway's sovereign-wealth fund returned 5.8% in the third quarter, driven by strong equity markets.

Norges Bank Investment Management—the arm of the central bank that manages the world's largest sovereign-wealth fund, commonly known as the oil fund—said Wednesday that the fund had a market value of 20.44 trillion kroner (\$2.046 trillion) as of Sept. 30. That marks an increase of 854 billion kroner from the end of the second quarter.

"The result is driven by strong returns in the stock market, particularly in basic materials, telecommunications and the financial sector," said Norges Bank Investment Management Deputy Chief Executive Trond Grande.

Equity investments returned 7.7% in the quarter, while fixed-income investments returned 1.4%, unlisted real-estate investments returned 1.1% and unlisted renewable energy infrastructure returned 0.3%.

The Norwegian krone appreciated against several major currencies during the quarter, with currency movements contributing to a 259 billion-krone hit to the fund's value, it said.

The fund was 71.2% invested in equities, 26.6% in fixed income, 1.8% in unlisted real estate and 0.4% in unlisted renewable-energy infrastructure.
