Another Great Recipe:

Rømmegrøt

Sour cream porridge with dried meats was festive food in the olden days and is still considered that today. Sour cream porridge must be made from high fat (35%) natural sour cream, with no stabilizers or gelatin added. For the best results, use homemade sour cream.

Ingredients

1 ½ cups 35 percent fat sour cream (Recipe for homemade Sour cream in Step 1)

Ingredients for homemade sour cream:

- 1 cup whipping cream
- 2 Tbsp. buttermilk
- 1 1/4 cups flour
- 5 cups full fat milk
- 34 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 Tbsp. cinnamon

Recipe

Step 1

To make sour cream, heat 1 cup whipping cream to 95° F/ 35°C, almost body temperature, then whisk in 2 Tbsp. buttermilk. Let stand at room temperature at least 8 hours, until thickened.

Step 2

Simmer sour cream, covered, about 15 minutes.

Step 3

Sift in 1/3 of the flour and stir. Simmer until the butterfat begins to leach out. Skim off the fat and set aside.

Step 4

Sift in the remaining flour, stir, and bring porridge to a boil. In a separate pot, bring the milk to a boil. Add milk to the porridge one cup at a time, whisking each time before adding more. Whisk porridge until smooth and simmer about 10 minutes. Season with salt. In a small bowl, mix sugar and cinnamon together. Enjoy the rømmegrøt with melted butterfat and cinnamon sugar sprinkled on top.

Stamps can be sent by individuals, or we can gather them up and send in a package occasionally. LaVonne will continue to collect the stamps for us. The lodge pays the postage. The money and hours spent on stamps can be counted in community service hours.

Danny Toth was the only member present with a January **birthday.** We sang Happy Birthday to him for his 45th birthday. Roger and Fran Instenes 47th anniversary was in December. We sang Happy Anniversary to them.

Terry Thompson won the \$5.00 door prize and donated it back to the lodge.

Old Business:

The Sons of Norway Fagernes Lodge **met on February 25, 2023** at Blair Lutheran Church. President Roger Instenes called the meeting to order. The pledge of allegiance was recited, and the national anthems were sung. LaVonne Wier introduced and **welcomed our newest members, Kristin, Kielyn and Weston Rowekamp.** They have transferred from the Black River Falls lodge. Secretary's minutes from January were read and approved. Treasurer's report was read and approved. After income and expenses, we have **\$1040.36** in **checking.** Terry Thompson gave the membership report. Our **membership is now at 47**. LaVonne showed thank-you cards from the food pantries for our gifts at Christmas. Byron Britten gave a **language lesson on activities** we like to do. **Old Business:**

We had 13 skiers at the Barnelopet on February 4th in Arcadia. It was a perfect day. Thanks to the cookie makers, and the people who worked the event. They were: Todd and Mary Jo Fetsch, Leland and LaVonne Wier, Roger Instenes, Byron Britten, and Lamoine Jacobs. Special thanks to Todd for arranging the grooming of the trails and bringing skis, campfire supplies, and medals.

The Barnebirkie was held in Hayward, WI February 23rd. LaVonne Wier brought 90 dozen cookies from Fagernes, LaCrosse and Westby lodges. She worked the registration desk, took pictures for the District, and we had a cookie stand at the Expo. Approximately 10,000 cookies were donated by lodges throughout District 5. It is quite the event to experience, as thousands of skiers come from all over the United States and from other countries.

New Business:

Roger Instenes will be part of a Task Force to look at the alignment of zones in District 5. They will meet via Zoom on March 4th.Todd has been in contact with the president of the Osseo Lodge. They will have the Fyrbal in Pigeon Falls at the dam on June 21st. We will play Kubb. They request we bring any item to share and food if we wish. President Instenes thanked Terry Thompson for donating real silverware for the lodge. We will use up the plasticware and not buy any more.

LaVonne Wier asked the opinion of the lodge whether or not she should proceed with the reading program at a local elementary school. She requested to return to Blair-Taylor for now. Mary Jo Fetsch volunteered to help with the program. The lodge's opinion was to leave it up to LaVonne to do the program this school year. Marlys Britten requested that members of the lodge sing Norwegian songs for the Norwegian church service at French Creek. The service is at 1:30 on April 5th. Several members indicated they would participate. Cynda Solberg will accompany us. We will practice before the March 25th meeting with Cynda at Blair Lutheran. Rodney Moen reported that Grand View Nursing Home is at half capacity. Part of the reason is the lack of qualified staff. At this time, Eddie Thompson is in the nursing home, as there isn't enough staff for the assisted living area.

LaVonne Wier is hoping **Robin Fossum from the International Sons of Norway Board will attend our March 25th meeting.** Robin will present our lodge with the International Family Lodge of the Year award for 2021. She also is a very accomplished violinist. If she comes in March, she will play the Hardanger fiddle for us. If she is not able to attend, we will have a Nordic News video featuring Robin Fossum.

The Frokost and Bake Sale will be on May 6, 2023 at Blair Lutheran Church. We discussed possible menu items, such as egg bakes, wafflers, herring, fruit, rommegrot, sweets and lefse, juice, milk and coffee. We need to have everyone who can provide baked goods for sale and work at the event. We will do a signup at the March meeting. Marlys Britten indicated that their granddaughter, Jozephine, is planning to go to Masse Moro this summer. Kielyn and Weston Rowekamp are also planning to attend. We will have three children to sponsor with a scholarship. Rodney Moen volunteered to contact the local television station and possibly be a guest speaker to advertise the Frokost and Bake Sale. LaVonne said we are lucky to have such good advertising from WWIS radio in Black River Falls, and the local television station, which is now WCOC. They are very willing to give us free advertising for our meetings and events. Most things presented to the Trempealeau County Times require a fee. Posters will be available to distribute at the March meeting. Meeting was adjourned, and we enjoyed a delicious lunch provided by Terry Thompson and Roger and Fran Instenes. During the lunch, we watched a video called Kaskeland, which was about the early Norwegian settlers in Wisconsin. Leland and LaVonne Wier had viewed it at the District 5 convention in June 2022, and found it very interesting.

Sons of Norway Fagernes Lodge 5-616 History

Blair, Wisconsin is the home of Sons of Norway Fagernes Lodge 5-616. The Lodge meets the fourth Saturday of the month at 1 p.m. at the Blair Community Center at 103 E. Broadway; Blair, Wisconsin. 54616. (Editor's note: Now changed to Blair Lutheran Church, 126 Peterson Ave. Blair, WI 547-616).

The village of Blair was established in 1855. By the 1870's massive groups of Norwegians came to settle the area. The immigrants did not leave their traditions in Norway. There were Norwegian services in church and children were confirmed in the Norwegian language. Churches soon sponsored annual lutefisk dinners that continue today. Families continued to enjoy the food and delicacies enjoyed in Norway. Eventually a lefse plant was established which still ships the Norwegian staple all over the United States. A Norwegian Folk Singing group entertains at gatherings.

Kongsvinger Lodge No. 39 was Blair's first Sons of Norway organization and was established in the early 1900's. The group apparently disbanded.

In August 1991, seventy people from the area met for an organizational meeting for a **new lodge. Thus was established Fagernes Lodge 5-616.**

The Lodge consists of members from Galesville, Ettrick, Blair, Whitehall, Taylor, Arcadia and other areas.

The Lodge has received the "Lodge of the Year" in District 5 three years. (Editor's note: more than three years)

The Lodge has been active in many activities including:

Community: Enter the Sons of Norway float in many area parades.

Cultural: Has lessons on craft and foods at the monthly meetings. Arrange presentations on subjects pertaining to Norway at meetings. Attend various Norwegian performances and places of interest in other areas. Encourages all members to earn Cultural and Sports medals.

Participates in Norwegian Days in Blair. Conducts Norwegian language lessons at each meeting. Conducts an annual FyrBal in coordination with another Lodge.

Donations: Raises money for the Sons of Norway Foundation by members giving donations at every meeting, conducting a Silent Auction annually, holding Wii bowling at a member's (Editor's note: at a non-member's) house and hosting dances in the past. Raises money and **provides scholarships** for Masse Moro by conducting a frokost (brunch and bake sale).

Donating money for needy families at Christmas, to area food pantries and disasters.

Encourages collection of stamps for the Tubfrim project (Editor's note: has been changed to Stamps for the Wounded) which helps disabled children. Provides cookies for the Hayward, Wisconsin Barnebirke.

Youth: Conducts Adopt-A-School program to encourage school-age children to develop an interest in Norway.

Hosts a JuletreFest for members and any children. The children all receive gifts that are donated.

Hosts a Barnelopet.

To serve 20-25

2 quarts dry red wine (about 2 standard 750 mL bottles)

2 quarts muscatel (or muscato)

1 pint sweet vermouth

2 tablespoons Angostura bitters

2 cups raisins

Peelings of 1 orange

12 whole cardamoms, bruised in a mortar with a pestle or by covering with

a towel and crushing with a rolling pin

10 whole cloves

1 piece (about 2 inches) of fresh ginger

1 stick cinnamon

1 ½ cups akevitt (preferably Linie)

1 ½ cups sugar

2 cups whole almonds, blanched and peeled

Step 1

In a 6- to 8-quart enameled or stainless steel pot, mix together the dry red wine, muscatel, sweet vermouth, bitters, raisins, orange peel and the slightly crushed cardamoms, whole cloves, ginger and cinnamon. Cover and let the mixture stand at least 12 hours so that the flavors will develop and mingle.

Step 2

Shortly before serving, add the akevitt and the sugar. Stir well and bring it to a full boil over high heat.
