Reports from Secretary LaVonne Wier

On Recruitment: (Note from Terry Thompson, membership secretary: our membership is down by 11 or more members from a few years ago). Recruitment of new members in our lodge has not brought a new influx of new members. LaVonne had an idea to reach people who might be interested in joining us. She devised a welcome letter. With that letter, a copy of our lodge brochure and a membership application were sent out. Only a few of our current members submitted names of people who should be contacted. About 45 envelopes were sent with the materials, plus a self-addressed stamped envelope with the headquarters address.

About a 10% rate of acceptance to join would have been considered a success. Unfortunately, not even one person/family sent in the application to join Fagernes Lodge. It was a disappointment. It appears that a face-to-face approach is still the best recruitment tool. Even providing all the needed paperwork and information in a mailing did not bring any new members. On the positive side, three former Heritage members are now regular members of Fagernes Lodge. They are Jacob and Jescey Thompson, grandsons of Terry Thompson, and Gage Instenes, grandson of Roger and Fran Instenes. We're so glad to have you three as regular members!

On Tubfrim: LaVonne was able to turn in lots of cancelled stamps at the District 5 Zone 2 meeting at Norskedalen, Aug. 28. It wasn't necessary to weigh them, as we don't have to send in a postcard. At least for now, a trip to Norway each year as a prize for a chosen postcard isn't being done. I don't know whether or not that prize will be reinstated after travel restrictions are lifted.

Tubfrim is still a good cause to support. The stamps are sold to collectors in Norway, and the proceeds help needy children there. We will continue to collect stamps for this cause. We don't mail them, so LaVonne will turn them over to the zone director whenever there is an opportunity.

On Adopt-a-School: Our library of books for the Adopt-a-School reading program was not utilized in the spring of 2020 nor 2021. We had just implemented it in February 2020 and presented it to the Arcadia Elementary when COVID hit. The books were collected and returned to LaVonne's house. It remains to be decided if the program can be started again in the spring of 2022. Usually the program runs from January through May 1st each year.

LaVonne will inquire at the Blair church to see if there is a spot for the library to be stored there. With the books at our meeting location, it will be easier for members to look over the titles and sign out books. Any time the books are not in the school reading program, they would be available for lodge members. Members could just read the books, or work towards a cultural award through Sons of Norway. When and if the books can be stored at the church, you will be notified.

The Norwegian Elkhound - "moose dog"

History

Norway's national dog, the Norsk elghund (Norwegian Elkhound or more accurately "moose dog") is a medium-sized dog that has hunted, herded and played guard dog since Viking times. This ancient Spitz is one of the oldest dog breeds, having originated as early as 5,000 B.C. Elkhounds have been found buried at Viking grave sites such as the Svarthola in Jæren, Norway. According to DNA research, the elkhound is descended from an extinct type of gray wolf originating in western Russia and central Europe.

The breed was first present at a Norwegian dog exhibit in 1877, and was first recognized by the American Kennel Club in 1913. It remains the only Spitz breed in the Hound category. It is the 100th most popular AKC breed, and has recently increased in popularity. The Norwegian elkhound is one of the most successful breeds at the Westminster dog show, having won the Hound category 11 times.

Name

The "elk" in elkhound is actually a mistranslation of the Norwegian word for "moose:" elg. This breed of dog is excellent at hunting moose, bear and reindeer, but there are actually no elk in Europe. During the Middle Ages, the breed was referred to as dyrehund, or "animal dog."

Looks

The elkhound breed belongs to the Spitz family and possesses cold weather physical traits such as a thick stand-off coat, fuzzy pointed ears, a compact, dense body and a curly tail that sits on its back. Their coats are primarily a grayish wolf color with tips of black and white.

Personality

Friendly, confident, athletic and robust, Norwegian elkhounds love exercise and make great family pets. Perhaps due to their wolf roots, the elkhound is loyal and always wants to know who is in charge. This breed has incredible stamina and can track game for hours in harsh conditions and rough terrain. Its primary target is the moose, and it has the courage to hold large animals at bay while alerting the hunter by with sharp barking.

Famous Elkhounds

US President Herbert Hoover had a Norwegian Elkhound named Weegie, and Norway's Minister of Defense has the power to mobilize all Norwegian Elkhounds in service of their country, if the need should ever arise.

A Little in English...

Artificial Intelligence Can Help You Understand Music Better

<u>University of Oslo researcher works to ensure</u> <u>that new technology can open people's ears to</u> <u>new music</u>

Chords, tempo, timbre, rhythm and harmony - all these aspects of the music make it sound the way it does. But have you thought about why you like the exact music that you do?

"Music is quite magical, when you think about it. When you listen, you feel many emotions. You understand that it is a kind of language, but do not see what is happening. Most people do not understand what is really going on."

That's what Olivier Lartillot, researcher at RITMO Center for Interdisciplinary Research on Rhythm, Time and Movement, says. He is developing new digital tools that he hopes will make the magic of music available to everyone.

First up is Norwegian folk music.

"Folk music is so rich, and a treasure for Norwegian culture. Still, not many people listen to it. If we create a tool that can help people understand music, folk music may have a renaissance in Norway," says Lartillot.

<u>Training artificial intelligence with the</u> <u>Hardanger fiddle</u>

The music that the machine must be able to transcribe is the National Library's catalog of folk music. According to Lartillot, Norwegian folk music, especially the Hardanger fiddle, is difficult material for the machine.

"The large amount of examples needed was initially not available. Therefore, we asked musicians, the professional fiddle player Olav Luksengård Mjelva and students from the Norw egian Academy of Music, to play for us, and designed software where they could see the sounds visually and place the notes for us.

Visualization helps music understanding

With the app Lartillot wants to create, you will be able to browse the catalog of folk music and go on a journey of discovery in music. When you find a song or a vocal tune you like, the app can point you in the direction of something in the same vein.

For now, such an app can be used specifically for folk music. In the longer run, Lartillot wants to expand the knowledge of artificial intelligence, so that it can be used for all music.

Kunstig intelligens kan hjelpe deg å forstå musikk bedre

<u>UiO-forsker jobber for at ny teknologi kan åpne</u> folks ører for ny musikk.

Akkorder, takt, klang, rytme og harmoni – alle disse aspektene ved musikken gjør at den låter som den gjør. Men har du tenkt over hvorfor du liker akkurat den musikken du gjør?

– Musikk er ganske magisk, når du tenker over det. Når du lytter, kjenner du på mange følelser. Du forstår at det er et slags språk, men ser ikke hva som skjer. De fleste forstår ikke hva som egentlig foregår. Det sier Olivier Lartillot, forsker ved RITMO Senter for tverrfaglig forskning på rytme, tid og bevegelse. Han utvikler nye digitale verktøy som han håper vil gjøre musikkens magi tilgjengelig for alle. Først ut er norsk folkemusikk.

– Folkemusikken er så rik, og en skatt for norsk kultur. Likevel er det ikke så mange som hører på den. Hvis vi lager et verktøy som kan hjelpe folk å forstå musikken, kan folkemusikken kanskje få en renessanse i Norge, sier Lartillot.

Trener opp kunstig intelligens med hardingfele

Musikken maskinen skal klare å transkribere, er Nasjonalbibliotekets katalog med folkemusikk. Ifølge Lartillot er norsk folkemusikk og særlig hardingfela vanskelig materie for maskinen.

 Den store mengden eksempler som trengs, var i utgangspunktet ikke tilgjengelig. Derfor har vi bedt musikere, den profesjonelle felespilleren Olav Luksengård Mjelva og studenter fra Norges musikkhøgskole, om å spille for oss, og designet en programvare hvor de kunne se lydene visuelt og plassere notene for oss.

Visualisering hjelper musikkforståelse

Med appen Lartillot vil lage, vil du kunne bla i katalogen av folkemusikk og dra på oppdagelsesreise i musikken. Når du finner en slått eller et stev du liker, kan appen peke deg i retning av noe i samme landskap.

så lenge vil det en slik app kunne brukes til spesifikk folkemusikk. På lengre sikt ønsker Lartillot å utvide kunnskapen til den kunstige intelligensen, slik at den kan brukes for all musikk.

Salmon Burgers

1 1/2 to 2 lbs. ground salmon fillet

1 cup fine dried bread crumbs

1 small cucumber, peeled, seeded and chopped

4 large shallots, chopped

1/2 cup chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley

6 onion rolls, split

Combine the salmon, bread crumbs, cucumber, shallots and parsley and mix together gently. Make sure all ingredients are thoroughly mixed. Divide the salmon mixture into 6 equal portions and shape into patties about 3 inches in diameter and 1 inch thick. Refrigerate covered on a plate until ready to grill. Prepare your grill for direct grilling at medium-high heat. Lightly oil the grill rack or grill pan. Place the patties on the grilling surface over the hottest part of the grill. Cook the patties for about 5-6 minutes per side, turning once. Test with a sharp knife to see if the patties are done. Right before the burgers are done, place the bun halves on the grill, cut side down, and toast lightly.
