How to Behave in Norway: Five Tips

As when traveling anywhere in the world, you may find some of the social norms in Norway are different than what you are used to. Here are some tips that will help you make the most of your trip to Norway:

1) Don't get too close! Norwegians really value their personal space. Even when you're standing in line, try to stay at least an arm's length away from others.

2) Avoid too much eye contact. Otherwise, you will make your newfound Norwegian friends uncomfortable. A good rule of thumb is to use the same amount of eye contact as the person who you are speaking to does.

3) Be punctual. If you are a few minutes late, it's forgivable, especially if you call ahead to let the host/hostess know. To arrive any later than that is considered extremely rude.

4) Never compare Norway unfavorably to Sweden—especially when it comes to winter sports! Norway was the country with the most medals in the last Winter Olympics, after all.

5) Notice your surroundings. Norwegians are understandably proud of their stunning landscape, and appreciate it when visitors admire it, too.

Fall is here. I can hear it in brown cornfields rustling, in crisp leaves scattering, in blackbirds' cawing, in farmers' combines harvesting, in cacophonies of cicadas' and crickets' choruses.

Fall is here. I can feel it in the nippy, night air, in goosebumps on my skin, in damp, dark air and decrease in temperature that prompts pain in my joints and susceptible trigger points.






Focus on a Member, Lora Lebakken

Velkommen, Baby Boom!

A pandemic-related baby boom has sent Norwegian families scrambling to find perfect names for their new additions. 2021 saw over 3,000 more births in Norway than in 2020. Thankfully, help has come from an entity with a long history flaunting imaginative naming skills: IKEA. Employees at the Norwegian branch of the Swedish retail giant combed through its catalogs, curating a "name bank" overflowing with over 800 monikers inspired by over 70 years of flat-pack tables, chairs, chandeliers, desks, and a mish-mash of other household staples.

While many IKEA product labels are inspired by Swedish place names, several others have appellations associated with humans. They range from the more typical, such as Billy, a strikingly modern black and white chair from 1970, to the more exotic such as Ulrika, a dainty side table available in 1958. The names are accompanied on the website by a picture of the item, the year it was introduced, and a description in Norwegian. The descriptions can apply to both the furniture item and to your newest family member.



Sons of Norway's International Board of Directors set Recruitment Goals

Goals set by Sons of Norway's International Board of Directors for 2022 include enrolling 12,000 new social and financial benefits members. While the pandemic may put restrictions on gathering at times, you can still invite friends and family to join and enjoy the exclusive benefits of Sons of Norway membership!

All lodges, regardless of size, are asked to recruit 4% more new members this year than in 2021 (rounding up to the next whole number or "whole member"). For lodges that recruited 3 or fewer new members in 2021, their goal this year is 4 new members. **Recognition for Lodges and Members**

At the end of the campaign, we will recognize lodges that meet the recruitment challenge. These lodges will receive:

A \$125 award (or equivalent funds for lodges in Norway and Canada). The lodge and its members may use these funds as it prefers.

Achievement certificates for the lodges that meet their goal. Lodges will also have access to an online recruiter achievement certificate to recognize their recruiting members.

Additionally, an exclusive **2022 Recruiter Pin** will be sent directly to members after they recruit their first new member in 2022. The pins will be available while supplies last, so don't wait to invite friends and family members to join!

How do I know what the lodge goal is for 2022?

Lodge leaders can log in to view the goal information. We have published the 2022 goals by district and lodge in a 2022 campaign goal document linked at the bottom of this page. For your reference, the final 2021 recruitment results are also found below. Examples of recruitment goals:

If your lodge recruited 15 new members in 2021, a 4% increase means we are asking you increase that number by 1 this year (rounding up to the next whole number) for a total of 16 new members in 2022.

If your lodge recruited between 0 and 3 new members in 2021, your goal is 4 new members in 2022.

How can a lodge track its progress?

Regular monthly reports your lodge receives include new members who have joined the prior month. Each quarter, we will update the year-to-date results posted below.

What constitutes a new member?

A new member is a completely new-to-Sons-of-Norway, dues-paid member who joins with either an individual or family membership. Former members count as new members only if they re-join at least 2 years after the exact date their prior membership expired. Heritage members (children under age 16) do not count toward the goal.

Does lodge size factor in when calculating the goal?

No. We are encouraging all lodges to build on their 2021 results by 4%, no matter the size of lodge.

What about members who leave the lodge?

The lodge goal is only concerned with recruitment, so it is not affected by a loss of existing members. Membership retention is vital to a healthy lodge. Sons of Norway encourages you to create a welcoming lodge atmosphere with a wide variety of social, cultural and volunteer activities for all. As changing pandemic conditions may impact your ability to meet in-person, please consider adding virtual and socially distanced activities or other ways to keep in touch with members via phone, email and lodge newsletters and mailings.

What is the time frame?

Lodges have from January 1 through Friday, December 16 to recruit new members and return paper forms and dues payments to Sons of Norway headquarters. If you wish to enroll new members online, please act by no later than December 29. To count toward the lodge recruitment goal, all new member enrollments and dues payments must be received within the timeframes above to guarantee they can be processed by Sons of Norway headquarters in 2022.

How do I get credit for recruiting?

It's up to each member to provide their member number to those they invite to join. Write your name and member number clearly on the paper enrollment form in the "Membership referred by" area provided. For prospective members who want to sign up online, ask them to enter your member number in the "referring member" field at the bottom of the online form. It is the responsibility of the recruiting member and lodge to provide accurate recruiter information to headquarters at the time of enrollment.

What if I have questions about the campaign or results?

As the year progresses, periodic result updates will appear in our digital newsletters: Leadership Resource (sent to lodge officers) and E-Post (sent to all members). If you have other questions, please email them to membership@sofn.com.

Information about Sons of Norway scholarships, benefits of membership, insurance and annuity information, and applications for membership were provided.

Fifteen door prizes were awarded to visitors who signed up for the drawing. We may have a few new members for our lodge soon! I signed up people from other areas for membership in their local lodges. As a first-time event, I count it as a success.

Norwegian Cinnamon Thumbs

These delicious shortbread cookies rolled in cinnamon sugar are a perfect little treat with a cup of coffee! **Cookie Ingredients:**

5 Tbsp. sugar 1 cup butter 2 cups flour 1 tsp. vanilla **Ingredients for rolling:** 1 tsp. cinnamon

¹/₄ cup sugar **Directions**:

Preheat the oven to 350°F.

To make the cookies, beat the sugar and butter together until fluffy. Add the flour and vanilla, and beat until the dough comes together. Take a small amount of dough (about the size of a

Take a small amount of dough (about the size of a tennis ball), and roll is gently into a long, skinny rope 1/2" in diameter (about the width of your pinky). Using a sharp knife, cut the dough into 2" pieces, making sure to cut on the diagonal instead of straight across. Place cookies a few inches apart on a lined baking sheet, and bake 8-10 minutes, until just beginning to turn golden on the bottom edges. Remove cookies from oven and allow to cool slightly. While cookies are cooling, combine the cinnamon and

While cookies are cooling, combine the cinnamon and sugar for rolling in a small bowl. When cookies are cool enough to handle, roll each one gently in the cinnamon sugar, and place on a cooling rack to finish cooling.
