Restauration Anniversary 1825-2025

On July 4, 1825, a group of 52 Norwegians set sail on the ship Restauration to make the first organized migration from Norway to North America. The 200th anniversary will include events in Norway and North America and will be marked by the 2025 return of a replica of the Restauration which will sail from Stavanger to New York in 2025. A Vesterheim Norwegian-American Museum exhibit (Decorah, IA) will feature an exhibit titled "200 Years of Norwegians in America". The exhibit will include photographs, objects, stories, and themes. Watch the news for more information in the coming months.

NOTE: Our Aug. 11, 2025 cultural program will feature the 200th Anniversary of the first organized Norwegian emigration to North America that will be celebrated in 2025.



How Oslo Got Its Name

The capital of Norway—Oslo—is one of the easier names to pronounce in the list of Norwegian cities. However, Oslo hasn't always been its name. In fact, it has taken on a few different names throughout history. Originally, the name was Ánslo or Áslo around the year 1040. It is believed that the second part of the name, 'lo', meant "meadow" and the first part of the word, 'Ás', meant "hill" or "ridge", which makes the entire name translate to "meadow beneath the ridge." In 1314, when the city officially became the capital, the spelling transitioned to what we know today: Oslo (pronounced "ooh-shloo"). However, when the city burned down in 1624 and plans were discussed to rebuild, King Christian VI of Denmark and Norway decided the new city would take his name and become Christiania. With the language reform movement that followed in the next few centuries, the city was then spelled with a K, becoming Kristiania. Finally, around 1924, the city went back to its roots and was officially renamed Oslo, which stemmed from some of the eastern parts of the city being referred to as "Oslo" in maps at the time.

Stavanger Celebrates 900 Years

Stavanger was founded in 1125, with the completion of its cathedral. Today, this southwest coastal city stands as the country's third-largest city and is central to the country's oil and gas industry.

To mark the occasion, the city is taking the entire year to celebrate with the theme of *Stavanger 2025: Past, Present, Future*. Over the course of the year, events will occur that include themes of origin, cultural heritage, community, urban life, and natural wonder. The topics of innovation and sustainability will also be evident.

Festivities kicked off in January, with an estimated 17,000 in attendance for light festival events. Spring and summer festivities will be full of music, dance, performances, reenactments, and food celebrations. One of the biggest highlights will happen in July when the replica ship *Restauration* sets sail from Stavanger harbor to re-enact the start of Norwegian mass migration to America in 1825. The year-long commemoration will conclude in December with an event called *Into the Future*, that will focus on technology and innovation topics.

ORIGIN OF LUTEFISK

"Centuries ago, many Norwegians came to Ireland to escape the bitter Norwegian winters. A famine gripped Ireland at the time and food was scarce, fish and potatoes being just about all there was. To make matters worse, the Norwegians were eating all the fish, leaving the Irish with nothing to eat but potatoes. Then the Norwegians started taking over the potato crop and making lefse. This was too much for the Irish and they decided the Norwegians had to go. They organized a secret organization called IRATION (Irish Republican Army to Rid Ireland of Norwegians). The army members sabotaged all power plants so the fish in the Norwegian refrigerators would spoil and force them to move some place else. The fish spoiled, alright, but as everyone knows, the Norwegians thrive on spoiled fish.

The Irishmen then tried a new tactic—they sneaked into the fish storage houses in the dead of the night and sprinkled the rotten fish with lye, hoping to poison the intruders. This didn't work either, because what resulted was the Norwegian delicacy, LUTEFISK, and the Norwegians thrived on that too. The poor, poor Irish! They were desperate! But Saint Patrick came to the rescue. On March 17th, he blew his top and told all the Norwegians where to go—so they all went to Minnesota and South Dakota, and to this day they eat Lutefisk and lefse at church dinners."

- MATCHING FUNDS DEADLINE TO APPLY IS MAY 17, 2025:

Contact our LODGE SECRETARY (JANICE GREGOIRE, 262-784-6953) FOR INFORMATION ABOUT MATCHING FUNDS, and get a "Local Lodge Supporting Grant Endorsement" form from her. Our Lodge has voted to give matching funds of \$500 to each of two youths (who have met the registration deadline of May 17, 2025). District Five will also contribute UP TO \$250.00 each for the two youths.

Fill out the top part of the a "Local Lodge Supporting Grant Endorsement" form and send it to our Lodge Secretary (Janice Gregoire). She will fill out the LOCAL LODGE ENDORSEMENT at the bottom of the form, and mail the completed endorsement form with accompanying supporting check (payable to Nordic Legacy Foundation) to Robert Schuck, District 5 Youth Director. **THE ENDORSEMENT MUST BE POSTMARKED BY May 17, 2025.**

FOSSELYNGEN GUIDELINES FOR YOUTH HERITAGE APPLICANTS AND MATCHING FUNDS

- A. The Lodge will provide matching funds from its Masse Moro scholarship fund for two applicants.
- B. Application is to be sent to our Lodge Secretary (Janice Gregoire).
- C. The applicant must be the child, grandchild, nephew or niece of a Lodge member in good standing. A member in good standing is identified as being a Fosselyngen member for a minimum of two years and working a minimum of ten volunteer hours during those two years.
- D. The applicant must provide one of the following after attending camp:
 - 1. A thank you and article written about his/her experience at camp that will be published in the Lodge newsletter. **OR**
 - 2. A presentation at a Lodge meeting about their experience at camp. They may also wish to bring photos and any type of project, e.g., rosemaling, hardanger, or wood carving.
- E. The applicant and his/her sponsor must sign a contract stating his/her obligations when applying for a scholarship to Heritage Camp.
