Høsttakkefest is not as recognized a holiday as it once was due to the decreased number of Norwegians who driver med jordbruk (farm). Those churches who celebrate the helligdag pick a day in oktober that is suitable to bonder og kondisjoner (farmers and conditions).

A Beery Merry Norse Christmas

Norway's Christmas celebrations involve a number of long-held traditions combined with modern ways to celebrate. Some are unique to the country and others are similar to those in other parts of Europe, Canada, and the United States. Midwinter celebrations, called Jól, date back to Viking times before the spread of Christianity.

Brewing juleøl (Christmas beer) was a traditional holiday activity. The Vikings and old Norse prized their beer and kept plenty on hand during the holiday season. The symbol of the cross was often used during the process to protect or bless the brew. Sometimes crossed straws in the container or a cross of tar painted on or under each container would serve as enough to

protect the special beer. In most districts, the brewer—usually the master or matron of the household worked alone and started two to three weeks before Christmas on a night with a full moon. The process had to be completed by St Thomas Day (December 21) or winter solstice, because brewing at the turning of the sun was considered to be very tricky.
