The present day version of the julenisse is very different from the legends of the do-

mestic nisse. The julenisse is portrayed as an older, good natured, adult-sized man (not surprisingly the size of an uncle or father) with a long white beard and a red hat and suit. He carries a sack of toys on his back, visits children in their homes on Christmas Eve and always asks, "Are there any good children

here?" ("Er det noen snille barn her?") Many Scandinavian children also believe he lives at the North Pole where he has a workshop. The Norwegian julenisse is very much like the American Santa Claus and is based upon the German legend of St. Nicholas (nisse is a derivative of Nicholas), who was the patron saint of children and seamen. He was known for his many kind acts toward children.



Mary Swain reads a Christmas story for the Lodge.


