Headstone Hunt

Are you looking for an excuse to get out of the house and into the fresh air, but don't know where to go? Consider a trip to your local cemetery for a "headstone hunt"! While you're enjoying the peace of the outdoors, you can help others with their genealogy research by photographing a headstone for them. A website called "Find A Grave" (https://findagrave.com) was started in 1995 for people to track their ancestors by posting memorials and attaching them to specific cemeteries, with hopes of relatives being able to see the headstones without having to travel to the location. The site has over 190 million individual memorials listed, but many of the entries do not have photos.

If you're interested in helping out, go to the website and do a search for photo requests in your area. Just click on "Contribute" on the top banner of the website's main page and then follow it to "Photo Requests." Once you choose your location, the results of unclaimed photo requests are listed by cemetery in your area. Your job is to pick one, go to the cemetery, and find the headstone the person is looking for. Take a picture on your phone, then upload it to the website. Someone will be very happy that you did!

If that sounds a little daunting and you'd rather just have some fun researching your own ancestors, take a moment to try a search yourself. Type in an ancestor's name on Find A Grave's website and see if someone has already taken a picture of the headstone. If they haven't, maybe you'd want to create a memorial yourself. If you've already done the work to research your genealogy, this is a way you can help other relatives along in their own research. Anyone can contribute to Find A Grave!
