With the aid of modern communications and computers, genealogical research has become one of the most popular activities ever.

The Norwegian American Genealogical Center & Naeseth Library is one of America's leading genealogical research centers. The Center began as the dream of Gerhard B. Naeseth (1913-1994), internationally renowned scholar in the field of Norwegian-American genealogy and immigration history. As early as the 1940's, Naeseth began collecting the primary resource information and documents relating to Norwegians in the United States. In 1974, when he was associate director of the University of Wisconsin Libraries, Naeseth also established a genealogical research center, located in Madison and associated with Vesterheim Norwegian American Museum. In the 20 years before his death, Naeseth built up this new resource by increasing the library collections, publishing ground-breaking works on Norwegian immigration history, and engaging and mentoring volunteers.

Consider Masse Moro

Idun lodge generously supports young people associated with its members (children, grandchildren, nieces, and nephews) to attend *Masse Moro*, a Norwegian heritage camp for youth ages 9-15 years.

Sponsored by the <u>Sons of Norway Fifth District</u>, this year's camp is scheduled for **July 13-26** at Beaver Creek Reserve, Eau Claire County. The deadline for financial support is May 17, but don't wait!! Contact Treasurer Dee Grimsrud at <u>idunlodgemadison@gmail.com</u> or even better check with her at the next lodge meeting.

Campers stay in cabins (furnished with bunk beds) along with two to three staff members and an additional 9-12 other campers. This small cozy, air conditioned, atmosphere creates a bonded tight-knit cabin.

Since 1979, the camp has been helping youth celebrate their Norwegian heritage through a cultural experience. Campers learn Norwegian, build friendships, and gain important life skills like problem-solving, leadership, and teamwork through the Viking Olympics programming.

In addition, campers can do woodworking, painting, leather work, baking, chip carving, and experience exciting tales and Nordic myths.

Campers do not have to be Sons of Norway members to attend camp.

Anyone registering for the 2025 Masse Moro summer session can fill out their registration form on the Masse Moro website electronic form, or they may download the form as in the past. New for 2025, everyone who pays the application fee and tuition on the website will not be charged an additional service fee. Many of the updates to the website are already in place.

First Time Camper Scholarship. Campers who have never attended Masse Moro before are eligible for a \$50 credit toward their tuition, regardless of Sons of Norway affiliation, age, or gender.

Invite a Friend Scholarship. For returning campers who invite a friend who has not attended camp before. Both the returning camper and their invited friend will receive a \$100 credit toward their tuition.

Tuition. \$1,200.00* (compared to over \$2,000 for similar camps) includes tuition, lodging, meals, and activities.

I'm "pumped" about learning Norwegian!! One of our Fagernes members introduced me to an app called "Duolingo". It is a computer/phone app for learning languages. The app has many languages to choose from. Of course, I am on the Norwegian app.

After attempting other methods with little success, I am super excited about using Duolingo. The lessons are fun. The repetition helps me remember what I learned. When I make a mistake, the app helps me by reviewing the words. I use it on my smart phone whenever and wherever I find the time.

With six people on, that's less than \$2 per person for each month!! (One person alone can get a Super subscription for \$59.99 per year, which is \$5.00 per month.) You might want to do the family plan with members in your lodge. You don't have to be related to be on the family plan. The group plan gives you opportunity to congratulate and encourage the others on the same plan. It also gives you encouragement to practice every day to keep your "streak" going. Just go to Duolingo.com to get started.

Crossings, Norway & North America, 1825 – 2025



2025 marks the 200th Anniversary of the first organized emigration of Norwegians to the United States. The single mast sloop, Restauration, left Stavanger on July 4, 1825, with 52 people on board. Often referred to as the "Sloopers," they arrived in New York City harbor on October 9, 1825.

The Crossings Bicentennial in North America is managed by a group of professionals representing numerous organizations that include the Norwegian American Historical Association (NAHA), Vesterheim Norwegian American Museum, Norway House, The Norwegian American newspaper, with representation from Sons of Norway and the Sons of Norway Foundation.

The Crossings website (<u>crossings.norwegianamerican.com</u>) is continually being updated. The Calendar (<u>https://crossings.norwegianamerican.com/events</u>) tab has a button to Register an Event, and lodges are encouraged to add their events.

Polar Star and Cleng Peerson Sons of Norway lodges are sponsoring a District 5 Cultural Weekend October 3-5 in Norway, IL., to commemorate the anniversary of the Restauration's arrival in the U.S. The Norsk Museum, and the Slooper Society of America are also sponsoring the weekend.

The "Celebrating Norwegian Immigration – The Slooper 200th Anniversary," will be three days of fun and culture, featuring Slooper and Fox Valley Settlement pioneer history, traditional Norwegian culture and craft programs and classes, Norwegian games and movie night, "Sluppen" fun walk, Norwegian barn dance with Norwegian folk music and food, traditional Norwegian worship service, and a chance to meet descendants of the first Norwegian-American immigrants at their Slooper Society annual meeting.


