#### Play Like a Viking



When metal detectorist Mick Bott unearthed dozens of small lead objects at the site of a 10<sup>th</sup> century Viking encampment in Lincolnshire, England, he figured they were just weights. However, experts determined he had actually discovered the oldest known complete set of gaming pieces for the ancient Viking board game Hnefatafl.

Hnefatafl is a strategy game similar to chess. Player 1 sets their pieces in a diamond shape in the middle of the board, surrounding the King. Player 2 sets their pieces along the edge of the board in two tiers. The game is won when the first player maneuvers the King into the corner of the board, or the second player takes the King captive.

You don't need to go treasure hunting to score your own Viking strategy game. Sets can be found online or at specialty gaming stores. You can even play Hnefatafl virtually by downloading an app to your phone.

#### Trollkrem - Troll Cream

Inspired by a classic Scandinavian recipe, this unusual-sounding dessert is actually very simple to make, and much more delicious than it sounds! Using tart lingonberries, Karen's creamy dessert is worth a try.

#### Ingredients

3 egg whites

6 Tbsp. of lingonberry jam, **or** an 8 oz / 225 g jar of preserved lingonberries in syrup, drained

\*50 grams / 1/4 cup granulated sugar (\*use only if using unsweetened lingonberries)



#### Directions

Whisk the egg whites in a mixer with half of the lingonberries (that have been drained) or half of the jam. Whisk until the egg whites are light and fluffy.

Add the sugar, if using, and whisk until the egg white mixture holds soft peaks.

Swirl the remaining lingonberries or preserve through the dessert and serve in small bowls or spoon into a large serving bowl. Eat within 24 hours, as the egg whites start to collapse if no sugar is used.

### Scandinavian Sow Hits the Big Screen

A litter of charismatic Norwegian piglets and their mum are the break-out stars of a new film, "Gunda," by famed Russian director Victor Kossakovsky. The film captures the daily lives of sow Gunda and her family as they sleep, snort and play on their organic farm in Undrumsdal, Norway, about 50 miles south of Oslo. The movie co-stars a plucky one-legged chicken and pair of cows.

There are no humans in Gunda, no voice-overs and no music. Kossakovsky chose to shoot in black and white to emphasize his cast's personalities over their cuteness. He boasts that working with them was a breeze. "With such an actress like Gunda, she is Meryl Streep," Kossakovsky said. "You don't need much work. I didn't ask her to repeat anything."

To film Gunda and her family, the crew built a large replica of her pigsty. Norwegian cinematographer Egil Håskjold Larsen attached a camera to a 360-degree track outside, with its lens poking inside the pigs' home. The crew documented the birth of the piglets and their antics as newborns, and then returned over the next few months to record them as they grew in size and character. On their last day of shooting, the film focused on Gunda's response as she finds herself suddenly alone, her brood having been taken away to meet their destiny at the dinner table.

A devoted vegetarian, Kossakovsky hopes his film will imbue his audience with a deeper respect for animals, encouraging viewers to give thoughtful consideration in regard to their culinary choices.

Gunda was produced by Norwegian producer Anita Rehoff Larsen, with American actor Joaquin Phoenix serving as executive producer. It was released in North America April 16, 2021. You can find out more on the film's website, <a href="https://www.gunda.movie/">https://www.gunda.movie/</a>
