

Detroit Auto Writer to Share Observations About Norwegian Car Market on February 23

Detroit automotive reporter Frank Markus, who serves as Technical Director, Motor Trend Brands at MotorTrend Group, will speak at our gathering on February 23 about developments in the Norwegian automobile market.

As widely reported, Norway has taken leadership in the electric vehicle revolution, seeking to stop sales of fossil-fueled vehicles on its roads by 2025.

Already there are far more EVs on Norwegian roads as a proportion of total vehicles than anywhere else in the world. Mr. Markus will share his experiences driving in Norway and show a video he shot while driving on assignment there.

The gathering at the Swedish Club at 22398 Ruth Street in Farmington Hills begins with social time at 4 p.m. followed by a meal of hot soups and crispy bread at 4:30.

If there is snow, you are invited to come an hour early and ski on the grounds at the Swedish Club.

A Letter from President Erik Duus

Godt Nyttår (Happy New Year) Nordkap Lodge!

I want to thank you ALL for allowing me the privilege to serve as your new president, alongside an incredible team of Board members. I also thank my predecessor, Haley, for her service and her wonderful servant's heart. Godspeed in your big move to NY and in all your endeavors! We look forward to saying "takkt for sist" (thanks for the last time) the next time we see you.

What a tremendous 90 year history our Nordkap Lodge has had/is making. So have you ever seen the wordplay of taking the word "history" and subtly changing it to read "His Story," meaning God's story? I used to think that was kind of cheesy, but when I thought more about it, I came to realize that it really means that His Story is never done or finished. History/His Story is still being written, told, really lived. That is what I have witnessed over the years vis-à-vis Nordkap Lodge. Every person has a hand and plays a part in its living "story." And how awesome that our Lodge family – and story – just grew/lengthened recently in the merger with Samhold Lodge!

Sons of Norway is about fraternity and community, and Norwegian culture and heritage (and in some states, even life insurance, LOL). I've heard it said that one of the reasons why Norwegians in America as a group are not very easy to find cloistered together - geographically, culturally, or professionally - is because Norwegians, historically, have assimilated intentionally and successfully. So in a way, we also need Nordkap Lodge just to know "it's not just us" out there...and to know we're not just crazy from having seen *Frozen* one too many times. For me and my family, Nordkap Lodge has always been there to help provide answers – and even sometimes more questions – to the "Five Ws:"

A couple quick Ws about me...I grew up on the "eastside," in Grosse Pointe Woods, Michigan. My father, Hans, came to the U.S. from Northern Germany when he was 27 years old. Because he went to a Danish school and he came from Flensburg (in Schleswig-Holstein, which was once part of Denmark) he has always considered himself a Dane.

My mother, Harriet, on the other hand, is unquestionably 100% Norwegian and hails from Hauge i Dalane (in Southwest Norway about 90 minutes from Stavanger, Norway's 4th largest city). She came to the U.S. when she was 15 years old. I am told that within just a few months people couldn't even tell that she came from another country (in fact, she would go on to teach middle school English for 37 years).

So I consider myself 51% Norwegian. And I'm sorry I couldn't help it, but I fell in love with a Canadian, like from Canada. Kristin is 100%, which is why I tell our daughters – Lolly and Charlotte – that they are 26% Norwegian (don't even try to do the math). But I am as “American” as they come.

Like every Norwegian-American, I much prefer the Winter Olympic Games. Although I root for Team USA all the way, I must confess that it's Team Norway that is inexplicably more connected to my heart strings (and tear ducts). *SIDEBAR: this was the first time I have ever used the term “Norwegian-American,” and I don't know if I like it, no offense. Because I am a proud American of proud Norwegian heritage, no hyphen is necessary. To me, it's literally the best of both worlds! While I love traveling to Norway – like you have no idea – I also love coming “home” to the States.*

So Ed & Eileen, my wife's childhood friends, have been married for 12 years...but they dated for 26 years beforehand! Between you and me, I really don't think Ed is going to buy Eileen anything “ruby” two years from now when they should be celebrating their 40th - it's like they will never get full credit.

Like Ed & Eileen's “partial credit,” my relationship with Sons of Norway/Nordkap Lodge extends many years (and experiences) beyond what my most recent membership pin would indicate. You see, for years I just didn't know what I didn't know. I didn't know about all the benefits that came with being a Lodge member. I didn't know that Lodge meetings weren't really “meetings” (I incorrectly assumed they were just for Board members or those really involved people). And I thought – like the other meetings we all attend – that I would need to prepare, contribute, or even do some “public speaking”...at the “meeting.”

Gutt (Boy), was I wrong! Because our “meetings” are not meetings at all, but rather fun – and sometimes really fun – “gatherings” (many times, dare I say, “party”). - Be a lodge member (for a minimum of 1 year prior to scholarship application) or child/grandchild of a person who's been a lodge member for a minimum of 1 year prior to scholarship application
- Be 17-23 years of age
- Be working towards a bachelor's or associate's degree from an accredited educational institution
- Be in good standing at school, with a Grade Point Average of 2.0 or better

Applications must be submitted by postal mail, postmarked no later than June 30. E-mailed applications will no longer be accepted.

To our Sons of Norway members, leaders, and friends:

This is the year of 2020, and my 20/20 vision for you is to invite your young people to an experience that will last a lifetime for them. Masse Moro gives our young people that Nordic Experience that they will cherish for a lifetime.

We are looking for a maximum of 60 to 65 campers, so to help us better plan for a super camp experience, we encourage registrations early or by April 1st. The dates for camp this year are July 12–25. The cost for this two-week camp experience is only \$850 per camper compared to similar programs that run over \$2000. There are many opportunities for campers to lower their cost for camp.

Early Bird Benefits: Early registrants get a better chance at scholarships and lodge matching funds by registering by April 1st. Registration, supporting forms, and information about scholarships can be found at www.massemoro.org.

Norwegians Give Sámi Name to Distant Star and Planet

A star and planet 200 light years from Earth were officially given Sámi names recently, following a national naming campaign in Norway. The star in the distant solar system has been named Násti, meaning “star,” while the planet is called Albmi, or “heaven.”

The naming took place as part of a worldwide campaign by the International Astronomical Union (the organization in charge of naming newly discovered stars and planets) in celebration of its 100th anniversary. The global campaign, known as NameExoWorlds, invites every country worldwide to name a designated planetary system consisting of a star and an orbiting planet. Each star can be seen from its assigned country and is visible through a small telescope.

Norwegians submitted a total of 824 proposals to name the star and planet duo. The winning proposal was submitted by high school student Emma Stefanussen, who said the idea for the names was suggested to her by an ethnic Sámi friend.

Stefanussen is a resident of Andøya, an island in the far north of the Lofoten archipelago.

The Birth of an Industry: Skiing in the U.S.

Skiing has deep roots in Norway, where rock carvings of ancient skiers date back as far as 4000 BC. Originally used for transportation across snowy and mountainous terrain, skiing for recreation gained momentum in Norway in the 1800s with the onset of organized tours, clubs and competitions.

In 1872, Norwegian immigrants in New Hampshire started North America’s first ski club. A few years later, a Norwegian immigrant in Minnesota became North America’s first ski manufacturer. But it was not until after World War II that recreational skiing became widely popularized in the United States.

The rapid growth of the U.S. ski industry after WWII was largely due to the 10th Mountain Division, a specialized U.S. military unit made up of elite skiers and mountaineers, including many Scandinavians. After fighting Nazis in the snowy mountains of Italy, veterans of the unit went on to teach skiing and establish dozens of ski areas in the U.S. Meanwhile, military surplus stores were flooded with low-cost skis, poles and boots, making the sport more accessible to newcomers than ever before.
