



Our Plans Downsized for Scandinavian Market

The Finnish Center Association is holding its annual Scandinavian Market on November 13th, and Nordkap will participate this year, but in a reduced capacity.

In past years, many volunteers from our lodge worked closely together for hours, helping prepare and serve our popular meatball dinner, complete with fixings. To better observe social distancing protocols, we will not be serving a meal at the Market this year.

What we will do is continue to offer our traditional Norwegian waffles with sour cream and jam. This service will be available in the main room of the center where the vendors sell their wares. It will be accessed in the bar area, through a window connected to the kitchen.

Topping our Sunshine Report: Honoring the lives of 2 WWII Veterans

With a heavy heart, we mark the passing of longtime Nordkap member **Clarence “Doc” Myrold**. Doc passed away July 1st at the age of 96. He had been a Nordkap member for nearly 79 years, longer than any of our current members. He was also a member of the men’s Norwegian Club of Detroit, the Swedish Club, and the Swedish Arpi male chorus.

Doc loved to sing. Anyone who heard the men of the Norwegian Club sing the popular Swedish drinking song, *Helan Går*, will remember Doc’s resonant baritone adding harmony and leading the singers.

He is survived by Cecile “Nan,” his devoted wife for 71 years, and by 5 children they adopted, 11 grandchildren, and 9 great-grandchildren.

Born in Detroit, Doc joined the U. S. Army after high school, serving in the Army’s 2nd Infantry Division during World War II. His unit was mortars, and Doc was an ammunition carrier. He spent 320 days in combat, seeing 5 major battles, including Normandy and the Battle of the Bulge, eventually moving up to staff sergeant. He was hit twice, once by the Germans and once by shrapnel from his own artillery. Luckily in both instances, the shots were nearly spent by the time they reached him, and although they hit, they didn’t penetrate his skin.

After returning home, Doc began taking classes at the University of Detroit where he would obtain his Bachelor of Architectural Engineering degree and Master’s Degree in Business Administration. After college, Doc began to work for General Motors before finding himself at Hubbell, Roth, and Clark consulting engineers. He retired on April 27, 1990, from HRC after many years of dedication. Doc continued to free-lance for several years, perfecting his craft. He had incredible skill, designing and building his family’s home that they shared for nearly 70 years.

We are also saddened to report the death of **Donald Eickholdt**, former member of Samhold Lodge and then Nordkap Lodge. Don passed away on June 22, on his 94th birthday.

Born in Detroit in 1927, Don watched his older brothers march off to WWII in Europe and Asia and signed up as soon as he could. Fortunately for him, Japan surrendered the day he was leaving for bootcamp. He got the news while at the Michigan Central Train Station. For the duration of WWII, he served in Guam and the South Pacific. He re-enlisted for Korea and served as a radar man and was a petty officer. His main ship was the USS El Dorado.




After Korea, Don worked with his uncles and brothers as a carpenter, eventually working in the display business where he traveled all over the country setting up auto shows. To say he enjoyed being a carpenter would be an understatement. He was always building something. There are examples of his work all over Southeast Michigan, from bar tops to cabinets at churches and hair salons, to the columns in the Romeo Masonic Temple, to dressers he has built for family members.

Donald was an active member of the Masons, serving as the Worshipful Master of Berkeley Lodge in 1976. He became a member of the Romeo Masonic Temple when he moved to Romeo and continued to be active in the lodge until his passing.

Don and his late wife, Marie Nelson Eickholdt, had 3 children, who survive him, along with 8 grandchildren, and 2 great grandchildren.

Five years ago today, on August 27, 2016, my family and I were in Norway traveling on the Bergensbanen train from Bergen to Oslo on that famously scenic seven-hour train ride.

I caught myself wondering how we could possibly see anything more beautiful than whatever breathtaking panorama we had just passed. In fact, the 22 stops we made and the 180 tunnels we rode through created some “white space” and visual “breaks” that almost seemed necessary in order to emotionally handle taking in all that beauty in one sitting.

Kristin recalls me saying to the girls that you know the scenery is amazing when the Norwegians [who live in Norway] are taking lots of pictures (because no matter where people live in Norway, they see gorgeous landscapes everywhere).

We needed that trip. Although I had been to Norway many times, this was my first trip there with my wife and two daughters. We started off visiting Stavanger and then traveled by bus and ferry to Bergen. From Bergen we took that unforgettable train ride to Oslo, where we took in the city for a couple days before boarding another train to Hauge i Dalane (my mother’s hometown).

We stayed with relatives throughout and of course tried to see as much family as possible. I will never forget our sweet and tender daughter, Charlotte, crying every time we left family to travel to visit other relatives; she didn’t want to leave wherever we were because we felt so loved!

Like passing beautiful scenery only to come upon more beautiful scenery up ahead, *how could we possibly leave family we just spent a lovely time with only to travel on and meet other wonderful relatives?* I know what you’re thinking, and you’re right...we need another trip to Norway!

Until then, the next best thing to being in Norway is being a member of Sons of Norway and Nordkap Lodge, where we also have loving family and wonderful friends!

Nobel Peace Prize Nominees Named in Oslo

The nomination process for the Nobel Peace Prize (*Nobels fredspris*) begins each September, and the laureates are revealed in October the following year. In December, the Nobel medals and diplomas are conferred along with a prize of 10 million Swedish *kronor* (the 2020 amount), around \$1.16 million U.S. dollars. Who was nominated and who made the nominations is kept secret for 50 years, even from the nominees.

In 1895, the will of Swedish inventor Alfred Nobel set up prizes for Peace, Chemistry, Physics, Physiology or Medicine, and Literature. The Nobel Peace Prize is awarded to those who have “done the most or the best work for fraternity between nations, for the abolition or reduction of standing armies, and for the holding and promotion of peace congresses.”

The award ceremony takes place at Oslo City Hall before the King of Norway each year on the death date of Alfred Nobel, December 10th.

From Sons of Norway Newsletter Service: Hope Floats

Inspired by Norway's stave churches, Hope Cathedral is a unique structure, floating on a barge near the mouth of the river Glomma in Fredrikstad, Norway. It is constructed out of timber and over a thousand plastic fish boxes. The multi-colored fish boxes, recovered during shoreline clean-ups, have been recycled into jewel-like roof tiles.

Solveig Egeland, an artist and cultural advisor to the Church of Norway's Diocese of Borg, was inspired to start the project back in 2018 as she witnessed more and more plastic waste being deposited on her favorite beaches. In their stead, she envisioned an edifice of many colors rising from the sea. That fall, 35 volunteers banded together to realize her dream.

They have since been joined by thousands of people from across the globe, binding people of different faiths and nationalities together into a supportive, sustainability-focused community.

Now nearly finished, Hope Cathedral was opened to the public on June 5, 2021.
