
Bring Cookies & Enjoy Pasties in November

Nordkap Delegates Report on Sons of Norway Conventions

At our members gathering in October, the four Nordkap delegates who attended the Fifth District convention in Wisconsin gave brief reports on their experiences.

Dennis Flessland headed the convention's Fraternal Affairs Committee. There he mentioned three concerns from our lodge:

- That the name Sons of Norway should be changed to be more gender inclusive
- That we had misgivings about the decision to reduce pages in the *Viking* magazine designated for district photos
- That an additional sports award should be offered exclusively for jogging.

Dennis noted the election of new District 5 Officers, including Cheryl Wille-Schlesser, elected president, and Nathan Nutter, elected treasurer. (Nathan subsequently submitted his resignation due to work commitments and the time needed for the position. District Secretary Darlene Arneson will be listed as interim treasurer until January when Corey Olson will take over as treasurer.)

Dennis also reported the defeat of the resolution to bar District 5 members from wearing helmets with horns, since depicting Viking helmets with horns is not historically accurate. The resolution drew only one positive vote among 105 delegates.

Jan Flessland and Karen Herche both reported on the cultural events and historical re-enactors that added extra color to the convention. Jan thanked members for electing her an alternate. She took the place of delegate Magda Pecsenye, who couldn't attend.

Phyllis Skora showed photos from the convention. She was elected by the district to serve as a delegate to the International Sons of Norway convention, held remotely on Zoom. Phyllis said the international delegates were sent Norwegian cookies to enjoy at home during breaks and were treated to music on the Hardanger Fiddle played by Robin Fossum.

Viking Magazine Reduced to 6 Issues a Year Starting in 2023

As you may have read in your November issue of *Viking*, the Sons of Norway magazine will be reduced from 12 issues a year to six, beginning in 2023.

The change was one of the tough decisions the International Board faced during an annual budget review, according to Ron Stubbings, International President of Sons of Norway. While the number of fraternal members of Sons of Norway has been steadily growing, sales of the organization's financial products have declined over the past decade.

"Over the past two years," he pointed out, "the organization has cut \$2 million in operational expenses, and the Board has sought other ways to scale back the budget." He said changing the frequency of the magazine was necessary "in order to be one of the fraternal organizations that survive."



Other fraternal organizations are shrinking. "We want Sons of Norway to be around another 50 years," he explained. "Nearly every fraternal organization has migrated to 100% digital publishing, but knowing how much members appreciated receiving *Viking*, we are glad that we can still offer bimonthly print editions of the magazine." A Letter from President Erik Duus:

So what's *your* **favorite Norwegian expression?** Mine is unquestionably "Takk for sist," ("thanks for the last time"). And I love saying it to my Tante Myrtle [Ebert], not just because when I see her it's "memorable," but because I think she gets a kick out of me saying it, since few, if any, others in her life greet her that way!

Like Habit #2 from "The 7 Habits of Highly Successful People" – *Begin with the End in Mind* – "takk for sist" picks up the relationship right where it left off. It's a beautiful and emotionally intelligent way of communicating with people you care about and like to be with. One could even make the case that living a "takk for sist" life might help people intentionally create great times with others because one day they'll have to thank them for it! A "takk for sist" mindset creates stronger memories, too, since one's brain (and heart) can't help but recall the prior visit, get-together or gathering just before uttering those words, "takk for sist."

Speaking of "takk for sist," in February 2020 I began my very first president's letter in Nordkapen with the following:

"I want to thank you ALL for allowing me the privilege to serve as your new president, alongside an incredible team of board members. I also thank my predecessor, Haley, for her service and her wonderful servant's heart. Godspeed in your big move to NY and in all your endeavors! We look forward to saying 'takk for sist' (thanks for the last time) the next time we see you."

...A LOT has happened since February 2020! On the bright side, Haley Vingsness came back to Michigan (and Nordkap!) and as soon as she could, she plugged back into serving our lodge, most recently as vice president. Additionally, since I had rotator cuff surgery in April, Haley has gone above and beyond in helping me with my Nordkap duties as I took needed time off for my recovery and rehabilitation. I can't say "takk for sist" enough, Haley...tusen, tusen takk!

The Norwegian word for "rumor" is "rykte," and the rykte is true... Last month, the week before my last week of physical therapy on my *left* shoulder, I suffered a massive rotator cuff tear in my *right* shoulder! Thankfully, I had a promising surgery to repair it on October 18th, and "no," I did not say "takk for sist" to my surgeon (Uff da, maybe I should have!).

This new setback, along with work challenges and other family health concerns, has forced me to reflect and prioritize. So it is with deep regret that I will be stepping back from serving Nordkap Lodge as a board member beyond the end of this term, at least for the foreseeable future. Haley has graciously offered to, again, stand in the gap for me for the remainder of my term. Eventually, I hope to follow the example set by her in leaving, and then coming back...I can hardly wait! In the meantime, I look forward to creating some mutual "takk for sist" moments with you ALL down the road.

So takk for sist to all of you, and "tusen takk" for allowing me the privilege to serve as your president, alongside an incredible team of board members!
