We'll Join the Swedes in Their "Midsommar"

This year as Nordkap's traditional Midsummer on June 23 and the Swedish Club's "Midsommar" on June 24 come so close together, we're closing ranks and joining the Swedes in their celebration of the longest day of the year. It'll be fun to learn more about how our friends, the Swedes, celebrate a holiday we both observe.

The venue will be familiar to Nordkap members. It's the Swedish Club at 22398 Ruth Street in Farmington Hills. The festivities will be Scandinavian, but definitely Swedish in character. The Detroit Swedish Foundation is again sponsoring their event.

Their Midsommar celebration will kick off between 11 a.m. and noon on Saturday, June 24. It will include Scandinavian music, a beer and wine tent, a buffet luncheon, and traditional singing and dancing around a Maypole festooned with fresh flowers. The Swedish folk group *En Gång Till* (One More Time) will be the entertainment highlighter.

The luncheon will be a typical Swedish Midsommar spread, normally with meatballs, potatoes, and other fixings. The price is \$10, not including beer and wine. Children 15 and under are

Sunshine Update: Heather & Jarrod Mentor a Winning Robotics Team

Lodge member **Heather Vingsness** stepped back this year as head coach of Detroit Catholic Central High School's Shambots First Robotics team due to a job change, but she continues on as a team mentor with her husband, **Jarrod Brown**. She has set the stage for a successful program, as recognized by the Team Sustainability award won by the Shambots at the State Championship.

The CC Shambots were proud to be nationally recognized with the Quality Award in the Curie Division of the World Championships! This is the team's third Worlds appearance and their first national award. The Quality Award celebrates machine robustness in concept and fabrication. Building the robot is only part of their success, and the judges recognize them as a quality example to others.

The road to Worlds included a Division Championship win and State Championship Division win. Their alliance placed 6th in the state out of almost 500 teams. Team Captain Philip Austin has worked hard all year in leading the team in their most successful season ever. Next season, the team will practice in the school's new \$35 million STEM wing. There will be a dedicated machine shop and computer lab overlooking the basketball court-sized practice field for robots.

The team is very lucky to have the support of Detroit Catholic Central High School and several dedicated corporate partners, including KLA, Mitsubishi Electric, Ford, DTE, GM, and Strattec. Students are gaining work experience by interning at these companies and preparing for careers in engineering, computer science, and design.

FCA is kicking off a new capital campaign this month focused on restoring and enhancing our building, which is now 50 years old!
