In Memoriam

Sadly, Nordkap Lodge lost two beloved members in the past few months:

Inger Ehrenfeld of Plymouth, Michigan, passed away at home on August 10 at the age of 92. She was a Golden Sons of Norway member, with membership dating back to 1973. Her death was reported by her son, Harald Ehrenfeld. She is also survived by her daughter, Heidi Car of Bee Cave, Texas, and three grandsons.

Inger hailed from Rjukan, Norway, where her father, Holt, worked at the "heavy water" factory in Telemark. During World War II, he was one of those "Hidden Heroes" who worked quietly to help defeat the Nazis and win the war. Holt was part of the underground operation to deny the Germans access to the factory's water, which they could have used to make atomic bombs. Soon after, he had to escape to Sweden to avoid capture and almost certain death at the hands of the Nazis.



In peacetime, Holt was a woodcarver by hobby. Meanwhile, his daughter, Inger, had moved to America, married, and joined Nordkap Lodge when Holt visited her in 1994. He realized that Nordkap needed a gavel, so he carved one in the shape of a troll's head, probably to lend a bit of extra authority to the presidents who would wield it. We still use that gavel at our monthly members gatherings.

Besides coming to our gatherings, Inger and Harald were regulars at Nordkap's Norwegian language classes where she was a great

resource. Lodge members will fondly recall the delicious pastries she made and contributed to our events.

The family plans to return Inger's remains to Rjukan, Norway, next year.

Nancy Redilla, 89, a Sons of Norway member for 29 years, passed on September 14 at home in Davison, Michigan. Her death was reported by her son, Ted Redilla.

Nancy was a longtime member of Samhold Lodge but transitioned to Nordkap in 2020 when Samhold merged with Nordkap.

Anyone who knows Nancy will recall her remarkable love of animals. She was always happy to relate her escapades with Blossum, a good friend's goat. Nancy was so fond of dogs, she baked homemade dog biscuits for them. Each year, she was a regular at the Pet Blessings at Unity Church in Rochester. Her efforts in behalf of animals culminated in strong support for ARK—the Association to Rescue Kritters, a wildlife rescue service that rehabilitates injured wild animals and, when they recover, returns them back to the wild. ARK is located in Michigan's Roscommon County.

A Letter from President Haley Jarasz:

This fall, we have something truly special to celebrate: 200 years of organized Norwegian immigration to the United States. To mark this historic milestone, His Royal Highness the Crown Prince Haakon of Norway is visiting the U.S. to greet the replica of the ship Restauration, honoring the courage of those first immigrants who set sail across the Atlantic with little more than hope and heart. My own family immigrated to the Traverse City area, settling in "Swedetown."

For our lodge, this anniversary is more than just a date on the calendar. It's part of our story. Many of our members can trace their roots back to those early immigrants who built homes, churches, and communities that kept Norwegian traditions alive even as they embraced a new land.

When I lived in Texas, I visited the town of Clifton, knowing little about it besides that it had a Norwegian Christmas celebration. I had no

idea that I was visiting one of the very first Norwegian immigrant communities. I definitely didn't expect to see historical Norwegian farms in rural Texas. Cleng Peerson, who sailed the Restauration, took one of the very first groups of Norwegian immigrants to Texas in 1850... the diaspora is truly country-wide!

For our native-born Norwegian members, this visit is a reminder of how strong the bond remains between Norway and the United States. And of course, the timing of Crown Prince Haakon's visit couldn't be better. The World Series playoffs are in full swing—and rumor has it the King himself is a Yankees fan!

As we welcome the Crown Prince, let's celebrate the friendship between our two nations, 200 years strong.

Leif Erikson Day is Celebrated on October 9

Leif Erikson

Leif Erikson [Leiv Eiriksson] was a Norse explorer, known for the discovery of Vinland around the year 1000. Leif and his companions may thus have been the first Europeans to "discover" America.

Leif was the son of the Norwegian-born Eirik Raude [Erik the Red] and his Icelandic wife Tjodhild. He grew up in Greenland.

According to Erik the Red's saga, Leif Erikson sailed to Norway in 999. There he was baptized and commissioned to introduce Christianity to Greenland. His father is said to have refused to accept the new faith, while his mother was baptized and built the first Greenlandic church.

We do not know for sure when Leif died. He is last mentioned alive in 1019, and was probably dead before 1025, because according to the Fostbrødrenes saga, his son Torkell had by then become chieftain in Eiriksfjord and lived on Brattalid.



The Vinland Expedition

According to Erik the Red's saga, Leif went off course on his way home to Greenland from Norway in 999 and discovered a land with self-sown wheat fields and vines (Vinland). In Grønlendingenes saga, however, it is said that Leif's discovery of Vinland was the result of a planned expedition.

A Norse settlement was found in the 1960s at L'Anse aux Meadows, on the northern tip of Newfoundland in Canada. This has been interpreted as the Vinland of the sagas. If Vinland refers to a land where wine grapes grow, the latter option is most likely.

The memory of Leif's voyage to Vinland

The memory of Leif Erikson and the significance of his discovery were seriously raised at the end of the 19th century. At the World's Fair in Chicago in 1893, which was dedicated to the 400th anniversary of Christopher Columbus' first voyage to America, Christian Krohg's painting of Leif Erikson was sent from Norway, and the ship Viking--a copy of the Gokstad ship--was taken by Magnus Andersen across the Atlantic to Chicago and became the subject of great attention.

In 1964, U.S. President Lyndon B. Johnson proclaimed October 9 as an official national day of remembrance in memory of Leif Erikson's discovery. The date of Leif's arrival in Vinland is not specified in the sagas, but it is said to have been in the autumn. October 9 was chosen because the Norwegian emigrant ship Restauration arrived in New York on this date in 1825.

Nordkap Book Club Finds 'The Escape Artist' Not a Scream

Four members of the Nordkap Book Club met on September 28 on Zoom to discuss the first book of the fall 2025 season, *The Escape Artist*. This book initially held out much promise as the story of the exciting theft and recovery of Edvard Munch's painting "The Scream" in 1994.

However, most club members found it focused too much on Charley Hill--the eccentric Art Squad detective from Scotland Yard who recovered the painting--and strayed from the main story of the robbery and the crooks who pulled it off. While detective Hill was an interesting character, author Edward Dolnick seemed to be stuck analyzing Hill's personality and psychological make-up. Readers also felt the book was somewhat disorganized and needed tighter editing.

Next up will be *How To Be Norwegian* by Lorelou Desjardins, with discussion at 7 p.m. Sunday, October 19, on Zoom.
