

Sons of Norway and Fifth District Scholarships

The International Sons of Norway Foundation is now calling for 2019 Scholarship Applications. The scholarships have varying due dates and are time sensitive.

Many of the scholarships provide study opportunities in Norway, but several are applicable for universities and colleges in the U.S. Go to <u>www.sofn.com</u> and select "Foundation" from the top toolbar. A dropdown menu will list the available scholarships.

The 5th District of the Sons of Norway also offers two book scholarships and a scholarship for study in Norway. Go to the District's website at <u>www.sonsofnorway5.com</u> and click on "Benefits" at the top to see the categories of scholarships available.

Scholarships for attending **Masse Moro**, District 5's summer heritage and culture camp for youth ages 9-15, can also be found on their website under "Programs." 2019 dates are July 13-27.

Nordkap Scholarships Applications due June 30

Nordkap Lodge also offers a scholarship program. Applicants must submit the required forms no later than June 30.

To be considered for a Nordkap scholarship, applicants must be a lodge member or child/grandchild of a member for minimum 1 year prior to scholarship submission; be 17-23 years of age; be working towards a bachelor's or associate's degree from an accredited educational institution; and be in good standing at school, with a GPA of 2.0 or better.

Forms are available on our <u>www.DetroitNorwegians.com</u> website. Click on the "About" tab at the top and select "Scholarship".

Last year, Nordkap awarded five scholarships, each worth \$500. We published a letter from one of the recipients in our October issue. Here is one from Norm and Judy Kirsch's granddaughter, **Marie McMenamin** who is studying archeology at the College of Charleston:

"...I would like to thank you for giving me the scholarship. It will allow me to pay for some of my school. This coming semester I will be taking Classical Archaeology, Classical Mythology, Intro to Linguistics, Latin 202, and Modern History. This scholarship will help with paying for some the fees for these classes. Again I would like to say thank you. I hope you all have a Happy Holiday."

Save the Date—September 14-- for Nordkap's 90th Anniversary Party!

Is there a river cruise in your future? We hope so, and we're working to make it come true. Nordkap's 90th anniversary committee is planning a three-hour dinner cruise on the Detroit River the evening of September 14 in celebration of this milestone anniversary of our lodge. You, your family, and guests are invited to come along.

Why a river cruise? Boats were a chief means of transportation for our Viking ancestors. The Viking longboat was an engineering marvel of the ancient world. The Vikings sailed them with expertise on major rivers and open waters as they sought their destiny.

So we, too, will take to the water to mark this important 90th year in the history of our lodge. We have no Viking longboat, but we've chosen a great alternative -- the MV Portofino, a sleek 130-passenger ship that regularly plies the waters of the Detroit River from its home base at Portofino restaurant in Wyandotte.

Important: Please Report the Hours You Spend on Behalf of Nordkap

It's that time of the year to count our hours spent in our lodge. The reason that we report our lodge hours is important to help the International Sons of Norway keep its nonprofit, tax-exempt status. This information is required by the American Fraternal Alliance (AFA). The AFA uses our data to lobby on the behalf of fraternal benefit societies.

With this newsletter is a two-page worksheet which will help you determine your hours. The <u>Fraternal Support</u> <u>Worksheet</u> represents: **Preparations** for lodge meetings, events, etc. **Points** represents number of times that you worked on these activities. **Hours** represents the hours that were involved (includes travel time). The <u>Community</u> <u>Service Worksheet</u> represents: Attending meetings, events, participation in community services with the lodge and outside of the lodge. **Hours** represents the hours that were involved (includes travel time).

Please don't worry about having the exact time and hours. An estimate will be accepted.

Please submit just the **TOTAL YEAR END POINTS AND HOURS** for the **Fraternal Support** and the **Community Service** to Mary Morehead by January 30, 2019.
