These boxes contain items like beef, bison, fish, chicken, pork, and seasonal produce.

Meet Norse Valley member Jo Norman!

In our continuing effort to get to know your fellow local Lodge members, I interviewed Jo in June and here's the scoop...

Do you have a Board position with Norse Valley and what are your duties?

I am a member of the Norse Valley Lodge board. I share the position of Marshall with my husband, Stuart. The Marshall position makes sure that the flags are set up for each meeting as well as getting out the song books and placing them around the tables. We help with any pre- and post-meeting setup as needed. I also co-chair the Nominating committee that helps find members that are interested in taking on board positions, and then nominate them for approval by the entire chapter.

Talk me about your childhood.



I was born in Georgia where my Norwegian family settled after moving south from New Jersey. I was 3 months old when we moved to the San Juan Islands in Washington State. My father, a life-long Merchant Marine, wanted to farm on an island where he still had a connection to the water and could easily make trips to Alaska, which he really enjoyed. However, that life was too much for my mother and we moved to Seattle after 2 years. I spent the rest of my childhood in Seattle and my dad went back to being a Merchant Mariner. Because he was not around much, my 3 sisters and I only got a smattering of Norwegian traditions woven into our upbringing. We learned a few Norwegian words and ate Knackebrod and Tilslorte Bondpiker, which are still favorites today, consumed during holidays.

How long have you been connected with the Sons of Norway?

We joined Sons of Norway about 5 years ago after a Norwegian friend came to visit and told us about his involvement in SON in the Seattle area. He made it sound very interesting and worthwhile, so I went online and found Norse Valley Lodge. We were instantly welcomed and have been very happy participating with this lodge.

Talk about your Norwegian heritage.

My grandparents emigrated from Norway in 1905. They landed in New York and resided there while my grandfather got established at an engineering firm there, then they moved to Teaneck, NJ, where my two uncles and father were born. My grandfather commuted to New York City for his job, which included being on the engineering team for the Empire State Building elevators, and the team that designed the revolving stages for Rockefeller Center.

My roots in Norway are Risor (grandfather) and Mandal (grandmother). My great-grandfather owned a hardware store in Risor that is still operated by family today. My grandmother's family were fishermen. We have visited cousins there twice, as well as cousins that spread out to Varhaug, Bryne and Stavanger. My grandfather was not the first in the family to emigrate to the US, however. My great great aunt and uncle came to America with a group of 25 Lutheran families and a minister in the

1800s and settled Mt. Morris before Wisconsin became a State. I lost my entire family genealogy in a hard drive crash so I can't tell you their names, but I know I still have family in that area.

What are your interests?

I really enjoy fishing, especially fly-fishing, gardening (veggies and flowers), watching bull-riding, programming computer automations, and the Packers - Go Pack Go!

What is one thing that makes you somewhat unique or is something no one knows about you but you are proud of?

While I made my career in the IT industry for 33 years, with degrees and certificates in that area, I am most proud of the certificates I earned from Gemological Institute of America in diamond and colored stone identification and grading. I am very fond of pretty shiny things and have collected boxes of gemstones little by little over the years. We even stopped at Tvedestrand while in Norway and had lunch in this small town that is the Sunstone capital of the world. Sunstone was used by our Norwegian ancestors for seafaring navigation.
