If you are unable to come on November 6, you may make some at home and bring it the night of the dinner (November 9th).

Please let Lois Gruetzmacher know how many rounds you are bringing.

What you missed if you didn't attend the October 18th Lodge meeting!

Guest Speakers John Scott and Greg Zahn presented the story of the Nelson-Bailey Norwegian Log House to approximately 25 attendees of the Lodge meeting in October.

John (pictured below) is a board member of the Saxonia House (German) and is knowledgeable about the Nelson-Bailey Norwegian Log House that is being relocated to Freedonia (midway between Port Washington and Random Lake) from DeForest in Dane County. The Nelson-Bailey Norwegian Log House will sit adjacent to the Saxonia House, which is also going through renovation itself.

The Saxonia House served as a brewer's family residence, a social hall, an inn for new settlers in the area while they built their own homes in the village, and a Post Office. A nearby brewery and cellar were also constructed on the property.

The Nelson-Bailey Norwegian log house is circa 1840-1850 and will cost approximately \$137,000 to make the 82 mile move. Ribbon cutting for the completed Norwegian log house restoration is now planned for June 7, 2026.

The Saxonia house will be an Artists retreat once the renovations are completed in 2026.

We raised \$75.00 for the Sons of Norway Foundation as we auctioned off a number of wrapped mystery items. The money will be used for college scholarships. Thanks to those who donated items and those who bid on them.

Please Consider being a Convention Delegate

The Sons of Norway District 5 convention will be held in Stoughton, Wisconsin in August, 2026. Details will be available later.

It is time to be thinking about electing delegates to the convention. Delegates are to be elected and names sent to the secretary in March of next year. Our lodge will likely have three delegates.

Anyone who has been a member in good standing for at least six months and who is sixteen years of age or older can be elected. The delegates responsibilities are:

- •Read the reports book sent by the district secretary containing reports and resolutions.
- Attend the two-day District 5 Lodge meeting.
- •Vote on all items brought before the group.
- •If appointed, serve on a committee considering an aspect of the business such as resolutions, reports, or finance among others.
- Accept any awards for Norse Valley from the past two years.

The new Board will recommend financial support for delegates and bring that to the membership for a vote before the election of delegates takes place.

There is a silent auction for delegates to raise funds for the district. Each lodge is encouraged to send an item or basket of items of good value to offer for the auction.

Our lodge might also want to support the fund raising by sending a certain amount of money with delegates to bid on something to be brought back to Norse Valley for use as a door prize at a future meeting.

Norway's Thanksgiving

Like the United States and Canada, Norway, too, has a celebration of thanksgiving, and it is called Høsttakkefest, which most easily translates to "Harvest Thanksgiving Feast."

Its roots are old and reflect both religious and secular tradition. Although Christianity did not come to Norway until around 1000 A.D., the roots of Høsttakkefest predate it. However, once the country was Christianized, it followed much the same timeline as Mikkelsmess (Arch Angel Michael's Mass) celebrated by the Catholic Church since 380 A.D.

It normally took place in September to celebrate the end of the harvest. In 1770, the celebration was abolished as a public church holiday in Norway and Denmark. However, in 1918 it was reinstated in

the Norwegian liturgical calendar, and from 1999 the Church of Norway made it an optional celebration.

The secular roots of Høsttakkefest are agrarian and tied to the practice of pastoral migration, the seasonal movement of people and their livestock. In rural Norway, Høsttakkefest is traditionally the autumn day on which a farm's livestock and its tenders move from a higher summer farm, or "seter", to the main farm in the valley below.

Nonetheless, the season is full of thankful thoughts and celebrations. To me, Thanksgiving is one of my top two holidays. It is more than the harvest, turkey, cranberries, yams, stuffing, mashed potatoes, pumpkin pie, or parades. It gives me time to reflect about my life, family, friends, freedom, and the world. I really have had a blessed life and have much for which I am thankful. But for now, let me choose one blessing — Sons of Norway.
