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February Meeting

New Beginnings

It was decided by consensus at the January meeting to give a donation to New Beginnings for refugees, but those in attendance requested to have A New Beginnings board member give more information before deciding on an amount to give. Please ignore the information I gave about the matching grant New Beginnings was to receive. The amount I gave was the original amount, but more recently new information has come out. There have been changes including the fact that the New Beginnings office, English language classes, and shopping pantry will be moving to First United Methodist Church in February where the rent will be much less. Therefore, the amount of the grant has been reduced significantly and I don't have information on the structure of the grant. The board member will be allotted 10 minutes so as not to interfere with our program, so please be respectful of that.

You more than likely are aware that the new administration has stopped refugee resettlement for at least 4 months. However, we still need to take care of the recent arrivals, giving them a chance to succeed as our neighbors. I applaud them for their courage. New Beginnings receives no government funds and relies strictly on the good hearts of local people for funding. It is wonderful to live in a generous community.

Book Club

The next book club meeting will be at **9:30 a.m. on Thursday, March 20** at our usual place, the room off the **deli at 2510**. We will read The Son Avenger, the final book of the tetralogy The Master of Hestviken by Ingrid Undset. " Powerfully written and filled with magnificent vignettes of the daily life of a medieval estate, 'The Son Avenger' suggests a Greek tragedy whose vision of fate coexists with a Christian sense of suffering and forgiveness" is a description written of the book. Even if you haven't read the series, you are invited to join us to listen in on the discussion.

Kicking off the Bicentennial of Norwegian Migration

On July 4, 1825, a group of 52 Norwegians set sail on the ship Restauration to make the first organized migration from Norway to North America. Since that first voyage, about 900,000 others have followed, leaving their homes in search of opportunities and a better life. While many returned to Norway, most stayed and built a new home in the New World. Today nearly five million people in North America claim Norwegian ancestry.

This year, Sons of Norway and Crossings commemorate 200 years of organized Norwegian migration to North America. It's a year to celebrate the strong ties between Norway, the United States, and Canada. It's an opportunity to remember what it means to take great risks and trade one home for another. And it's a chance to better understand the movement of peoples that continues worldwide today.

On July 4, 2025, a replica of the sloop Restauration will set sail for New York, retracing the route 200 years after the first organized group of Norwegians departed. We are reminded of struggles for religious freedom and better living conditions that inspired so many to risk the journey. Aboard the replica ship, the Randaberg Yngre Mannskor recorded the Thomas Kingo hymn Sorgen og Gleden (Sorrow and Joy) that may have been sung on board, with the mixed emotions that the migrants must have felt:

Sorrow and joy go hand in hand together Fortune, misfortune as neighbors do dwell Luck and adversity call to each other Sunshine and clouds are companions as well Earth's brightest gold is but fine mold Heaven alone is where bliss can unfold

Crossings – 200th Anniversary of Norwegian Migration

2025 marks the 200th Anniversary of the first organized emigration of Norwegians to the United States. The single mast sloop, Restauration, left Stavanger on July 4, 1825, with 52 people on board. Often referred to as the "Sloopers," they arrived in New York City harbor on October 9, 1825. The coordinated undertaking for the 200th anniversary has been identified as Crossings, Norway & North America, 1825 – 2025. The Crossings Bicentennial in North America is managed by a group of dedicated professionals representing numerous organizations that include the Norwegian American Historical Association (NAHA), Vesterheim Norwegian-American Museum, Norway House, The Norwegian American newspaper, with representation from Sons of Norway and the Sons of Norway Foundation.

Sons of Norway Involvement

Sons of Norway lodges and other cultural organizations and educational institutions have an opportunity to partner to create exceptional, entertaining and memorable programming in recognition of this anniversary. It should be noted that 2025 is being referred to as a commemoration, not a celebration: immigration brought opportunities to new arrivals, but also negatively affected existing nations.

Sons of Norway Foundation

The Sons of Norway Foundation has made a financial contribution to assist in the communication efforts for Crossings as this milestone is likely beneficial to many of our lodges. Now is the time for Sons of Norway lodges to consider their options, potential partners, and begin planning for 2025. The Sons of Norway Foundation grants and scholarships program is a funding resource for lodge projects and programs. Grants reach grassroots communities across the country and Norway, and scholarships bolster education and cultural exploration domestically and internationally. 2025 projects related to the 200th anniversary will be given preference for grants. Viking Swords in Oslo Airport

In early September, a new exhibition was installed at Oslo's Gardermoen Airport. This display consists of seven Viking Age swords that have been unearthed in various places in Norway. The project was a joint effort between the Historical Museum and Gardermoen. Each sword has additional information with it and there is a QR code that travelers can scan to visit the museum's homepage.

The hope is that the exhibition will promote cultural experiences in Norway since nearly four million people will likely pass by the display within the year. The director of the airport, Stine Ramstad Westby, is very pleased that they now have an Edvard Munch and Viking Age exhibition as those are two things that Norway is well-known for. A couple of the first passengers to see the display were asked their opinion on it and they shared the same sentiment; they immediately felt the culture of Norway when they saw it.



Catching Up with New Scandinavian Cooking

Chef Andreas Viestad is known for New Scandinavian Cooking, which revolutionized the cooking show by placing the food and its origins in the foreground of breathtaking Norwegian nature.

A unique aspect of the show is that it is actually filmed twice- first in Norwegian for domestic tv—named <u>En Bit Av</u> <u>Norge</u>—A Piece of Norway. Then the entire show is re-shot in English for its worldwide viewers.

Since its inception in 2003, New Scandinavian Cooking has been shown in over 130 countries. Viestad has toggled as host with chefs from Sweden, Denmark and Finland. In 2020, Norwegian Christer Rødseth became the host of Season 16.

Hailing from Aurskog outside of Oslo and called "a young star in the cooking stratosphere" by culinary team Nortura Proff, Rødseth started cooking at age 9, inspired his grandmother. Now there is seemingly no end to the irons that Chef Rødseth has in the fire- he is a restaurateur in Oslo, appears regularly on Norwegian tv, wins international culinary competitions and has written several cookbooks.

The Digitization of Norway

Norway has its sights set on becoming the world's most digitized country by 2030. While that date seems far away, the work has already begun. This initiative is part of a new national digitization strategy that was created to set clear goals to achieve the digital Norway of the future. Prime Minister Jonas Gahr Støre points to three main benefits that will result from this strategy: a simpler and safer everyday life, a more competitive business sector, and a more modern public sector.

The digitization initiative is a response in part to other factors, including a growing elderly population with a shrinking work force. Despite this, work tasks will continue to grow and the need to remain competitive in the global market will continue.



The strategy contains five core measures that planners say are vital to its success. Included in these measures are offering high-speed broadband services, education and training, building infrastructure around AI, faster processing, and safeguards in digital marketing and use.

Coffee Steak Rub

From Viking magazine, March 2020

The smoky aroma of coffee pairs beautifully with spices for this dry rub mix. Use it on beef steaks such as flank, hanger or ribeye. Let the rub sit on the steak for 1 hour or overnight before cooking. Makes 1/2 cup dry rub mix.

- 2 Tbsp. finely ground coffee
- 3 Tbsp. brown sugar
- 1 Tbsp. kosher salt
- 1 Tbsp. ground coriander
- 1 1/2 tsp. caraway seeds, ground
- 1 1/2 tsp. ground black pepper
- $1 \ 1/2$ tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 1/2 tsp. ground ginger

Mix all ingredients together and store in an airtight jar. It will last for 6 weeks at room temperature.

Dry rub tips from <u>Just Cook with Sally</u>:

Apply your dry rub liberally and work it into the meat. It is called rub, not a sprinkle, for a reason. Once coated, I place the meat on a nonreactive dish, cover it with paper towels, and stick it in the refrigerator. The time air drying in the refrigerator aids the meat in developing a crispy exterior. Before cooking, use your fingers to wipe off excess dry rub and



remember not to add any additional salt, either directly or in salty additions such as soy sauce or canned broth, unless it's labeled low sodium.

After the meat has finished cooking, let it rest. This allows the juices to settle and the muscle to relax. Keep in mind that larger cuts of meat will continue to cook while resting. They can increase 5 degrees while resting, pushing them from medium-rare to medium. Use a meat thermometer and remove from the oven with the resting factor in mind. Steaks and smaller cuts of meat should rest 10 minutes, tented with foil. Larger meats, like a turkey or a standing rib roast, need 15 minutes to a half hour, tented. When you're working out your meal timeline, make sure to account for rest time.
