WE SET SAIL...on an adventure, Saturday morning Aug. 13th, to see a ship named *Viking* in Geneva, II. The ship is an exact replica of the Gokstad ship found on the Gokstad farm buried in what has been called "the king's mound" in 1880.

The Gokstad ship was unearthed near Sandar, Sandefjord, Vestfold, Norway when the two sons of the farm's owner decided to dig inside the earthen mound to discover if anything exciting was hidden there. "The burial mound around the ship had been built up of clay and peat. It was approximately five meters high and had a diameter of almost 45 meters. Likely, the mound was even larger in Viking times. The ship itself was buried in blue clay below ground level. The two upper strakes and both the bow and stern posts protruded from the clay and had therefore been destroyed, but otherwise the ship was exceptionally well preserved."


During the Viking Age, this ship was a flexible, fast ship suitable for the open ocean.

Dave and Dave were the captains of our voyage that amazed us and exceeded our expectations.

The dimensions from the original ship were used to create this replica that was commissioned for the 1893 World's Columbian Exhibition in Chicago, II.

It took 28 days to sail her from Norway to Chicago. Thousands of Norwegian-Americans came to see this ship at the World's Fair, and as it made various excursions afterward. "Friends of the Viking Ship" is fund raising to build a permanent structure for the ship.

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Monday, May 15 - Depart U.S.

Depart Chicago on the transatlantic flight to Reykjavik via Icelandair.

Tuesday, May 16 - Arrival in Bergen

Connect in Revkjavik with the continuing flight to the Bergen airport, where Chloe and her fiancé Roelke met with a textile curator. Bergen is Norway's second largest city, known as the capital of the west and gateway to the fjords. It is a UNESCO world heritage city with the Bryggen wharf, Mount Fløien, and the fish market as central attractions. Meet your professional tour manager and coach, and transfer for hotel check-in (after 3P). Rest and refresh before gathering for a Welcome Dinner at the hotel. (D)

Overnight at Scandic Byparken

Wednesday, May 17 - Bergen

Enjoy a two-hour guided stroll through the central harbor area. The Bryggen Hanseatic Wharf takes you back to the Middle Ages with its well-preserved buildings. Delight in the fish and flower market as well. The afternoon and evening are free to participate in the Syttende Mai (Constitution Day) parade and activities - be sure to eat plenty of ice cream and sausages, typical for the holiday. Overnight at Scandic Byparken

Thursday, May 18 - Bergen/Voss

Depart Bergen for Vossevangen on the Vangsvatnet Fjord, where you are greeted by snowy mountain tops, valleys and forests, rivers, waterfalls, and lakes. The village, located between the famous Sognefjord and Hardangerfjord, has been a gathering place for fiddlers and dancers for centuries. Visit the Voss Folkemuseum for a guided tour of Mølstertunet, which dates back to the 1500s and was featured in Fiddling With Fate's historical plotline as site of the fiddling competition Britta and Erik attended in 1888. We'll also visit the beautiful stone church, built near the lake in 1277, before checking in at the historic Fleisher's Hotel, established in 1889. (B, D) Overnight at Fleischer's Hotel

Friday, May 19 - Voss/Ulvik

Leave Voss and travel to Ulvik, a cozy village on the shores of Hardangerfjord. In the region you will find many fruit orchards and farms that produce their own cider from the region's apples-just as Solveig's sister did in Fiddling With Fate. During the 13th century, growing apples was introduced in Hardanger by monks from England. Today 40% of all Norwegian fruit is grown in the Hardangerfjord region. Visit an orchard farm in the area for coffee. Visit the church in Ulvik. Hotel check in. Overnight at Brakanes Hotel . (B, D)

Day by Day Itinerary

Saturday, May 20 - Ulvik/Eidfjord/Lofthus

Depart Ulvik and stop in Eidfjord to visit the Hardangervidda Nature Center, which is an exciting experiential center for Norwegian nature, climate, and environment. After lunch, our coach will take us up through the tunnel to Kjeåsen mountain farm, featured in Fiddling With Fate. Said to be Norway's most inaccessible farm, Kjeåsen is inhabited only in the summer months and lies like an eagle's nest on a mountain ledge 600 meters above the Simadalsfjord. Continue to Lofthus for hotel check-in and dinner. Overnight at Hotel Ullensvang (B, D)

Sunday, May 21 - Utne/Lofthus

The Hardanger region is a center of living cultural heritage. The Hardanger fiddle, the traditional Hardanger folk costume, and Hardanger embroidery are all well known national symbols. Travel by coach and ferry to Utne to visit the Hardanger Folkemuseum, primary setting for Fiddling With Fate. Enjoy a Hardanger fiddle performance and tour of textiles at the museum. Have lunch at the historic Utne Hotel, where Chloe and Roelke stayed, including a history talk. After lunch, return to Hardanger Folkemuseum for a tour of the open-air area focusing on Tveismestova House, featured in both of the book's timelines. Enjoy some free time to see the rest of the museum and gift shop. Overnight at Hotel Ullensvang (B, L, D)

Monday, May 22 - Lofthus/Vrådal

Follow the National Scenic Route of Hardanger to Låtefoss. Pass through the city of Odda at the head of the fjord, between steep mountain slopes. Continue the journey to Røldal and Haukeligrend, while driving alongside Europe's biggest mountain plateau, Hardangervidda. Enter the Telemark region, an important area for Norwegian traditions. Stop for lunch at the historic Dalen Hotel. Check in at your hotel for dinner and overnight. Overnight at Straand Hotel (B, L, D)

Tuesday, May 23 - Vrådal/Oslo

In the morning travel to Oslo, the charming capital of Norway which is situated at the head of the Oslo Fjord. You will pass through the village of Heddal, where you can visit the stave church. Explore Oslo on a four-hour city sightseeing tour with a local guide. Enjoy panoramic views of: the Opera House, Karl Johansgate (Oslo's main street), old town Christiania, Akershus Castle and Fortress, and the Royal Palace. Visit the Norsk Folkemuseum located at Bygdøy in Oslo, which is Norway's largest museum of cultural history.

See large indoor collections, the world's oldest Open-Air Museum and a 12th century stave church. Check in at your hotel and say goodbye to your tour manager. Overnight at Thon Hotel Bristol (B)

Wednesday, May 24 - Oslo

The day is free to pursue individual interests in Oslo. We recommend the Norwegian National Opera & Ballet, Holmenkollen Ski Museum, the Resistance Museum in Akershus Fortress or the City Hall, site of the annual Nobel Peace Prize award ceremony. Enjoy a farewell dinner tonight. Overnight at Thon Hotel Bristol (B, D)

Thursday, May 25 - Oslo/Return to U.S.

Transfer to the airport for your return flights. Arrive home today enriched by your discoveries of folk traditions and history in Norway. (B)

The Bakken Family Enjoys Norway!

Our stay in *Odda* started off with a scenic drive there from *Preikestolen*. The trip has many beautiful vistas and points of interest. Fjord and other aquatic views are a constant thing on this drive. Here, as in most of Norway, the terrain is steep so the roads climb and fall dramatically, pass through many tunnels and traverse over scenic bridges. Along this journey there are also many waterfalls, some of them named and with viewing areas for snapping a few photos. One such stop for us was at *Latefossen* along Highway 13 near Odda. Here, the waterfall is so close to the roadway that your vehicle gets wet as you drive by. The falls are a thing of beauty and quite accessible. There's also a gift shop there. Kip and I also made the trek back out of Odda later that day to *Langfossen*, another tremendous waterfall.



The AirBnB in Odda was a quaint and attractive cottage with a great view of the fjord and the mountains to the east. We learned while travelling that each AirBnB host has a different take on what constitutes a stocked kitchen. Our host in Odda had a great cast iron wok that I wish I had at home.

In Odda we spent the entire day hiking *Trolltunga*. Hayden and I tackled it via ferrata. Trolltunga Active in *Skjeggedal* offers a guided trip complete with climbing gear, bicycles, and photography. The trip starts with a bike ride of about 6km. Following that, we hiked upward through the boulder field before climbing the 250-meter sheer face of the mountain using ladder rungs of steel that are set into the rock. The climb is a safe one but offers some of the best scenery of our trip including views not available on the regular hike to the *Troll's Tongue*. After the climb there is still a 3km hike to get to Trolltunga. The trail is winding, snowy, and at times, muddy. Every step is worth it though when you take those last few out onto the tongue. There were many people there and we had both our guide and family snapping photos.



Kipalee witnessed two "Simba" poses and saw one marriage proposal take place on the tongue while she was waiting there for us (she said yes by the way). For me, it was a bit surreal walking out there. What does one do whilst standing in the most iconic location in Norway? I ended up just sitting on the edge and taking in the well-earned view. The hike down was also beautiful but a bit of a letdown after the amazing experience at the Troll's Tongue. Once back at the parking lot, Odda is only 25 minutes away by car.



This hike is at most, a once in a lifetime opportunity for most people. It's something that I will never forget. I encourage everyone to work, save, and sacrifice to travel to Odda and complete this excursion. You will never regret the experience!



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Strawberry Fruit Soup

1 qt. cranberry or apple juice; I use apple juice 1/2 cup minute tapioca 1 lemon thinly sliced 6 whole cloves 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg 1/2 teaspoon salt 11 oz. can of mandarin oranges 10 oz. frozen strawberries with sugar. When thawed, use the juice



Combine juice, tapioca, lemon, cloves, and nutmeg in a pan. Bring to a boil, then simmer gently for about 10 minutes. Add remaining ingredients. If too tart, add some sugar. If too thick add some apple or cranberry juice.

Serve plain or topped with dollop of sour cream or whipped cream. Can be served as first course or dessert. May also be served over cake slices. Ann Walser

SALMONETTES

1 (15 oz.) can pink salmon, drained and flaked 1 egg 1/2 cup biscuit mix 1/2 cup oil



Mix salmon and egg in bowl. Add biscuit mix and stir. Heat oil in ______ on mixture by tablespoonfuls into skillet.

Flatten each salmonette with spatula. Cook each side until brown, around 2 to 3 minutes per side. Serves 4. <u>The Four Ingredient Cookbook</u> Mary Gullickson-Krantz

Drømmer Kjeks -Dreams Cookies 1/2 cup butter 1/3 cup sugar 1 cup flour 1/2 tsp baking powder 1 tsp. vanilla 15 almonds, blanched

Method: Cream butter and sugar, add vanilla, then flour and baking powder sifted together. Knead well. Chill. Shape into small balls. Press one half almond in center of each cookie. Bake about 15 minutes at 300 degrees F.

Vennelag cookbook--Mary Gullickson-Krantz

My name is Tore Jørgensen, and I was born in Kristiansund, Norway two years after WW II ended. We immigrated to Canada in 1957, but my family moved back to Norway in 1967, as I stayed to finish my schooling.

My father, along with hundreds of Norwegian policemen all over Norway, was arrested during the Nazi occupation of Norway (1940-1945) under the code name *Aktion Polarkreis* on August 16, 1943. They were arrested because they refused to carry out the orders of Reichskommissar Josef Terboven. They objected to the execution of Oslo Police Chief, Gunnar Eilifsen, for refusing to arrest three girls that did not attend mandatory work detail required in Nazi-occupied countries.

They understood that the time had come to no longer sit on the fence, but to take a stand. Two hundred and seventy-one policemen, including my father, were sent to Stutthof concentration camp in Eastern Poland.

By now-1944- not even the Germans had much confidence in victory, but the brutality toward the prisoners continued without restraint. It was here the Norwegian police prisoners achieved real camaraderie with their fellow sufferers and were to play a role in their survival and resistance.

Finally, we see the German collapse and the folly of a war based on the myth of racial superiority. Once their unity as a 'band of police brothers' contributed to their survival.

The book also provides a reminder of the unmitigated evil of the Nazi regime. We see and meet psychopaths chosen from civilian prisons to torment and terrify the helpless internees. Supervisors who boast openly about the number of prisoners they have killed; and Jewish and Slavic women worked to death and then incinerated. The book is unique, enabling readers to experience closely the redemptive force of conscious choice against evil.

Once my father returned to Norway, he dedicated his life to those, like him, who suffered from PTSS (Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome) over what they had experienced and seen. He passed in 1998.

I have spent the last 22 years translating into English, diaries, and memoirs and published a book under the Stutthof Diaries Collection 'For Truth & Honor'. I have also created a website

<u>www.stutthofdiaries.com</u> features, not only my book, but interviews of Stutthof survivors, Norway at War, and movies featuring Norway during the Nazi occupation 1940-1945.





<u>Looking ahead</u> to the <u>November 17</u> lodge meeting (one week earlier than usual due to the Thanksgiving holiday.)

Title: HANS HEG, AN AMERICAN STORY

Synopsis: Hans Christian Heg is an example of a very American story – immigrants coming to the United States and fighting for their adopted country. This presentation, which was first given as the keynote address at the Heg statue rededication in May 2022, will explore Heg's story in the context of immigrant veterans and their service. Presenter: Chris Kolakowski, Director of the Wisconsin Veterans Museum

Christopher L. Kolakowski is Director of the Wisconsin Veterans Museum, a position he has held since January 6, 2020. He was born and raised in Fredericksburg, VA, but his mother's family has deep roots in the Badger State. Chris received his B.A. in History and Mass Communications from Emory & Henry College and his M.A. in Public History from the State University of New York at Albany.

Chris has spent his career interpreting and preserving American military history with the National Park Service, New York State government, and the Rensselaer County (N.Y.) Historical Society, the Civil War Preservation Trust, Kentucky State Parks, the U.S. Army, and the MacArthur Memorial. He has written and spoken extensively on various aspects of military history and leadership from 1775 to the present. He was the inaugural Director of the General George Patton Museum and Center of Leadership at Fort Knox, Kentucky.
