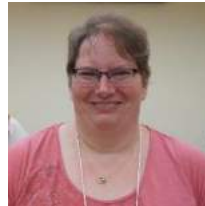

REMINISCING ABOUT MY NORWEGIAN HERITAGE

One spring day in 1856, at just about noon, lightning hit the Nes Hoved (Head) Church. The church can be found on the point of land about 25 miles NE of Oslo where the Vorm and Glomma rivers meet. Nes Hoved was to that area what Notre Dame is to Paris. It was a large, stone church with a spire that had been there in some form since the 11th Century. Quick work saved the polychrome 16th Century pulpit, the slightly newer altar, a carved chandelier and a large oil portrait of a former pastor, Jacob Finckenhagen. In a little over two hours, all that remained were the massive stone walls. Both my mother's and father's families have roots in this area that go back as far as the records reach, so this church had played an important part in my family, quite literally, for centuries.

A large, red brick church was soon built a short distance away and dedicated in 1860. It is still referred to as the "New Church", and incorporates the altar, pulpit, chandelier, and some other decorative elements saved from the fire. The church still uses the stone baptismal font that survived the fire and may even be older than the church that burned.

In 1910, the "New Church" celebrated 50 years and commemorative brass medals were struck from metal of the melted bell. Two of these were sent to my grandmother by her parents who were later to be buried in the New Church's graveyard. The two medals show the New Church on one side, but one medal shows the old church prior to the fire on the other side while the second medal shows the overgrown ruins of the old church on the second side.

Norway is both a very new country and a very old country. By European standards it is new, since the Constitution was written in 1814 and the current government, a constitutional monarchy, was not established until 1905. It is very old since some of Europe's oldest written history, dating as long ago as the 6th Century or earlier, documents events that took place, but with questionable accuracy. Norway has churches of stone and wooden (*stav*) as old as Nes Hoved that did not burn and serve to this day as functioning parish churches.

Well into the 20th Century, the ruins of Nes Hoved stood neglected, but as times changed, an appreciation for national history and for places like this developed. The area was cleaned up, the walls stabilized, and the overgrowth cleared away, so the roofless enclosure now serves as a dramatic venue for weddings, local festivals, and concerts. The surrounding area has been archaeologically explored and interpreted. It is now a popular point where the rivers converge and has signs and plaques that tell the history and geography of the area.

Nes Hoved is also said to be haunted. *Prost* Finckenhagen's ghost is said to appear at night. Several hazy pictures with indefinite glows can be found online. In 1999, I was in the area, with my daughter, who was 14, for a family wedding. It was an overcast day in mid-June, giving it a "gothic" feel. The lilacs outside the walls of the church were in full bloom. *Prost* Finckenhagen's cast iron grave monument stands amid the lilac bushes. I told my daughter to stand by the monument for a picture and we would see if there might be an extra "person" in it. *Prost* Finckenhagen's grandson had gone to Iowa in the mid-19th Century over what his family felt was an "unacceptable liaison" with a dairy maid (he took her with him). Their daughter married my great-grandma's brother. I knew this family well when I was growing up. I told my daughter that *just maybe* he might show up in the picture as a "shirttail relative". Not surprisingly, the picture came back showing only my daughter, the monument, the old stone walls, and some very unthreatening lilacs. Still, it captures a setting that shows how far back my history goes and is typical of how deeply many of our families are rooted in Norway.

Are you up for a little wine tasting?

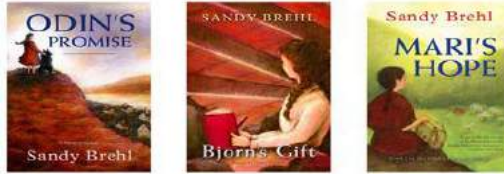

Friendly 5th Fisheree - June 9th at the Wille Farm, Indianford

For those of you who missed it, this was a great time and a great day to be outdoors. Yes, I get it, our schedules get really busy this time of year. I had other places I could have been that day too, but I had an opportunity to bond with stepchildren and step grandchildren and teach them to do something fun and outdoors that didn't involve screens. My stepson had fished a few times as a child, but his children had virtually never fished before.

The facilities were very nice. Cheryl and her brothers and sister-in-law did a super job of preparation for the event. The dining area was a very nice and clean shop, well appointed with a large grill and tables and countertop and refrigerators. All the conveniences of home. Having lunch first is always a great way to start a party and who wants to eat after getting all fishy?

After spending the first hour eating lunch and socializing, it was time to head to the lovely little lake and try our luck fishing. I personally had spent much of the preceding week finding, cleaning, and sorting out my fishing equipment that had been ignored for much too long.
