Beneath the troll's eyes are additional plantings which will be visible next year. Grass has been sown completing the vision of a troll rising forth from the hill.

Vennelag Lodge, in addition to many additional District 5 Lodges, as well as groups, and individuals have contributed to the funding of this project. Janice Sievers, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Village of Mt. Horeb are working jointly on bringing this venture to fruition. It only seems fitting that the Troll Capital of the World should be home to another great troll presence.

MASSE MORO, A BEHIND THE SCENES LOOK

From July 23-27, I volunteered in the kitchen for the 5th District's heritage camp, Masse Moro. The camp was held outside of Fall Creek, WI, and adjacent to Beaver Creek Nature Reserve. The camp is one of the District's best-kept secrets. Translated from Norwegian, literally, *Masse Moro* means, "lots of fun".

What does it take to cook three meals a day for a group of 75 campers and counselors? Mange ting! It takes many hours of preparation to satisfy the campers and staff. I am proud to say that our returning kitchen personnel, Linda Watkins and Tammy Kopacek were fabulous. They not only attended to the food needs of our youth and staff, but both being school employees, they also had the best interests of our campers at heart. When someone needed a friend, they were there to listen. Masse Moro is blessed to have such a caring team of workers.

This year, 53 campers between the ages of 9-15 from Arizona, California, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Texas, Washington, D.C., and Wisconsin were in attendance. Participants learned traditional skills such as: carving, rosemaling, folk painting, leathercraft, and woodworking. They also worked with clay, participated in many sports, baked Norsk treats, went hiking, and were actively engaged in special evening programs. Two of our specialists this year were Carol Bender, a veteran rosemaler, and Jimmy Miller, an energetic woodcarver. Zach Garner, one of this year's directors, taught woodworking skills. Believe it or not, our second director Keir Kristiansen led instruction in the fine art of baking vafler!

Music is central to everything that is done at Masse Moro. The Table Prayer is sung before every meal, and much learning of the Norsk language is done via music. This year it was led by native speakers who came to Camp from Norway! In addition, a youth dance group from Wergeland Lodge in La Crosse joined the campers for an evening of folk dancing.

Campers also had access to a nearby nature center at Beaver Creek Reserve. One of the naturalists provided insight into the critters that call this area home. The butterfly exhibit was back for our campers to enjoy along with the live animal displays inside the center. An evening program was held at the Hobbs Observatory led by astronomers from UW-Eau Claire.

Numerous campers were in attendance this summer whose parents were previous campers. A celebration of the 40th Anniversary was held at the end of the session. Guest speaker, Jon Grinde, a former International Board member, spoke of the camp's creation in 1978. Culver's provided custard and Vennelag Lodge supplied pepperkaker cookies for all to enjoy.

If you know a young person who is of age to attend Camp next summer, please bring their name forward to the Lodge. We are happy to support our youth in this extremely worthwhile celebration of their heritage. Our support is matched by the 5th District, significantly reducing the fees for families. The fee for 2020 will be decided by the District 5 Board of Directors in October but should be close to this year's rate of \$800.00. By comparison, District 1's language immersion camp, Skogfjorden, has fees upward of \$2,100 for the same amount of time, making our camp costs extremely affordable.

The camp has need for additional food and activity volunteers. If you are interested in volunteering at Masse Moro, please contact me for further information. Overnight accommodations are available at Camp, if you so desire. Camp dates are tentatively set for July 11-25, 2020.

Line servers welcomed visitors and provided the best of what we had to offer. Lastly, at the end of an extremely hot day, the clean-up crew entered to tear down the tables and chairs. They returned them to our storage unit despite lightning bolts and pelting hail. I appreciated the help of those who swept and washed the floors, too. Together Everyone Achieves More...What a great team we made!

Never underestimate the value of what we provide. The Kaffe Stue provides Norwegian-Americans with a meaningful way to celebrate their heritage, a place to meet old friends, and a perfect venue to find the foods that people remember from their youth.

<u>"The Boys Who Challenged Hitler - Knud Pedersen and the Churchill Club"</u> by Phillip Hoose This book is about a group of teenage boys who, after April 9, 1940, wanted to emulate the Norwegian resistance to the Germans and fight back thru quick hit-and-run acts of sabotage.

<u>"Skis Against the Atom"</u> by Knut Haugelid. Another interesting book of Norwegians vs Germans in WWII. This is very similar to the authentic version of "The Heroes of Telemark".



Each holiday season the American Swedish Institute in Minneapolis adorns the Turnblad Mansion with decorations from the five Nordic countries of: Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, and Sweden. This exhibit runs mid-November to mid-January. The mansion is open Wednesday evenings until 8 PM. Private tours are given of the mansion at a cost of \$15.00 per person.
