Swedish Glögg

Recipe by Chef Marcus Samuelsson Adapted from foodandwine.com, serves 10

For this version of Swedish mulled wine, chef Marcus Samuelsson spikes white wine and rosé with vodka infused with cardamom and ginger. The drink is aromatic and delicious.

- 4 cinnamon sticks
- 2 tsp green cardamom pods
- 2-inch peeled fresh ginger, chopped
- 4 tsp finely grated orange zest
- 12 whole cloves
- 1 cup vodka
- 2 750 ml bottles dry white wine
- 2 cups dry rosé
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 tbsp vanilla sugar
- ½ cup blanched whole almonds
- ½ cup raisins

Use a mortar to crush cinnamon and cardamom. Pour into a quart jar and add ginger, orange zest, cloves and vodka.



Cover and set aside

for 24 hours. Strain vodka, discarding the solids, into a large saucepan. Add white wine, rosé, sugars, almonds and raisins to pan and stir over moderate heat. Heat until bubbles form around edges but do not boil. Serve hot.

The glögg can be refrigerated for 1 week and rewarmed before serving.

Did You Know? Facts about Lutefisk

Lutefisk is exempted by the state of Wisconsin from classification as a toxic substance in laws regulating workplace safety.

Sterling silver should never be used in the preparation or eating of lutefisk as it will stain the silver.

Left overnight, any remaining residue from lutefisk preparation is nearly impossible to remove.

The self-proclaimed "lutefisk capital of the world" is Madison, MN, home to fiberglass codfish, Lou T. Fisk.

Vennligfolk used to hand out songbooks containing the words to the three national anthems we sing at each lodge meeting (American, Canadian, and Norwegian). For the Norwegian anthem the songbook also contains the English translation. If one was quick (and did not know Norwegian), a glance at the English translation would give an idea about what was being sung. Now with only the Norwegian words being projected on the screen, that is not possible.

This version of "A little English/ litt på norsk" provides opportunity to do some direct comparing of the English translation with the Norwegian words familiar to all. We sing only the first verse. Although the song has eight verses total, only the first, seventh, and eighth are used for the national anthem. The Nov-Dec 2020 Vennligblad described how a young Rikard Nordraak scored the music while his cousin, poet Bjørnstjerne Bjørnson, wrote the lyrics. Though played and sung for over 150 years, "Ja, vi elsker" was not officially adopted as Norway's national anthem until December 2019!
