Norway's coastline is an estimated 18,000 miles, and includes nearly 1,200 fjords. Excluding the fjords, the coastline would measure approximately 1,600 miles.

All Things Kubb

The Scandinavian lawn game *Kubb* (pronounced koob) has been described as a cross between bowling and horseshoes, with a little chess thrown in for good measure, Five *kubbar* (wooden blocks) are placed on the short sides of a 5x8 meter "pitch". The pitch can be set up on a lawn, on sand, concrete, or even snow or ice. A larger wooden block, called the king, is placed in the center of the pitch. The object of the game is to knock down the *kubbar* on the opposite side of the pitch by throwing a wooden baton, called a *kastpinnar*. The team that succeeds in knocking down the *kubbar* and the king wins.

Kubb tournaments occur throughout Europe and the United States. The World Championship has been held on the Swedish island of Gotland since 1995. On December 13, 2011, Eau Claire Wisconsin declared itself the Kubb Capital of North America. The city has hosted the National Championships since 2007. 2021's event will take place from July 9-11. Kubb has become a micro-culture in Eau Claire. It's even been integrated into the school system's physical education curriculum.

Anyone can play. There are no age, skill level or experience restrictions. Peggy Schroeder owns a *Kubb* set, and has been promoting *Kubb* as a lodge activity. Let's get a game or two on our agenda for when we can finally meet in person again!
