Crab Mousse

2 pkgs. cream cheese-8 oz. ea.

1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 envelope Knox gelatin

3 T. cold water

1 c. celery chopped fine

½ c. green onion diced

½ tsp garlic powder

1 t. horseradish

1 c. mayonnaise

1 lb. crab meat-2 cans, or lump crab broken (Shrimp may also be substituted or combined with the crabmeat.)

Paprika for garnish

Soften gelatin in the 3T cold water.

Heat cream cheese and mushroom soup in the microwave, stirring until well blended. Combine the softened gelatin and warmed mixture.

Remove from microwave and add the chopped celery, onion, mayo, garlic powder, and horseradish. Mix well.

Place in a mold and refrigerate. Sprinkle with paprika after unmolding on a platter. Serve with your choice of crackers-Triscuts or Ritz work nicely.





LEEK SOUP

Ingredients

- 3 Tbsp butter
- 3 Leeks, sliced
- 5 Potatoes, medium
- 2 Carrots, medium
- 1/4 cup (1/2 dl) flour
- 1 Quart (liter) beef broth
- 2 Egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 1 Tsp salt
- 14 Tsp pepper
- Fresh parsley, chopped



Directions

Melt the butter in a large heavy bottomed saucepan. Cut the leeks in half lengthwise and wash thoroughly. Slice. Dice the potatoes and carrots and add with the leeks to the saucepan. Cook five minutes while stirring occasionally to prevent vegetables from browning. Add flour stirring constantly; remove from heat and add broth all at once while continuing to stir. Reduce heat and let simmer until vegetables are tender. Beat egg yolks into a soup tureen. Pour soup over egg yolks, a little at a time, stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Sprinkle with fresh parsley. Serve at once.

Crime novels have become especially popular in Norway. Great authors to follow include:





NYHETER FRA NORGE-NEWS FROM NORWAY

Almost every third person who lives together with someone in Norway is doing so as a cohabitant. The proportion of cohabitants is constantly increasing according to Statistics Norway (SSB).

Out of 65% of Norwegians who stated that they live together, 30% said that they live together as cohabitants. The remainder are married.

The proportion of cohabitants has risen by around 10% in recent decades and has never been higher. Out of the entire population between the ages of 16-79, the proportion of cohabitants is approximately 19%. The number of married people had been steadily declining in the same period.

Thirty-eight percent of those who are ages 25-29 years are cohabitating today. Of those who are aged 30-34 years, 37% are choosing to live together. The proportion of cohabitating decreases as age increases, comprising the lowest group.

Norway's Stave Churches at Risk

Hundreds of years ago, more than 1,000 stave churches stood in small communities across Norway. Today 28 stave churches remain. Maintaining these church takes the greatest care, but those possessing the skills to do so is dwindling, which threatens the future of these exquisite buildings.

The earliest wooden churches were built directly into the ground, and they began to decay within a short time. In the 1100's construction methods changed, raising the buildings above the ground and saving many of them.

"The Norwegian Directorate for Cultural Heritage has spent a lot of money in recent decades restoring the churches. However, it was a lack of money that caused these churches to remain in place for so long. The Norwegian people were poor and could not afford to construct new buildings. They maintained their churches well saving some of them to today."

Tubfrim History and information

Postmaster Ditlef Frantzen in Nesbyen, Norway established TUBFRIM in 1928. The aim was to collect and sell used stamps and use the proceeds to aid the eradication of tuberculosis among Norwegian children. The first profit was made in 1929 and amounted to NOK 1.500. Profits varied in the following years from NOK 8.000, in 1940 to NOK 25.000, in 1947. TUBFRIM has made good progress since from then and profits in 1970 were NOK 150.000, growing to NOK 650.000, in 2018.

TUBFRIM has from the start in 1928 donated over 23 million NOK to charity

TUBFRIM is owned by the Norwegian Health Association (Nasjonalforeningen for folkehelsen). Today the profits are used to help children and youth with disabilities, and children and youth with handicaps in Norway, and to finance the efforts to eradicate tuberculosis.

Understanding Norwegian Character

To understand Norwegian character, one first needs to understand the geography of Norway. It is not simply a big country with a small population. It is a big country with a small population that is exceptionally inconvenient to travel around. Crossing fjords, traversing mountain ranges, most roads, with few exceptions are single lane. Trains are required to stop in passing places to allow other trains travelling in the opposite direction to pass. There are plans on the drawing board for water tunnels in some places in Norway to ease the summer traffic congestion. Where possible, more mountain tunnels and roundabouts will see the light of day.

Most of the Norwegian population has lived in isolated communities of several hundred or thousands. This isolation has had a profound effect on Norwegian character. Over centuries, Norwegians have developed a deep dislike of crowds. The average Norwegian is consumed by a desire to be alone whenever possible. Those from the country rarely travel to the cities, and those who live in the city will spend hours driving to isolated areas where they can be on their own in nature.

The Norwegians are not social people and social situations make them feel uncomfortable. This is because social situations require small talk, and there is nothing more alarming than making small talk. Fear subsides with a few libations but the taxation on alcohol ensures that this happens rarely. If you plan to travel to Norway, it is a good idea to pack some of your favorite spirits.

The desire for solitude means that relations are categorized, and Norwegians keep large parts of their life secret from others. Friends are reserved for enjoying hobbies, so Norwegians have a variety of friends central to each hobby. Colleagues remain in the workplace, and it is extremely rare for a Norwegian to invite a colleague over for dinner.

For the average Norwegian, the ultimate good time is hiking 12 hours up a mountain with a trusted friend in total silence. When reaching the top, they enjoy a cup of thin coffee from a flask and a Kvikk lunsj bar, speaking only to say how nice it is to be alone. Then they turn around and head down the mountain for another 12 hours. Every Norwegian home proudly displays a framed photo of the two friends at the top of the mountain with the unspoiled view of the countryside behind them. 

Norway's Rising Star Winter Athletes

With its snowy climate and ample trail access, Norway is an ideal place for athletes to train and excel at winter sports. Norway is home to some of the world's finest winter athletes. Norway has won more Olympic medals than any other nation since the first Winter Games in 1924. Included here are the stories of three young athletes that you might want to follow.

At the age of 4, Silje Norendal strapped on her first snowboard, and she has never looked back. In 2014, she won a gold medal at Aspen's Winter Games before heading to the Olympic Games in Sochi where she competed in the women's slopestyle event. She has won four X Games gold medals and is known for her stylish riding and jumping maneuvers. She is one of the Top 20 X Games Snowboarders of All Time.

Mats Zuccarello started ice skating on the ponds near his home in Oslo as a child. At age 18, he made his hockey league debut, followed by playing time in the Elite Swedish League. He represented Norway at the Vancouver Winter Games and was spotted by scouts for the National Hockey League (NHL). He was signed in 2010 by the New York Rangers and is one of eight Norwegian nationals playing hockey on this side of the Atlantic. Today, the 33 year is a passer for the Minnesota Wild franchise. Committed to giving back to his home country, Zuccarello has established the Zuccarello Foundation and supports grass roots sports in Norway.

A new cross-country ski phenomenon from Norway is Johannes Høsflot Klæbo, 24. His grandfather gave him his first pair of skis at age 2, and the Trondheim native has become sensation in his sport. At age 21, his won three gold medals at the Olympics in PyeongChang in 2018, making him the youngest Olympian in his sport. He has gone on to win numerous other international events, and he is the youngest male to attain these honors.

Following is an outline of what you will need to do to earn your pin:

Unit 1:

- > Fill-in the evaluation form and submit them to me. I will send them to the headquarters for crediting.

I have found some gems via the South-Central Library System, in a vinyl record format! You will need a turntable to listen to the recordings, but I am sure that you will enjoy them.

This music will make the day much more bearable. Do not forget to search for current composers, as many of them produce music that is just as good as the old-time originals. Will the purchases of more electric cars make the construction of tunnels in Norway cheaper? A bonus in converting to the use of e-vehicles will be the reduction of costs associated with ventilation systems in the tunnels. NOK 300 million can be cut in the development of the ventilation system in the Rogfast tunnel alone.

The Norwegian Government's climate goal for all new cars being sold by the year 2025 is zero-emission-free. That compares to the U.S. goal of emission reductions by 2035.

"With less emission from cars, we need less ventilation than before," Minister of Transport Knut Arild Hareide (KrF) noted, emphasizing that such a move would not affect safety in Rogfast. "We hope that the reduction in emissions from cars can lead to cuts in the second tunnel in the future," the Minister of Transport added.

The Rogfast Tunnel will be the world's longest and deepest underwater road tunnel, connecting the Stavanger area with Haugalandet. The cost for the tunnel is set at NOK 24.8 billion.
