Celebrate Norwegian Culture

"Sons of Norway is your destination for discovering and celebrating the rich tapestry of Norwegian culture . . . we have something for everyone." Sons of Norway website.

Nordic Trunk Information and Guidelines:

The District 5 Cultural Committee would like to encourage all Lodges to enhance their Norwegian culture experience by taking advantage of an opportunity for your lodge members. District 5 has a Norwegian Culture Collection in the form of three different containers (trunks), to assist you in discussing our heritage at your Lodge meetings. The trunks were created and made by Owen Christianson and contain examples of our Nordic heritage that have been donated over many years to these collections. The three trunks are identified as:

- 1. Viking Chest 2. Immigrant Trunk 3. Mini-Family Immigrant Trunk
- 2.

The Viking Chest was the first trunk. In addition to the cultural items, it contains a written history of the creation of the collection and includes information about the Viking House located at the University of Wisconsin, Green Bay.

Each trunk contains different items representing Norwegian culture such as rosemaling, Hardanger embroidery, books, recipes, tools, cooking utensils, and much more. Included in each trunk is a list and description of each item, a list of suggested activities for sharing the items, and a space to document and describe new contributions.

Change in Trunk Rotation:

Due to the changes in our By-laws regarding Zone Directors, the Committee is looking at a different process to deliver the trunks to our Lodges. The Cultural Committee plans to track the containers and be a clearinghouse for arranging their routing throughout the district. Members are asked to assist in moving the trunks from one lodge to another. Communication will be important between lodges. Our goal is to keep the travel distance as short as possible. This will be a challenge for the eastern and southern part of the district where lodges are quite far apart, but if several people who can drive can find meeting places, a trunk could be transferred with 3 or 4 drivers cooperating.

The Cultural Committee will do our best to provide all three trunks to your lodge over a period of time. The trunks will be reviewed and updated by members of the Cultural Committee at the Spring and Fall Board meetings.

Donating to the Nordic Container Collection:

- Lodges are encouraged to donate to the collection, write a description of their donation on the sheet in the trunk, and email a copy to the District 5 Cultural Director.
- -All donations to the trunks will become the property of District 5, therefore

NOTHING IS TO BE REMOVED FROM THE COLLECTION.

The Cultural Committee will distribute the donations among the trunks, so your donation may be found in one of the trunks other than the one in which it was originally donated.

Sons of Norway District 5 Convention 2024 June 19-22 Indianapolis Crowne Plaza Airport Hotel

We are proud to present an impressive group of speakers at the District 5 Sons of Norway Convention. Speaker presentations begin Wednesday morning and continue until Saturday afternoon.

Wednesday, June 19

Corlene Bartels: Stave Churches in America 10:45 am

Corlene Bartels is the President of the Norsemen of the Lakes of Walworth County, WI. She is the daughter of a 100% Norwegian mother descending from the area northeast of Stavanger. She grew up in northern MN and lived in the northwest of that state near Bemidji that has many families of Norwegian descent. In 1997 she and her sister traveled to Norway to visit their ancestral country.

Having visited a Stave church in Wisconsin before one in Norway, she found out why they were called "Stave". Returning home, she created a Power Point to inform others of Stave churches in America and why they were built in our country. She loves to show you each of them.

James Nelson: Norwegian Folk Beliefs 1:00 pm

Jim Nelson has a music education degree from Augustana College, Rock Island; and graduate degrees in Scandinavian Studies from the University of Wisconsin (Madison); and the University of Washington (Seattle). He has taught Scandinavian courses at the University of Wisconsin, Camrose Lutheran College (now the Augustana campus of the Univ. of Alberta), Concordia College (Moorhead, Minnesota), the University of Washington and the University of Oslo. He taught public school music in the US and for 15 years in Norway. He also created and taught courses in Nordic and Norwegian folklore and traditional beliefs at Concordia College and the University of Oslo.

Jim has been a featured performer at folk music festivals and sung with or directed three Norwegian male choruses. He is a member of Duo Scandinavica and Lingonberry Jam. Jim and his wife, Irene, are members of Scandiana lodge in Chesterton. He is past president of the lodge.

He will give a presentation on Norwegian folk beliefs and superstitions based on classes he has taught.

Rivojen Jørn Magnus Langseth 2:30 pm

Rivojen Jørn Magnus Langseth will present insight into Sami art in his four presentations which will all center around the topics:

From old ornaments till today's bit data: How do we communicate? Shapes and context within Umesami ornaments.

Thursday, June 20

James Nelson: Norwegian Music and Dance 9:00 am

Jim Nelson has a wide range of things Norwegian to share. His interests range from music to language, to cultural customs, and beyond. He will present a program on Norwegian music, with a couple of traditional dance steps: the reinlender and the medieval "songdans" or Færøydans. In the songdans, one person leads the dance and the singing. In Norway and the Faroe Islands, the dance-and-song leader sings on the verses (which tell a story) and the other participants sing the refrain. The step is always identical - two steps to the left, then one to the right, over and over, while forming a circle or a large "S".

Mike Charman 10:30 am

I have had a very varied and wonderful life starting in Liverpool England in 1944 and taking me to Norway in 1970. I have spent 40 years in Norway or working on Norwegian ships. I have sons and grandchildren in Norway. We visit every year and yes, I have been a Norwegian citizen since 1984. I will talk about the early years of my life and come quickly to my time in Norway.

Growing Up in a Norwegian Colony in the 1940s and 50s 10:45 am

Adolf Hansen grew up in a community of Norwegian immigrants in New York City. He wrote a book about the culture of this group of immigrant families and how he was deeply influenced by meaningful relationships with peers which continue to the present. His story is a wonderful counterpoint to the immigrant stories we usually hear which most often are about growing up on a farm.

Annegrete Langseth 1:00 pm

Annegrete Langseth works to preserve Sami culture and art. She constructed the traditional dress outfit for her husband, an example of only one of her talents. She will speak on a topic of her choice.

Daron W. Olson, PhD.: Vikings 3:45 pm

Daron Olson is Associate Professor of History at Indiana University East. He will present information on Vikings from his extensive research. He is author of <u>Vikings Across the Atlantic, Emigration and the Building of a Greater Norway, 1860-1945</u>

Sara and Rick Long: Fjord Horses 7:00 pm

Sara and Rick Long love Fjord Horses. Learn about their work with these special horses. Check out the Facebook page for Steppin' Out Stables to see pictures of their fjord horses and other breeds they raise.
