<u>Reopening Lodges in 2021</u>...Suggestions for Making a Strong Comeback

1) <u>Fagernes Lodge, Blair, WI</u>-Reopening plans include asking the most veteran members to retell special family stories. 3) <u>Wergeland Lodge, La Crosse, WI</u>-Lodge members are ready to kick up their heels with a grand Syttende Mai party at Drugan's Castle Mound Restaurant in Holmen. 



The District 5 Cultural Committee presents experienced Norwegian cooks sharing traditional and experimental approaches to Scandinavian cooking. Learn the traditions of making lefse and rullepølse from family heirloom recipes handed down through generations. Explore modern adaptations of recipes and learn about cooking styles of generations of the past. Some featured recipes are Lapskaus, Troll Cream, Knekkebrød, Viking Bread, Hjerte Vafler, Open Face Sandwiches.

Guidance toward earning the first level Cultural Skills Cooking pin will be offered. Work beyond class is required to earn an award. Recipes and cultural award program information will be sent to registered students prior to the first class. The Zoom connection will be sent to registered students close to the time of the first class.

In addition to recipes provided for the class, two cookbooks are available for purchase. **The Norwegian Kitchen** (email judy62ghastin@gmail.com) and **Baking the Norway Way** (bakingthenorwayway.com) are available in limited quantity.

Connie Aiello has been cooking and baking for as long as she can remember. As a daughter of a restaurant owner and a home economics teacher, she could always be found in the kitchen learning traditional ethnic recipes from the skillful hands of family members. For the last 16 years, she has been honing her skills with traditional Norwegian dishes. Recently, she has been exploring contemporary Norwegian cuisine.

Connie currently serves as Vice-President and Cultural Skills Program Director of Nordlyset Lodge in Racine, Wisconsin. She enjoys teaching, mentoring, and guiding members as they complete specific cultural activities. She recently mentored a group completing their Norwegian Cultural Cooking Pin Levels 1 & 2. The group has one more entrée to complete for Level 3.

Connie has presented Norwegian cooking at local schools and cultural events. She was honored to present a Norwegian Cooking Demonstration at Marquette University's Innovation Kitchen. In August 2016, Connie led a Sons of Norway Youth Heritage Trip to Norway, where they explored the country, customs, and cuisine. While staying with relatives in Røros, she experienced local traditional foods. Connie was thrilled to come back home with 100-year-old family recipes!

Connie is currently an elementary/middle school substitute teacher. She enjoys teaching students at all skill levels, imparting the tips and tricks of the trade from her parents. Her enthusiastic and easy-going style inspires everyone to enjoy cooking.

Nancy and Duane Kittleson carry on cooking traditions from both of their families. They grew up in homes with lutefisk, lefse, krumkake (or stryll, depending on who you talk to) and Norwegian coffee.

They have been members of Vennelag 5-513 in Mt. Horeb, Wisconsin for more than 20 years and have served in various offices of leadership within the Lodge, have chaired major fundraising events, and have been delegates to many District and International conventions. The fundraising events involved making 10 or 12

rullepølse for many years for the fall breakfast (Frokost), organizing a crew of 12 or more making and selling about 45 dozen lefse for the Christmas holiday, and teaching at the lodge annual Norse baking workshop. In addition, Duane has served on the District Five Board as Publicity Director and as Treasurer.

Duane is interested in genealogy; Nancy loves Norsk baking and Hardanger embroidery. The Kittlesons are proud of their Norwegian heritage and have traveled to Norway three times.

Over the last few days, we've had a number of complaints of what seemed to be spam emails from various district or lodge leaders. These emails would typically seem as if they were coming from a lodge leader and would ask for money, a gift card, etc.

This is referred to as <u>spear phishing</u>. You likely have heard of phishing, which is when a bad actor sends an email asking you to do something (e.g. send gift cards or give out your password). Spear phishing is a more sophisticated type of phishing, which we experienced here, when the bad actor makes the email look more legitimate by using a familiar name and title, and by sending it to people likely to relate (in this case, lodge members).

One of the easiest ways to identify an email as a phishing attempt (which applied here) is that the sender's name and email address do not match. Another big giveaway is that they often come from out of the country and the emails contain broken English.

One reason we are susceptible to these types of phishing attempts is that the contact info for our district and lodge leaders is publicly available on our website. We have decided to temporarily disable this feature as we consider better alternatives. As of today, the Lodge Directory on the public website has been temporarily removed, and the page now redirects to a zip code finder for people looking for a lodge in their area.

We will continue to actively monitor this situation and take necessary steps to safeguard your data, while helping our members find the information they need. Please feel to reach out to me with any further questions or concerns.

Corporate Matters and Governance Committee

*Several referenda have been advanced and passed to assist lodge operations during covid and any potential future disruptions to lodge business:

1 - To allow local lodges to meet via electronic means and outlining a process with which to

hold

virtual elections.

- 2 To allow district boards to hold referenda via electronic means in order to transact business during times like we are going throughwhere in-person meetings are not possible.
- 3 To allow local lodge boards to hold referenda via electronic means and outlining uniform procedures to be used.

*Other key issues addressed by the board in the past year include:

- 1 An update to the Nominating Committee sections of the Constitution to conform with the guidelines and procedures that are already in place.
- 2 To establish youth protection measures for all youth-involved activities.
- 3 To define the process, whereby the International Board is able to appoint directors, in order to fill gaps in expertise as needed.
- 4 To update the bylaws template to include dissolution and distribution of assets and compliance clauses. <u>Special note – all lodges are asked to review their current bylaws to</u> <u>see if they include dissolution, distribution and compliance clauses and to revise as</u>

<u>necessary,</u>

using the online template to make sure that they are in place. If the online template is not followed, any bylaw changes submitted will not be approved.

I want to share some notes from a SON leadership seminar I attended some 18 years ago!

Issues many of our lodges face:

- a) Lack of cooperation
- b) Lack of desire to change
- c) Tied to old meeting/governance culture
- d) Lack of visibility
- e) Lack of leadership
- f) Lack of growth

Sound familiar? Some things don't change or if they do, they can change very slowly!!

And from that same seminar – Are there any differences from then to now?:

6 ideas for stronger lodges and increased membership

a) Create an alternative order of ceremonies – less business, more social – board transacts business, membership approves. Actually implemented in many lodges

today!

b) Retain past due members – personal phone calls work well, much better than emails. **Personal**

contact always the best way to keep in touch – many lodges using phone trees during Covid

c) Leadership training to develop quality leaders – make sure prospective leaders know what is

expected of them – keep surprises to a minimum. Convention leadership seminars and district

training, like today, are being done

- d) Create family membership and family-friendly programs. Done with ongoing updates!
- e) Provide financial incentive to purchase insurance. We now have dues imbedded in several

financial products. Other incentives include excellent financial products at very competitive

- prices!
- f) Update website include online dues renewal, chat rooms, adopt-a-school program. **Online** renewals, social media, and a very updated website all in play.

Harold Bohrmann, chair of Catholic Financial Life, made a wonderful presentation to the International Board a couple of years ago. Some of his main points were:

- 1. Fraternals need to change what and how we do business and how we reach new members
- 2. Co-ops are embraced by all fraternal benefit companies, like SON, are insurance co-ops
- 3. Millennials are our friends, they make us change and force us to modernize
- 4. Volunteerism is big with millennials plenty of opportunities for volunteerism in SON
- 5. Fraternals bring integrity, connection, trust and value to our communities, but must get faster, better, stronger
- 6. Fraternals must embrace the future
 - a) Old can become new again i.e. virtual meetings
 - b) Distrust of big Wall Street firms works to our advantage we have a personal edge
 - c) Millennials love us once they meet us we do things they like
 - d) In a divisive society people are looking for ways to connect **especially post**pandemic as

happened after the 1918 pandemic!

e) Fraternals are well positioned but need to work together like never before

His final point:

THE FUTURE IS IN OUR HANDS – WE JUST HAVE TO GET OUR MESSAGE IN FRONT OF PEOPLE!

Scandinavian Hour – Just as a "good of the order" note, I would like to put in a plug for "The Scandinavian Hour" radio broadcast that comes out of Washington State. This program has been on the air since 1959, led by Doug Warne of Seattle and his late partner Ron Olsen. Doug is retiring and a young, but very capable member of Bothell Lodge in Bothell WA, Seth Tufteland, is taking over and hoping to continue the tradition. The show airs on 1150AM KKNW and can be streamed live online at 1150kknw.com/listen. The programs will also be available via podcast in the near future.

Photo Reminders -

- Local Lodges will send their photographs to the lodge publicity director (or maybe lodge newsletter editor) who will forward them to your district publicity director. If your lodge does not have a lodge publicity director, please send submissions directly to the district publicity director via mail or email. Contact information for the district publicity directors can be found on the corresponding district page of Viking Magazine. [Lodges need to up-date their lodge officer job descriptions to include at least one or two officers in charge of taking photos and submitting to the lodge newsletter editor and District Publicity Director.]
- Sons of Norway Viking Photo guidelines are found on the International website [Go to Member Resources – Find listed the Communication Tool Kit and Under Lodge Forms find – Publicity Toolkit]
- Photo must contain Sons of Norway members and the caption information must relate directly to the content of the photograph.
- Photos must be visually interesting, well lit, and of good composition. It is best to avoid photos containing distracting items in the foregrounds (such as heads, chairs, backs of people obscuring the view of the subject) and photos taken in dim lighting conditions.
- Digital cameras and phones must be set to the highest possible photo quality setting and photo must be 'Actual Size'.
- Digital photos must have resolution of 300 dpi (dots per inch) or greater with no pixilation or blur and at least 3" x 5" in physical size.
- High resolution images will be a larger file size, often several hundred kilobytes (KB) or from one to ten megabytes (MB) and up.
- When emailing a photo from a tablet or smart phone, be sure to send the largest possible file size offered (which will likely require additional bandwidth/data).
- DO NOT Edit photos (Photo shop) and digitally altered or cropped photos will not be used. Only send the original untouched photos as the publishing company uses their professional software to crop and resize the submitted photos.
- Photos of inanimate objects only (handcrafts, food, murals, etc.) will not be used. [Must have a Sons of Norway member or attendee in the photo.]
- Limit the number of people in your photo. What you are capturing is going to be reduced to a much smaller print size and you will not be able to see the people.
 - Look at the photo sizes in the Viking Magazine. They are approximately 2 7/8" x 4 1/3"; 2 7/8" x 2 7/8"; 2 3/8" x 2 3/8"; 2" circle and the extra Member/Lodge photo is 1-1/8" square.
 - Are there too many people in your photo would you see them in a smaller photo
 - Does the photo tell a story making it interesting?
 - Be creative instead of sitting in a row have the group doing an activity
- Be creative in showing lodge activities to help 'invite people' to look at your photo and read about what you are doing.

Sending Photos –

- In District 5 photo submission from the lodges to the District Publicity Director are due by the 10th of the month so the District Publicity Director has time to review and select District 5 photos with their lodge descriptions to submit to the Sons of Norway International Viking Magazine Editor/team for magazine set-up.
- Lodge members/photographer will submit photos to their lodge publicity director/newsletter editor. They will select a photo(s) with photo description and send them to District 5 district publicity director. (If you lodge does not have a lodge publicity director or editor, please send submission directly to the district publicity director via email.)
- Contact information for your district publicity director can be found on the corresponding district page of the Viking Magazine.
- Emailed digital photo submission (preferred) should be sent as attachments along with a description of the lodge activity and identifying those in the picture (if desired). If the lodge cannot submit a digital photo, they can send a printed photo to be scanned by the District publicity director. Although scanned pictures may not show the correct coloring and dpi format needed for the photo to be printed in the Viking magazine.
- Photos of children need to have parental permission if you are publishing their name. If the child is a legacy member they can be listed as they are a member but still get parental permission and note that in the email description. You can get the parent's verbal permission at the time of taking the photo.
- Children can be identified as local children enjoying your event or grandchild or child of current member (with or without member name).

LODGE PUBLICITY

Publicity is an important component of a successful lodge. A successful publicity campaign can inform your surrounding community of your existence, increase attendance at lodge events and increase membership in your lodge.

- Establish a lodge budget and then make it larger. You will need to cover expenses for newspaper ads in local newspapers, printed flyers for events, printing of photos, handouts, etc. Review what you have done and paid in the past two years to help increase more exposure of your events in your geographical location/area so the public is aware of your lodge which is open to the public and welcoming new members.
- 2. Newspapers
 - a. Have the Lodge President, Editor and Secretary (at least two people together) visit the local newspaper office to make a personal contact and get their business card. Ask if the lodge could have a non-profit discount for ads places in local newspaper or in combination with ads placed in other local newspapers that this company covers.
 - b. Discuss if there is a fee to submit an informational article before an event and then follow-up news pieces complete with at least one digital picture. Usually news articles placed on-line have no cost but check on their policy.
 - c. When you have a lodge event notify the newspaper about a month ahead of time so they can schedule a reporter/photographer to cover your event. Have a news story

already prepared and printed to give the news reporter for their article. If there is a charge for your event be sure to personally give the newspaper a ticket for admission at no charge to them.

- d. Create your 'news release' in a Word or Google Document and save it. Then when you go on-line to submit an article with the newspaper service you can 'copy and paste' the article and know that you have included all information. You can next 'up-load' a photo for the story.
 - i. If you know that you are going to submit your story in several newspapers and you don't want to re-write it every time, make it more generic. Make sure your photo (that can be staged) has someone of each town in the picture and have the people identified from each town. Save computer article and pictures.
 - ii. The newspapers usually only print news about people from their town so identifying them is very helpful or change the photo used for each town newspaper.
 - iii. Identify your article or photo by referring to 'Local members of '(lodge name) lodge of Sons of Norway will be meeting at 123 Street name, Town name' might help to get into another neighboring town newspaper.
- 3. **Community Calendar** for your community may be maintained by the Chamber of Commerce, local newspaper or Town/City government.
 - a. Check to see who maintains the printed and the on-line calendar and put your lodge events on this service.
 - b. Area TV and Radio stations also have local event calendars for free.
- 4. Use a **Guest Book** at lodge meetings.
 - a. One can be purchased at local craft store, paper goods store or even at Goodwill or resale shop (un-used).
 - b. On each page mark an area with dark lines for guests to write their information for the headings: Date, Name, Address, Email address, phone number.
 - c. Use this for Membership recruitment <u>and</u> for major Lodge Event Advertisement via email and regular snail mail of your flyers.

5. Lodge Lap Top Computer

- a. Having a lodge traveling lap top has many advantages and is a central place to store your lodge information.
- b. Set-up a generic lodge email set-up so
 - i. The computer programs that you purchase can be updated when needed.
 - ii. Your members send their reports and photos to the one person who will use this lap top for their lodge office. Example could be 'Vennelagsec@gmail.com' Keep it simple with no computer sign-in password or have the password written on the keyboard for future reference.
- c. Lodge Rules, Guidelines, Minutes, Agendas, Officer Reports and photos should be in separate category folders and sorted by year.
- d. Why Unless you keep a lot of paper copies does your lodge have that information kept in place where it can be accessed if current officers and their possessions are no longer available? Information from officers can be transferred to the lap-top via data-stick upload or via email.

6. Facebook, Snap Chat, Twitter, Web site

- a. Setting up a lodge presence in these media formats reaches more people and has no cost to the lodge except maybe the lodge web site. Many people re-post info.
- b. If needed, engage some of the younger members to help facilitate and manage these entities.

7. Photos

- a. Photos show fun lodge activities that can be used in many ways. Many can be 'natural' photos but also 'stage' photos to get specific people or events collected to be used later.
- b. Take many photos at lodge meetings and activities as you can always delete what isn't used or save to be used for future promotions.
- c. Designate someone in the lodge to take photos either as part of their job or appoint someone.
 - i. Your local high school students might have optional service or volunteer hours that can earn toward graduation 'silver cord' recognition.
 - ii. 4-H and scout groups may have someone interested in taking photos toward badges or troop service.
- d. Printed or Digital Lodge scrapbook on display at lodge meetings or events can help facilitate conversation about what the lodge does.

REPORT FROM INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR – DISTRICT 5

Sons of Norway International Board

The past year has been quite unusual for most of us, trying to stay safe from Covid-19. Though it has been challenging, the International Board has been working as usual via email and video conferencing. The huge loss is not seeing our friends and colleagues during these past months. Currently, it is not practical to do a PowerPoint report, so here it is in letter form.

The last meeting of the Sons of Norway International Board of Directors was held via video conference on November 16-19, 2020, meeting for over three hours each day. The full board was present along with CEO Chris Pinkerton and Executive Assistant Lonna Hanson. Staff members who gave reports were; CFO Erica Oberg, CIO Dan Seyfried, Matt Roedel (Insurance Sales and Operations Director), Connie O'Brien (Fraternal Development & Marketing Director), Lizabeth Halva (Human Resources & Business Integration Director), Kevin Cassidy (General Counsel and Chief Compliance Officer), and David Crabb (Fraternal Engagement Manager). Outside Legal Counsel Dave Ness from Fafinski Mark & Johnson, P.A. also attended parts of the meeting.

Outside professionals are involved with the meetings and all reports are reviewed: investment advisor portfolio reports, IT strategic planning, Anti-Fraud Statues from MN, 3rd Quarter financial statements, budgets, Viking Magazine, 10-year actuarial projections, updates from the American Fraternal Alliance, Human Resource and new building updates, Insurance recruiting and product updates, Code of Ethics review, governance structure, and life insurance logos. SONS Officers and Committees gave reports regarding; the Board Policy Book (ongoing reviews), lodge owned real estate, lodge liability insurance, Finance Committee Resolutions, Audit Committee, board member expenses, document signing authority by home office, 2022 Convention in MN.

Following the meeting there were several staffing changes at the home office. SONS has been operating many years in a regular pattern of business that has not kept up with the latest technology to operate efficiently and effectively. However, even during the past year of difficult times when lodges are unable to meet, membership has grown, and sales of insurance policies are moving upwards. Social media has kept many in touch with their SONS roots, we are optimistic about our future growth and sustainability.

Sons of Norway Foundation Board of Governors

The SONS Foundation Board of Governors has been meeting via video conferencing for the past year. The board last met on Wednesday, January 20, 2021, for a 4-hour meeting. The new board is: Merv Eriksson, chair; Jon Tehven, vice chair; Ernie Fosse, treasurer; and Christy Olsen Field, secretary.

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I was appointed last year to a two-year term by International President Ron Stubbings. My committee appointment is chair of the Development Committee.

The board participated in a strategic plan workshop hosted by Jaime Rate, Keystone Group. Following the workshop, Committee reports were reviewed; Executive Governance Committee (Merv), District Foundation Directors (Jon), Development Committee "Together We Are the Future" update, (Jon & Robin), Finance Committee (Ernie), Disaster Relief/Extreme Illness (Allison). Ron Stubbings gave a brief International Report, and Connie O'Brien reported on the Foundation general updates. Goals were discussed.

The Development Committee designed the Together We Are the Future campaign for October Foundation month. Our goal was to share awareness of the SONS Foundation and involve members, lodges, Districts, the International Board and Board of Governors, and corporations. We started work with Anne Olson, Foundation Director (resigned) and continued with Connie O'Brien at the Home Office. Our goal was to raise \$100,000 for SONS scholarships and Humanitarian funds. As of this week, over \$210,164 was brought in from 113 lodges, 837 personal donations. These gifts came from the direct mailing envelope, Viking Magazine article, and personal giving to scholarship accounts.

I personally would like to thank former International President Jon Tehven, Connie O'Brien, and our District 5 Foundation Director Darlene Arneson for all their work and perseverance in completing this successful campaign. We have development a general template for the fund-raising effort, our future goal is to have the Futures campaign annually from October 1 - January 1, to raise awareness for the Foundation.

The District nominating committee will be elected at the spring 2021 board meeting. Please refer to the document that outlines who can serve and other details. The committee will need your help in surfacing candidates for zone directors, District officers, and alternates. Although a member does NOT have to be a benefit member to serve as a delegate to the District Lodge Meeting, they must be in order to serve on the District board, as an alternate, or as a delegate or alternate to the International Board.

There are applications that must be filled out to run for the Board. We also will be electing an alternate for the International Director. Robin Fossum's term as International Director continues through 2024 due to the extension of this biennium due to the pandemic. The alternate's term is for two years and the director's term is for four.

Timeline for Nominating Committees NON-ELECTION YEARS (from the guidelines)

March-April-May in non-election year District Nominating Committee

- Consist of no fewer than three (3) members
- Elected by District Board (3.7.7.)
- Committee may include current and past District Board members who are not candidates for election
- Only one (1) member per zone
- Nominating Committee election to be held by spring board meeting of non-election year

Zone Alignment Update

The delegates, AKA District 5 Lodge Members, who served in 2018 in La Crosse at the District 5 Lodge meeting continue their work through the 2022 District Lodge Meeting when the new delegates are seated. There were 109 delegates who served and since that time, two have passed away.

The bylaw proposal to "clean up" the bylaws passed by the required 2/3 vote in December. The vote was done by postcard. There were 81 postcards returned with 79 in favor and 2 opposed. The new bylaws will be posted on the District website, emailed to the 2018 delegates/District 5 Lodge members, and will be included in the 2021 District 5 Directory.

The Zone alignment committee has discussed, had ZOOM calls, conducted surveys and asked the Zone Directors to help collect information on the process of a major zone alignment. There are several options the committee still feels are options but if changes will be made, ideally they would be done by mid-2021 so the Nominating Committee knows what our zones are and where they need to find candidates from.

The discussion shifts from group to group and we have found that ideally its best to have the debate when everyone is in attendance so they can hear all the discussion, share ideas, offer suggestions, and everyone has the same information.

Our questions to you today-

- Do you feel a major realignment is needed?
- Has your lodge discussed the proposed changes that have been shared?
- Is it better to act on this at the 2022 District Lodge Meeting or now in 2021?
- Your suggestions, comments and thoughts?

Since the last options were formulated, we have two lodges that have requested information about disbanding- Trollhaugen (IL) and Vakkertland (Wisconsin).

I plan to have the Zone Alignment Committee meet after this zone meeting to discuss what we hear!

Best Practices to consider

COVID related

- Follow your county's health department's guidelines, restrictions and information as that takes precedence on indoor/outdoor gatherings.
- Food- also check with your county's health department. Depending on what type of food license you have. Your lodge's re-opening process and requirements may be different than another's. Work with your food inspectors for templates for COVID forms.
- The need for Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) will vary depending on your meeting venue, what they have, and what you need to bring in.

Other best practices to help your lodge stay connected

• Communications with your lodge members- emails, virtual calls, newsletters, phone calls

- Forms and deadlines- have them on your lodge's agenda, delegate who does them, and follow up. Ask for help if you aren't sure. If an officer with reporting duties does not have email, work with that person as most forms and instructions are being emailed by International and not sent hard copy.
- Read the FFFN, emails from International, and watch videos from International to keep up-todate on what's new, changed and reminders
- Reminding members to take advantage of the many virtual offerings.
- For those not online- Can you lodge have a calling tree to reach them, have books/articles/magazine drops (i.e. those who get *Norwegian American Weekly, Vesterheim*) share old issues, or trimming stamps for Tubfrim?
- Working on cultural skills or sports medals. Do your members have the updated forms?
- Small group structure may be helpful to keep people engaged who have similar interest. Examples are rosemalers, book clubs, knitters, carving, or just a "coffee clutch"!
- Online SN language lessons- written on public part of website but the audio is on the Members Only section. Is there someone who can lead a virtual weekly class using the lessons?
- Does everyone know how to log into the SN website and update their Membership Profile?
- Meetings are important! Work with the District if you need help but the need to conduct business, review financials, membership work, and activities is critical.
- Outdoor events- great way to involve your younger members and take advantage of less restrictions. Do members want to meet to walk together? Ski? Snow shoe?
