Accompanying letter: THE HISTORY OF NORDFJORD 288 pages; richly illustrated with 185 photos Selja Publishing House ISBN 978-82-8240-206-4 'The history of Nordfjord' has recently been published by Selja Publishing House inin Western Norway. It is the first time the content has been published in English. The book has been proofread by Allegro.no.

The book is primarily aimed at foreign tourists visiting Nordfjord, perhaps especially those who come to the cruise terminals in Olden, Måløy and Nordfjordeid. In addition, 2025 is the 200th anniversary for the Norwegian emigration to the United States (1825–2025), an event that will be celebrated in both countries. Several Americans will probably also visit Nordfjord, a region that – as you know very well – in the late 1800s and early 1900s had significant emigration to America. From the last cover page: Nordfjord is a scenic and interesting region of Western Norway, and a popular destination for visitors.

In this book the eight communities of Eid, Gloppen, Hornindal, Loen, Olden, Stryn, Selje, and Vågsøy are highlighted. It is about the people and agriculture, the holidays and traditions, the development of communications and the schools, and much more. The goal has been to present the past in as vibrant and credible a way as possible. Therefore, in many places, we have chosen to reproduce the local people's stories – as direct quotations – just as they were once told and written down. The book contains an incredible amount of factual information. In everything he writes, he highlights the stories, experiences, and accounts of the locals. 



Mission Statement:

The Norwegian American Genealogical Center & Naeseth Library is an educational non-profit research center with national and international scope. The Center collects, preserves, shares, and interprets resources for the study of Norwegian heritage.

To carry out this mission, the Center provides:

- The Naeseth Library, located in Madison, Wisconsin, where resources devoted to Norwegian and Norwegian-American genealogy and immigration history are collected, preserved, shared, and interpreted;
- Expert assistance, interpretation, education, and research by qualified staff for members, patrons, and correspondents;
- Cooperative work experience for students pursuing education in library science, genealogical research, and Norwegian language studies;
- Website with links to searchable databases of Norwegian immigrants to the US to be used for genealogical research;
- Continuing education and outreach for genealogists and the public worldwide through cooperative information exchanges, publications, tours, displays, seminars, webinars, and merchandise sales.

Through its collections, research, outreach and publication, the Center strives to maintain and enhance its role as the most comprehensive source for information about the history of Norwegian immigration.

Our History:

Norwegian Americans have produced an exceptional achievement in venerating and preserving the records of their past. They began the work of recording and sharing their heritage even before immigration ceased, and their continuing efforts to perpetuate this history are as impressive as any group in our country.

The Norwegian American Genealogical Center & Naeseth Library is one of America's leading genealogical research centers. The Center began as the dream of Gerhard B. Naeseth (1913-1994), internationally renowned scholar in the field of Norwegian-American genealogy and immigration history. As early as the 1940's, Naeseth began collecting the primary resource information and documents relating to Norwegians in the United States. In 1974, when he was associate director of the University of Wisconsin Libraries, Naeseth also established a genealogical research center, located in Madison and associated with Vesterheim Norwegian American Museum. In the 20 years before his death, Naeseth built up this new resource by increasing the library collections, publishing ground-breaking works on Norwegian immigration history, and engaging and mentoring volunteers. By 1984, the genealogical center membership included over 800 households.



Today, with over 2,000 member households in the U.S., Canada, Japan, and Norway, NAGC & NL has built upon the impressive legacy of Gerhard Naeseth.

This legacy includes not only Naeseth's entire collection of research and library materials collected over his lifetime, but also the devoted following of hundreds of Norwegian Americans whom he had assisted. Naeseth's scholarly contribution included the work he began on a projected five-volume biographical directory of the Norwegian immigrants who came to the U.S. between 1825 and 1850. The first volume of this important series was published in 1993. The work to complete this ground-breaking publication was continued by his successor and friend Blaine Hedberg who began his career here as volunteer and became the first Naeseth Chair for Genealogical Research and Publication. Before his resignation in late 2012, Hedberg served here for thirty years, some of them as Executive Director, always working on the completion of Naeseth's magnum opus. In 2009, Hedberg, together with his Staff colleagues and volunteers, celebrated the appearance of the fifth volume of this series, fulfilling Naeseth's ambitious goal and creating an important scholarly addition to the body of knowledge in the field of immigration history.

With the aid of modern communications and computers, genealogical research has become one of the most popular activities ever. Researchers from this country, and a growing number of Norwegians seeking information on family members who emigrated, find their way to NAGC either in person or in cyberspace. The Staff and Board of NAGC continue to serve this growing audience, build and share the research collections and databases in our care, publish useful and popular genealogical materials, and reach out to all those who seek to know and venerate their Norwegian roots.
